Scott Reddington, Homecoming chairman, commented, "We feel that this type of reception will reach many more students and give them the feeling of taking part which was not accomplished in the closed reception of the past."

Library Reports Increase In Books for Fiscal Year

Francis B. Allen, head librarian, reports an increase of almost 6,500 volumes in the school library for the 1956-57 fiscal year.

He says catalogued volumes now total 51,046. Seven hundred and seventeen periodicals have been received.

A circulation total of 55,375 was reached last year and materials placed on reserve totaled 4,805.

English Majors Okay Bylaws For New Club

Homecoming Rules Set For Coeds

A reminder of co-ed rules and regulations has been issued to the general student body by the student affairs office for the Homecoming weekend.

Friday night deadline will remain 1:30 A. M. because the western dance curfew is 12:00 midnight. A half hour extension—until 2:00 A. M.—will be in effect Saturday night. Students are reminded that any off-campus group not recognized by the college and sponsoring a dance or party is definitely off-limits for co-eds.

Co-eds checking out for the weekend must be certain that the address has been approved and that proper check out is followed. Once checked out of the dorm, co-eds must report to the place where they are staying.

No general open house is scheduled for the dormitories, however, students may act as hosts for their parents during the weekend.

Santa Barbara, Cal Poly Renew Disciplinary Pact

Any student apprehended on visiting campuses in a mischievous situation will be returned to their respective campuses for disciplinary action. This is a joint agreement being renewed this year between Santa Barbara and Cal Poly Colleges.

According to the student affairs office, if any damage is done on either campus future athletic contests will be terminated. Depending upon the seriousness of the situation, students face either suspension or expulsion.

Students visiting other students either at Santa Barbara or Cal Poly do not come under the above ruling unless the situations named occur.

Insurance Available For College Trips

Coverage applies from one day to four days at the small proportional cost of 15 cents to 45 cents per member. This insurance benefit may be added to the regular \$500 accident insurance policy sponsored by the ASB, giving coverage up to \$1000.

Queen election held this week put the final touches on this year's royalty succeeding Barbara Foley, Stockton, and her court of last year. Crowning of the queen, Bobbie Unland, will be at the Homecoming Ball Saturday night in Crandall gym. The dance, sponsored by Mat Pica Pl, will not be a semi-formal affair as first reported here, but more in the line of sport clothes. No peddle-pushers or levis will be accepted.

Bonfire Rally
A committee of freshman boys are in charge of building the bonfire for the rally Friday night which begins the weekend celebration.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred K. Southard, Stockton, and their four sons have been voted Alumni of the Year by the Alumni association. All are graduates of Cal Poly's engineering division except Mrs. Southard who graduated from the Home Economics department. Plans are also underway to have the Southard family as Grand Marshal of the parade.

Parade Route
Organizations having floats in the parade are asked to have them on the Salfway parking lot at 12 noon. At 2 p.m. the Parade will start down Esala to Higuera. It will proceed to Nipomo, right to Monterey, up Monterey to Ocos, left turn on Ocos and disappear. Three of five judges have consented to officiate at the Parade. They are Mayor Fred Luck-singer, Richard Slight, Title Insurance, and Margaret McNeil, Women's Club Official. Replies have not been received yet from Merle Carpenter, Hill's Stationery, and Stella Lewis, Poly alumni.

This year's Homecoming game will revive grid wars with University of California, Santa Barbara. The rivalry continues this year after the Gauchos' absence from the Poly schedule last season.

Enrollment Totals Over 4000 Students

Fall quarter enrollment stands at 4188 students with 1040 full-time regular students and 158 limited students. By divisions the distribution is Agriculture 1052, Arts and Sciences 682, and Engineering 2306.

Numbers enrolled in some of the departments are Animal Husbandry, 340; Farm Management, 61; Truck Crops, 30; Ornamental Horticulture, 55; Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Engineering, 90; Electronic Engineering, 705; Mechanical Engineering, 555; Elementary Education, 150; Mathematics, 90; and Agricultural Chemistry, 15.

Graduates Active In Satellite Field

Ben Balsey and Dolan Mansir, both electronic engineering graduates, have distinguished themselves in their field.

Balsey, who is now employed by the National Bureau of Standards and working in connection with the International Geophysical Year satellite program, will man an observation station at Trujillo, Peru. He will be studying radio waves in the equatorial regions and the effects of the ionosphere on radio transmission.

