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New play portrays censored artist

An original play about an artist whose work was censored by Nazi Germany will have its premiere run Wednesday through Saturday, Nov. 17-20, in the Theatre. All performances will be at 8 pm.

After the opening night performance, there will be a reception from 10 to 11 pm at the San Luis Obispo Art Center at 1010 Broad St.

"Censored" was written by Theatre and Dance Department Chairman Al Schnupp. It reveals critical points in the life of artist and human-rights activist Kathe Kollwitz, who lived from 1867 to 1945. In 1936, her work, considered "degenerate," was being confiscated by the German government and destroyed.

The story that unfolds is one of intrigue and deception, centered on efforts to hide the "obscene" art from government officials to avoid destruction.

Slides of Kollwitz's work will be shown during the performance, which consists of 20 short scenes that tell the artist's story.

The production is a collaborative effort of local artists and organizations. The set is being designed by Theatre and Dance faculty member David Thayer, and costumes are being designed by guest artist Christine Dougherty, who has worked at the La Jolla Playhouse, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, and American Conservatory Theatre.

Howard Gee, also a member of the Theatre and Dance Department, is the technical director.

At the Art Center's opening-night reception, works by Kollwitz will be on display, and San Luis Obispo residents Henry and Lisa Marx, who met Kollwitz in 1936, will talk about their visit.

An exhibition of Kollwitz prints

will be on display at the San Luis Obispo Art Center Nov. 13 to 20. The Art Center will be open Nov. 13-14 and 16-17 from noon to 5 pm and Nov. 18-20 from noon to 7.

Restrictions lifted on investment policy

In line with other national movements, the Cal Poly Foundation Board of Directors has voted to remove restrictions on investing in firms doing business in South Africa.

In 1986, the board concluded it was not socially responsible to invest in firms with ties to South Africa.

However, recent changes have stabilized economic, social and political conditions in South Africa, prompting a nationwide lifting of sanctions.

PERS statements now mailed to homes

The Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) is mailing Annual Member Statements to employees' home addresses.

The statements include employee PERS contributions, interest and service credit accumulated through June 30, 1993. The redesigned statements also include (1) actual retirement estimates in dollars at two projected ages for vested members who were at least 50 years old on June 30, 1993, and (2) a breakdown of service credit by employer and formula, also for members who were at least 50 on June 30. The second feature will be phased in for all members at progressively earlier ages during the next three years.


Calif Casualty Rep on campus Nov. 17

Reminders for campus road safety

Public Safety Services asks the campus community to please note several road safety tips:

- ✓ Motor vehicles should not be driven in the campus core (Inner Perimeter and Via Carta roadways) from on the hour to ten minutes after the hour. Students, faculty and staff members are asked to tell contractors, sponsored guests and visitors about this rule.
- ✓ Pedestrians and bicyclists should note that Via Carta roadway between Inner Perimeter North and South is marked as a conventional roadway. Pedestrians should use the sidewalk on the west side. - ✓ Bicycles are not allowed on other roadways or pathways in the campus core.
