Support for the Geodesic Dome as a campus chapel has been announced by the Chapel Committee of the Interfaith Council. Committee members admit that there are a multitude of details to be worked out, however, before complete approval can be given to the idea.

The Dome idea was presented after the Committee studied plans for chapels for each denomination off campus, a College religious structure off campus, and the chapel as a part of the College Union.

The chapel would be a interfaith facility convertible for Jewish, Protestant, and Roman Catholic use. The Committee has estimated that about \$5,000 would be required to complete the project.

Yearbook 'Put to Bed'; Out in Early June

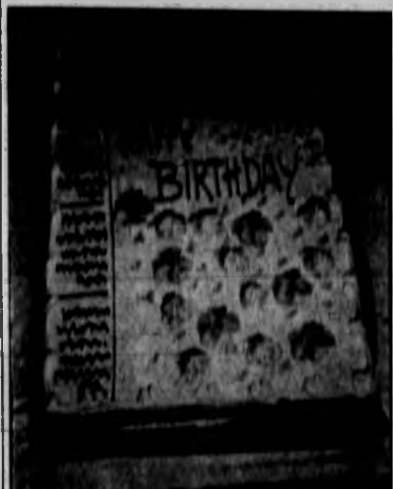
El Rodeo, Poly yearbook, was "put to bed" this week as Editor Jim Luther's staffers worked long hours to ready final portions of the book for the printer.

Telephone Co. Offers New Credit Card Plan

Finance, Council Consider \$365 Campus Radio Grant

One of the strongest faculty boosters of the project, Robert Andreini of the English Department, comments: "We envision in the future a Federal Communications Commission-authorized, low frequency station that would supply instructional possibilities for the Ag Journalism, English, Audio Visual, and Elementary Education Departments, and assist the school newspaper in college communications activities."

Security Officer Lamona Succumbs

Thomas A. Lamona, Cal Poly security officer, died of a heart attack at his home last Friday shortly before noon.

Lamona, 55 years old, came here in 1954 from the Los Angeles Fire Department where he had worked for more than 20 years. He was on the midnight shift here.

He is survived by his widow, Joy, two sons, Thomas A. Lamona, Jr., and James K. Lamona, and a daughter, Sally J. Lobb. He was born in Columbus, Ohio.

The effort to establish Poly's first station concerns an appropriation request being spearheaded by three electronics majors, Orel Kiphart, Phil Riley and Gordon Browning. With some \$365, the organization, a committee, at present, will be able to get a financial start.

According to the committee, the proposed method of broadcasting, known as the "carrier-current system," is rather unique, though hardly new. They say advantages of a low-cost, student operated communication service are noteworthy, pointing to an article in Radio & Television News (May '55) by Philip J. Kiser of Purdue University, who, incidentally, helped set up one of the nation's 150 similar stations on that eastern campus.

"The thing which makes carrier-current radio unique in the way the radio-frequency (r.f.) signal is carried from the transmitter to the individual receivers," said Kiser.

"The most popular means is the use of power or telephone lines—mostly because they are already installed and thus form a free route to each radio on the system," he added.

"The 'carrier-current' installation can be made very serviceable using strictly home-made equipment," said Kiser, adding, "The administrations of most colleges are very happy to sanction this type of broadcasting because it fulfills a need—experience and training in radio broadcasting—that could not otherwise be satisfied. These all-student stations also provide a quick and sure way of reaching the student body in cases of emergency."

Stenell Typing

Engineer's Unit Ready in September; Will House \$500,000 in Special Equipment

The new \$1½ million engineering building will be ready for occupancy in September, according to Dr. Clyde P. Fisher, Cal Poly's building program coordinator. The college's second largest permanent structure will house primarily the facilities of the Electronic and Electrical Engineering Departments.

The twenty classrooms and labs have a present capacity for 230 lectures and 896 lab students. There are also six large drafting rooms constructed for easy conversion to labs should the need arise.

Into these quarters will go \$500,000 worth of new equipment. Part of it will utilize the special 2-phase and 4-phase 400 cycle electrical power circuits.

Electrical engineering majors will have a complete electrical and hydraulic control system and an enlarged machines section. "The Pacific Gas and Electricity Companies were slated over our decision to enlarge our electrical machines

section rather than diminish or eliminate it as is the present policy of most colleges," said Fred Bowden, electrical engineering department head. "We are also going to have an animated visitor-operated display case," Bowden added.

"The Electronics Engineering Department will double its analog computer and microwave facilities," stated Department Head Clarence Radius. "We also have definite plans for developing an arithmetic control unit for the digital computer," said Radius. "This will give our graduates

valuable experience in a vital phase of electronics engineering."

Future construction plans call for an additional engineering building, slated for occupancy in the fall of 1961. It will augment the existing 50,000 square-foot structure and is to be called the "West Unit." Architectural and Industrial Engineering processing and Aeronautical drafting sections along with the overflow electrical engineering courses would be taught here.

Poly Given Hand At Whale Rock Open Water Forum

Cal Poly received a verbal round of applause Friday night at the Whale Rock Water Project forum meeting at the Senior High School, with two sides agreeing that Poly will need a great deal more water in future years but disagreeing on how it should be supplied.

A. L. Ferrini, Cayucos opposition leader to the Whale Rock project, which appears on the April 9 San Luis Obispo ballot, enthusiastically told an enthusiastic audience that "the College is the finest resource we'd ever expect in San Luis Obispo, and many times I've wished we had included Poly within the City boundary."

The College will receive, if the project is approved by a two-thirds majority of the town voters, 3,000 acre feet of Old Creek water a year. San Luis Obispo is pegged for 4,000 feet, and the Men's Colony for 1,000 feet.