Mansir, working in connection with a Palo Alto electronics firm, has been instrumental in the design and development of the magnetometer, an instrument which measures the earth's magnetic field. The magnetometer will become standard equipment in the future earth satellites.

Bulletin Board Displays Newspaper Clippings

Two former Poly students, George Schmidt, who received a crops technical degree last June, and Marvin Nunes, dairy husbandry major, inducted in the army and currently serving abroad, also received the award.

From California's 12,000 FFA membership, twelve members were recommended for the National Degree, awarded at the National FFA Convention, Kansas City, Missouri, October 14-17. Selections for the degree are made on a basis of the member's activities, scholarship, labor income, and net worth.

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Grades Change; Averages Same

Cal Poly has joined other California colleges in changing to a four point grade system starting with the current Fall quarter, according to Paul Winner, associate dean of admissions. Revision of the grade point system and policy on repetition of courses was announced during the 1956-57 college year.

Under the new plan, students will receive grade points as follows: A-four grade points; B-three grade points; C-two grade points; D-one grade point, and E and F-no grade points, said Winner. In the past, grade points were computed as follows: A-three, B-two, C-one, and D, E, and F-none.

Winner said an incomplete (R), when properly made up, will receive the grade points appropriate to the mark finally earned.

Beginning this Fall quarter the policy on repeated courses will be to count all units attempted and to allow appropriate grade points for grades earned, reported Winner. Unit credit toward graduation will be allowed only once for a single course. The associate dean said the grade upon repetition will be accepted in place of that established earlier.

Range Bull Tests Are Announced

Range bull tests completed at Cal Poly have again demonstrated that potential rate of gain cannot be judged by appearance. Test results showed a 310 pound difference in total gain between the top bull and the bottom bull during the 250 day test period, according to results announced by Lyman Hennion, animal husbandry department head.

Bulls went on test, Feb. 1 after a 60-day adjustment period to bring them to uniform condition. They were fed five pounds of grain per head per day during the green season, ending June 10. When the dry season came, the ration was increased to seven and a half pounds, with the addition of 80% cottonseed meal to the 66% barley, 66% oats ration. Ten pounds of oat and vetch silage was also fed during this period and about two bales of hay daily to the animals.

Cost of the program amounted to approximately \$125 per bull for the test period. Average daily gains throughout the feeding period ranged from a low of .68 pounds per day to a high of 2.20 pounds per day.

Engineers Organize Publicity Bureau

Lack of publicity was of special concern to the engineering students, so a group of interested individuals decided to do something about it.

They signed into the course known as Engineering Journalism and will act as Cal Poly's "engineering news bureau." These students will collect news for hometown releases, local and campus news of interest to the engineering students as a whole, and to particular departments.

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Colts' Second Half Comeback Defeats SJS Frosh, 20-14

Coach Tom Lee's Poly Colts posted their first win of the year Friday, defeating the San Jose State Frosh, 20-14, on the Poly Stadium turf. The victory substantially outgained the locals, but fumbles and an endless number of penalties hampered San Jose's play.

Outgained in total net yardage, 314 to 70, the Colts capitalized on enemy errors in the second half to overcome a 7-0 intermission deficit. Colt fullback Walt Ramassini intercepted a third quarter SJM aerial, and romped unmolested 55 yards for a touchdown. Later in the period, Dale Rogers tossed a 30 yard pass to Jim Ramsey, who made it to the Northern's one yard line. Rogers punched over for the score. In the fourth canto, Colt guard Norm Azevedo recovered a San Jose fumble on the enemy 19 yard stripe. Tom Reynolds eliminated the drive by going over from the one.

Mustang Splashers Divide Two Tilts

Poly's water polo squad split a pair of matches in action last week. Thursday night, the Mustangs overcame a Fullerton College jinx by posting a 10-0 win; and Saturday morning, Long Beach State downed the green and gold, 14-8.

It was the first time in several years that Coach Dick Anderson's Mustangs were able to sink the Fullerton swimmers. In the Long Beach affair, it was just a case of too much experience on the visitor's part. Several Olympic team prospects compose the Long Beach team. Chick McIlroy scored 17 of the winner's 18 points. Mustang Karl Bell tallied four counters Saturday.

Next outing for the locals will be Oct. 26 when Santa Barbara invades the Poly pool.
