### Effective teaching topic of seminar

A seminar on teaching effectiveness, taught by education professor Don Maas, will be offered to the faculty and staff Fall Quarter beginning Tuesday, Sept. 21.

Maintaining Instructor Effectiveness: Techniques and Strategies for More Effective Teaching will emphasize the practical applications of current research to maintain the teaching skills necessary to maximize learning, promote motivation, and increase the speed and effectiveness of learning.

Topics that will be addressed include:

- The elements an instructor must

consider in order to make instruction effective.

- How teachers can be sure students are learning before the final.
- Ways to motivate students.
- How to get students to remember the material discussed.

The course, offered by the University Center for Teacher Education, Extended Education and Faculty Development, will be held Tuesdays from 4 to 7 pm in Room 213 of the Education Building. Enrollment will be limited to 20.

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### Will your articles appear in the CPR?

The Cal Poly Report accepts articles from all campus areas, but largely because of space limitations, it is important to remember several things:

- ✓ The Report is intended to relay news of coming university events, recent appointments, new programs and other new developments and opportunities for the faculty and staff. Thus we usually don't include articles that simply describe existing programs nor particularly detailed information for a very limited audience.

- ✓ Items of interest primarily to students rather than the faculty or staff should be submitted to Stephan Lamb in the housing office, for possible publication in the Cal Poly Report Student Edition.

- ✓ Material submitted will be edited for clarity, brevity and to conform to journalistic style. If you're clear and concise and write for the general campus audience, we're less likely to rewrite your article.

- ✓ Although the deadline to submit an article is Thursday at noon for the following week's publication, the earlier it is received, the better. We might have questions, and if we can't reach you, we might have to hold the item for an extra week.

- ✓ Except for articles dealing with events or deadlines coming within the next week, we sometimes have to hold articles until the next edition for space reasons.

- ✓ Articles are usually published only once. We'll consider a request to run something twice if there's space.

- If an article is to be published in a periodical, we'll publish that news beforehand if you give us the date or volume number of the issue.

- We generally don't include items about professional-development training (unless it results in certification of some kind), participation in on-campus events, or simple attendance at conferences.

- Grants are not included if they have been or will be acknowledged in the Grants Development office's quarterly newsletter.
