## Capitol Report

## Many Bills Before Legislators Affect State Colleges

Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles concerning happenings of interest at the state capital which may affect California state colleges and their students. It is written by California Intercollegiate Press Association's Narm Kemper of Sacramento State College, an accredited capital reporter.

SACRAMENTO—(CIP)—A bill introduced into the state assembly would in effect outlaw fraternities, sororities and religious groups on state college campuses.

The bill, authored by Assemblyman Edward E. Elliott (D—Los Angeles), would deny state owned campus facilities to any student organization which restricts its membership on the basis of race, color, religion or national origin.

Opponents of the bill have denounced legislators with protesting letters. They said the measure would outlaw Catholic, Masonic, Protestant and Jewish campus organizations as well as fraternities and sororities.

Elliott promised to amend his proposed law to eliminate the provisions against religious groups. The bill was referred to the education committee, but it has not yet been called for a hearing.

## Gov't. Committee Appears Tuesday To Submit 'Divisional Representation'

An almost new constitution for the Associated Students will be presented to the Student Affairs Council Tuesday night with the request by the Student Government Committee that it be placed on the general ballot at the April 16-17 elections.

## ASB Elections Are April 16-17; Nominations Being Received

Nominations for student body officer-candidates will be accepted until 3 p.m. April 8, according to Election Committee Chairman Don Walker. "Elections have been set for Tuesday, April 16, and Wednesday, April 17, until noon," said Walker.

A special candidate meeting will be held Monday, April 8, at 7 p.m. in Sc D-87. The purpose of this meeting will be to inform candidates of all rules pertaining to campaign procedure and the election. Campaign managers must accompany their candidates.

A campaign assembly is set for Wednesday, April 10, at 7 p.m. in the Eng. Aud. Campaigning will start Monday, April 8 at 1 p.m. and will continue to 8 a.m. on Tuesday April 16.

For those interested in running for any student body office, the following requirements must be met: (1) Petitions, which may be picked up in the ASB office, must be signed by 50 ASB card holders; (2) the nominee must have a grade point average of 1.0 or higher, but, a 0.60 with special consideration, will suffice; (3) the nominee must have been in regular attendance at Cal Poly for at least two consecutive quarters prior to nomination; and (4) the nominee must have completed 90 units of work above high school level.

The only portion of the constitution which will be presented for changing deals with representation, which many feel is the basic weakness of the present form of government. According to Committee Chairman Bert Tunal, the proposed constitutional changes would "divisionalize" student government.

### By Divisions

Representation on SAC would come from the three divisional councils. Two representatives would come from each council regardless of number of students enrolled in that division of the college, and further representatives would be based upon one for every 500 students in the division.

At present, representation is made up of chairmen of the five activity boards, Interclass and Interdepartment Club Council representatives, and class representatives. Board chairmen with an ICC and Inter Faith Council representative would be included on the "President's Cabinet," according to the proposed changes.

Student Body president, vice president, and secretary would not be given a vote on the Council as they presently have.

### Came from Conference

"The new government form was evolved," Tunal said, "by conferences with all three divisional council chairmen, SAC members, several people in the college administration, and former SAC advisors."

Student Government Committee members include Tunal, Jack Varian, Bob Bayley, Wayne Gill, Jack Dutra, and Bart Brown.

Another proposed form of government known as "three branch" was defeated at the polls twice within the last two years. Most critics of that proposal pointed out the complexity of the plan, which called for judicial, legislative, and executive departments, with legislative representatives determined on basis of residence.

## 3280-Plus Enroll Here

Enrollment for the Spring Quarter totalled 3,280 by Monday evening, an increase of almost 800 as compared with the same day last year, according to Associate Dean of Admissions Paul C. Winner.

Registered are 190 new students, 8058 old students, and 86 graduate students. Women number 178. Full time students registering late and limited students will increase the total substantially, Winner said.

New student applications for admission in Sept. totalled 566 on March 22 as compared with 488 on the same date last year. The Agricultural Division has 125 compared with 148 a year ago. The Engineering Division has 856 against 233, and Arts and Sciences has 88 compared with 108.

## Gow Wins Crown In PCI Tourney

After winning the 147 pound crown in the recent PCI tournament at Sacramento, Bob Gow and four of his boxing teammates are now preparing for the NCAA championships slated for April 4-6 at Pocatello, Idaho.

Gow along with Ed Murakami, 119, Eduardo Labastida, 119, Don Adams, 165, and Gordy Martinez, 175, are tentatively scheduled to make the trip.

Labastida will be entering the NCAA meet for the third time. Last year he lost a split decision to Choken Mackewa of Michigan State University. At the present time, Labastida ranks third in the nation according to the 1956 NCAA Boxing Press Book. He is a co-favorite with Sammy Macias of Nevada to win the 119 pound division crown.