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Four Mustang Mittmen At National Ring Meet

Coach Tom Lee and four ring hopefuls are packing their grips as they make ready for their trip to Pocatello, Idaho and the NCAA Finals.

Seeking national honors will be Eduardo Labatista, 112; Ed Murakami, 119; Bob Gow, 147; and Don Adams, 178.

Labatista, with a 7-2 record, drops to the 112 pound class for the first time this year. He finished third last year at 119. He lost a split decision to Choken Maekawa of MSU in the semi-finals who went on to win the title.

Murakami has a 1-mark as a result of his effort in the PCI tourney. He had no bouts during the regular season since there was no competition.

Bob Gow, sporting a 10-0 record, represents the Mustangs' main hopes for a national winner. He won the 147 pound division crown in the PCI's, and holds two wins over highly touted boxers Joe Zeeban of Washington State and Al Julian of San Jose State.

Don Adams, with a 6-1-1 record goes for the Mustangs at 178. Mike McKiernan is the spoiler in Adams' life. They fought to a draw here during the regular season and McKiernan dethroned Adams in the PCI tourney.

Mustang Athletes In Busy Weekend

Mustang athletes have an activity filled weekend facing them with many of the contests being held on the home front. However, a few of the teams will have to hit the road to keep their contest commitments.

Handling the bulk of the activity will be Coach Howie O'Daniels' baseball team. They will encounter the Bears from the University of California on Thursday and Friday in single games, and play host to San Diego State in a double-header on Saturday. All games will be on the Poly diamond.

Coach Charles Hanks' golf team will play Fresno State at Fresno on Thursday, and then they return home to host Occidental College on Saturday.

The tennis team under the guidance of Coach Ed Jorgenson will have two matches at home this weekend. Friday, the Bulldogs of Fresno State will serve as their opponents followed by the Cal Tech crew on Saturday.

Finally getting a break in the weather to allow daily workouts, the Mustang track squad should be in good shape for their dual meet with College of Pacific at Stockton on Saturday. Rain has hindered Coach Jim Jensen's thineclads so far this season, but they are now rounding into shape.

Two Poly Cagers On All-Star Team

Atwood Grandberry and Theo Dunn, standout Mustang basketballers, were named to the first team of the all-OCAA cage squad by league officials recently. Tony Lammie and Ron Basadler of Los Angeles State and Tony Pinkins of San Diego State completed the first team.

Basadler was picked as the outstanding player of the conference while Bill Baron, Long Beach, was tops in average points per game with 22.5. Grandberry had a league average of 17 points per game while Dunn managed 15.5.

The two Poly performers were also selected for Santa Barbara's all-opponent team.

Poly's all-opponent squad as released by Coach Ed Jorgenson was dominated by Bradley who placed three players on the first and second teams. Shellie McMillon and Barney Cable were named to the first team while Dick Redgwick gained a berth on the second string. Other first teamers were Pinkins, Red Merrill, Drake, and Jim Bond. Pasadena Nazarens. Second string members along with Redgwick were Ron Gibson, Creighton; Don Glenn, San Francisco State; Gary Alcorn, Fresno State; and Dan Heinrich, Westmont.

Bradley who downed the Mustangs, 82-63, early in the season captured the NIT championship. Merrill is an all-American candidate, and Alcorn was leading scorer in the California Basketball Association.

Gymnasts Tilted By Oxy, Aztecs

An outmanned Cal Poly gymnastics team recently dropped a three-way meet to Occidental and San Diego State. The Oxy crew trimmed Dr. Glenn Nobel's Mustangs 67-28, while the Aztecs managed a 71-20 victory.

Poly performer Roger Booth was the mainstay for the four man Mustang team entered in the event held at Occidental. Booth scored 25 points against the two foes. In competition against Oxy he collected 18, and 12 against the San Diegans.

Herman Farlough, Poly rope climber, bested his own record of 3.55 seconds for the climb with a 3.5 effort. Mustang Don Shoop took a total of eight points against the two opponents in the side horse.

Dr. Nobel's outfit was competing without the services of Gordon Wall. They had to face a 12 man Aztec team, and a nine-man Oxy crew.

Brooks Signs Pro Football Contract

Rudy Brooks, former Mustang football, boxing and track star, has been signed by the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Professional Football League for a reported \$6,500.

Before entering Poly, Brooks played at Napa Junior College and Washington State. He earned an all-conference nod at Napa J. C.

In his first year under Coach Roy Hughes, Brooks piled up 183 yards rushing with 26 carries. He hauled down two passes totaling 90 yards and two touchdowns. He returned five punts for a total of 87 yards. This year Brooks led offensive statistics with 446 yards gained in 71 carries for a 6.3

Baseballers Defeated In First League Tilt

Coming from behind in the sixth inning, the Santa Barbara Gauchos handed the Mustang baseballers a 5-4 defeat Friday afternoon on the Gaucho diamond.

The Gauchos jumped out in front with a three run first inning, but the Mustangs pecked away at the lead and went ahead 4-3 going into the bottom of the fifth frame. The host tied it up then, and got the winning run in the sixth inning.

Ken Matson, Poly hurler, dished out seven hits in his losing effort while the Mustangs could manage only four hits, the least they have gotten all year.

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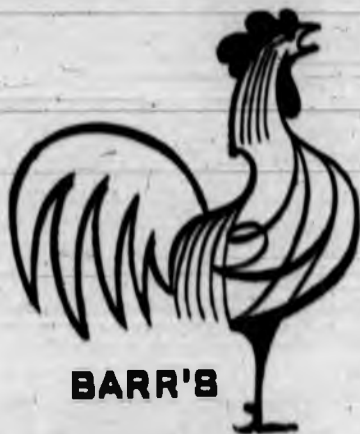
