Women's Studies plans noon talk

A panel of women's studies faculty members and students will explore "Has Anti-Feminism Become Politically Correct?" at noon Monday, Nov. 1, in the Staff Dining Room.

The panel will respond to an article, "Off Course," which appeared in a recent edition of Mother Jones magazine and stated that "Women's studies has empowered women to speak up in class. The problem is what they're talking about."

Are the article's charges part of the recent media backlash against feminism? What do women's studies faculty members teach? What do women's studies students learn? These are some of the questions that will be addressed.

The panel will be moderated by Carolyn Stefanco, of the History Department and Women's Studies Program. Panelists include Willi Coleman in Ethnic Studies, Laura King, Psychology and Human Development; Diane Michelfelder, Philosophy; Mariah Davis, political science student; and J. Paintings, poetry in Galerie exhibit

Paintings by Cal Poly Art and Design professor Robert Reynolds and poetry by local writer Glenna Luschei will be featured in an exhibit in the UU Galerie from Saturday, Oct. 30, to Wednesday, Dec. 8.

An artists' reception is planned from 4 to 7 pm Oct. 30, also in the Galerie.

"Spirit of Place: The Land and the Waters" will include oversized watercolors by Reynolds. Most of the paintings are new works depicting the Central Coast and High Sierra.

Reynolds' art work is in public and private collections throughout the country and has been featured in a number of publications, including American Artist, Watercolor Magic, the Ford Times and a cover story in The Artist's Magazine.

Luschei is a poet, publisher and avocado rancher. She has taught at Cal Poly and Mission College Preparatory School in San Luis Obispo and has served as poet-in-residence at Atascadero State Hospital and the California Men's Colony under grants from UCLA Arts Reach and the California Arts Council.

The Galerie is open Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 am to 5 pm; Thursday 10 am to 8 pm; Friday 10 am to 4 pm; and Saturday and Sunday noon to 4 p.m.

Germany's unification topic of Nov. 3 talk

Noted historian and filmmaker Dr. Rolf Steininger will present "Germany After Unification" at 7:30 pm in Room 213 in the new Business Building.

The talk will focus on the problems of the new Germany, such as rising xenophobia, the search for a new national identity, and the country's economic crisis.

The free presentation, the first event of this year's Lyceum lecture series, will explore this year's theme of "Culture, Nation, ... Self?"

Steininger is the director of the Institute of Contemporary History at the University of Innsbruck. He is a founding member of the International Working Group on the History of

POWs, president of the Working Group on European Integration, president of the European Institute for International Relations, and a senior research fellow at the Eisenhower Center at the University of New Orleans.