In the PCI tournament Gow was the only Poly champion. However, Ed Murakami and Gordy Martinez made it to the finals, but Murakami lost a split decision to Robert McCullom of Idaho State and Martinez was TKO'd in the third round by Dale Leatham also of Idaho State.

As a team, the Mustangs came out third in the meet with 22 points. Idaho State took the honors with 43 points trailed by San Jose State with 25. Washington State grabbed 14, Nevada 8, College of Idaho 4 while Sacramento State, Chico State and Santa Clara failed to score.

Gow came off the floor to win his final match. He was downed in the first round by a wicked right, but he finished strong in last round to wrest the crown away from the Idaho Stater. He had defeated Joe Zeeban of Washington State and Al Julian of San Jose State on previous nights.

## Golf Team Hosts 49ers Tomorrow

Seeding win number two of the season against four losses, Coach Charles Hanks' golfers play host to Long Beach State College tomorrow morning at 8:30 a.m.

The Mustangs only victory to date was a 19-7 1/2 decision over USF. They have fallen victim to Fresno State, Los Angeles State, San Jose State and San Francisco State. Latest reports state that the Long Beach Staters have lost to Orange Coast, Riverside, Loyola and twice to Long Beach City College.

Because of the fact that the Mustangs have faced tougher competition than their foes of tomorrow, Coach Hanks failed to venture an opinion on the results of tomorrow's contest. He pointed out that San Jose State was the best on the Pacific Coast and indicated that other clubs his team had met this year were among the best in the West.

Hanks reported that Tom McFadden and Dennis Palmer would play in Poly's one and two positions. McFadden came up with a tremendous 70 against San Jose's Jack Duino. He was the Poly medalist, but was bettered for the day's honors by San Jose's Jack Cummings who scorched the course with a fabulous 68. Harlan Griswald, Gary Kinsinger and Bob Petersen will play in the three, four, and five positions. At press time the sixth position was undecided but would be either Dave Reed, "Kip" Mayne or Owen Silke.

A few schedule changes have been reported by Hanks. The April 13 match with Occidental has been canceled and tentatively re-scheduled for April 6 at Morro Bay. A match on April 11 has been added replacing the April 17 contest with the Santa Barbara Gauchos at Santa Barbara.

Lenz, who splashed this week broke the school pool and state college records for 1500 meters. He covered the distance in 19 minutes and 49 seconds. The old mark was held by Jerry Neumann, former Poly swimmer, in 1953.

Anderson, who will accompany Lenz, believes the local entry has a chance for a medal in the event.

Lenz, who is in the national collegiate championship marks the second time a Mustang has participated in the event.

Anderson reported that Lenz will swim Thursday in the 1500 meters while the 1000 and 440 will be held Friday and Saturday respectively.

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## SAC Passes Ballot On Football Seats

A ballot with two stadium seating proposals was passed by the Student Affairs Council Tuesday and will appear as page 2 at the general elections April 16-17.

The proposals deal with locations of the reserve, general admission, and student sections within the East stadium. (See editorial)

In other SAC business this week, the council granted a loan of \$825 to send four boxers to the National Collegiate Athletic Association national finals. A donation drawing to be sponsored by Boots and Spurs Club was approved. It will be held between April 29 and May, and the prize, a down-filled sleeping bag, will be awarded at a turkey shoot.

Codes and Constitution committee reported that April would be the final day to submit constitutions, codes, or changes in either, for action to be taken this year.

### Reinstatement Decided

At the last meeting of the Winter Quarter, Bryon Halpin and Reggie Gomes were reinstated to the Council following receipt of letters explaining why they had missed more than 25 per cent of the meetings.

Garth Conlan, Interclass Council representative, submitted a letter of resignation to the Council. It was not acted upon since Conlan has previously been automatically suspended because of attendance rules.

### Rykebosch Not Affected

Dave Rykebosch, sophomore class rep, had previously been named as one of the four members suspended. ASB Secretary Jim Duffy said this week that Rykebosch was not affected by the attendance rules as he had announced earlier.

Intramural softball representatives are asked to check the schedule in the gym until printed schedules are distributed.

mittie gave its stamp of approval to a bill that would establish a state college in Southern Alameda County.

The measure was referred to the Ways and Means Committee. Assemblyman Carlos Bee (D-Hayward), the author of the bill, said the new college was necessary because of overcrowded conditions at San Francisco and San Jose State Colleges.

### One Mile Limit Opposed

A legislative committee has refused to take action on a bill which would prohibit the sale of liquor within one mile of state colleges.

The Assembly Committee on Government Organization turned down a measure, supported by the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools, which would have added state colleges to the prohibition on liquor which now surrounds the University of California.

The bill was opposed by several committee members and by Beer Lobbyist Daniel J. Creedon. Creedon said that other bills have been introduced to relax the restriction at the University.

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
