Contemporary native-American fiction writer Louis Owens will read from his work at 7 pm Wednesday, Oct. 28.

The free program, in Science B-5, is a presentation of Cal Poly Arts' WriterSpeak series.

Owens is Choctaw, Cherokee, and Irish — a potent combination for writing. His haunting, lyrical descriptive style reinforces the relationship between poetry and prose.

The former Atascadero resident is gaining considerable respect in literary circles. His latest novel, *The Sharpest Sight*, is a mystery that deals with complex relationships and native-American and modern-society issues.

The last offering in the Fall Quarter WriterSpeak series will be Wednesday, Nov. 4. Cal Poly English professor Al Landwehr and English graduate student Hunter Lillis will read.

### Du Pont gives \$5,000 to GrC Department

For the third year in a row, the Du Pont Corp. of Wilmington, Del., has given the Graphic Communication Department a \$5,000 grant to support academic programs and maintain quality.

The funds will be used to supplement the cost of faculty development activities such as research or attendance at seminars, conferences and industry meetings.

### Resident director applications invited

The CSU is calling for applications for resident directors for its International Programs.

The following 1994-95 or 1994-96 positions are available: 12-month, full-time, academic year appointments in France, Germany, Italy, Mexico and Spain; a 12-month, full-time, 1994 calendar year post in Zimbabwe; and part-time (one-fifth), academic-year positions in Israel and Japan.

Appointments are usually for one year, but could be two years in some cases.

Resident directors are paid at their current level of appointment (on a 12-month basis) and receive a 10 percent salary differential for overseas assignment. Round-trip airfare and travel expenses are paid for the resident director (but not for his or her dependents).

To qualify, an individual must be a full-time, tenure-track faculty member or academic administrative staff member of a CSU campus, have a Ph.D. or other terminal degree, and have appropriate overseas experience. To serve in France, Germany, Italy, Mexico and Spain, applicants must speak and write the relevant language. Language ability is highly desirable for the other non-English-speaking countries.

Administrative ability, experience in disbursing and accounting for state funds, and a commitment to international education are also required. Experience in sub-Saharan Africa is highly desirable for placement in Zimbabwe.

Minorities, women, and those who have not previously served as a resident director are especially encouraged to apply.

Applications must be at the chancellor's office by Dec. 15. ## Firefighters saved from budget cuts

Cal Poly's firefighters have survived the budget crunch.

The university's Fire Section was saved by the retirement of two of its members and a plan to scale back service and limit it to times when the campus is busiest.

The unit will respond to fires and medical emergencies seven days a week during daytime and evening hours. Exact hours are still being discussed.

The County Fire Department/California Department of Forestry station on Highway 1 will be the first agency called to handle off-hour and major fires. Cal Poly's Public Safety Services dispatcher will contact a private ambulance company for off-hour emergency medical services.

The plan, developed by retiring university Fire Chief John Paulsen, will save money in equipment as well as personnel. The campus won't use its two larger fire engines and is weighing whether to keep or sell them.

The new plan also calls for a significant increase in safety training for students, the faculty, and staff members.

The Fire Section will have three full-time fire captains rotating the duty, aided by student assistants.

Cal Poly is the only CSU campus with its own fire department. Eliminating the section was considered as a way to help meet the campus's 8 percent budget cut.

## Retirement reception for Jerry Roberts

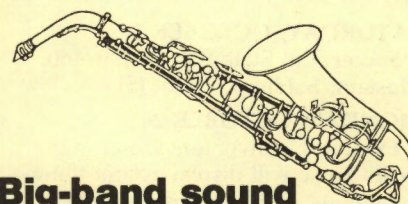
