Hazel J. Jones, 74

Dr. Hazel J. Jones, 74, vice president for academic affairs from 1974-82, died Nov. 4 at a San Luis Obispo hospital. The Arroyo Grande resident graduated from Western State College (Colo.), where she was honored as outstanding alumna in 1976. She earned advanced degrees from UC Berkeley and USC.

During her time at Cal Poly she placed emphasis on improved communications with campus constituent groups, long-range planning, and upgrading the quality of the academic programs.

She was a founding member of California Women in Higher Education. This statewide organization, which promotes the status of women in higher education, recognized the founding efforts of Dr. Jones with a special award and commendation in 1979.

Dr. Jones taught in Colorado and California schools, including English Department head for the Whittier schools; a professor at Cal State LA; and professor of English and dean of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences at Cal State Fullerton.

She was the guest speaker at Cal Poly's 76th Commencement in June 1982, and she retired later that summer.

Library will offer UnCover Workshops

The Kennedy Library will offer two workshops on Wednesday, Nov. 15, to acquaint the campus community with the new online periodical database, UnCover.

The workshops will take place in Room 202 of the Kennedy Library from 11 am-noon, and again from 3-4 pm. Identical information will be offered in both sessions.

UnCover offers researchers keyword, author, and title access to the contents of 10,000 recently published journals, with abstracts and local call numbers for many of the articles cited. Access is available through terminals in the library's Reference Department, or remotely through SLONET.

UnCover is a product of the Colorado Alliance of Research Libraries. The CSU Chancellor's Office and the Kennedy Library are participating in a pilot project using UnCover this year.

Ecologist architect to talk on 'biosphere'

An architect whose work is devoted to ecologically oriented projects will speak on Tuesday, Nov. 14, about an effort to replicate planet Earth in a completely enclosed, three-acre "biosphere."

Philip Hawes, director of architecture and design development at the Biosphere II Project at Oracle, Ariz., will lecture at 11:15 am in the Theatre. The presentation is titled "A Biosphere for Your Back Yard."

Biosphere II is an effort to create a sealed, self-sustaining system for ecological research and to develop a model for space stations.

With oceans and marshes, a rain forest, savanna and desert, along with microbes, insects, and other animal life, Biosphere II will be home for eight carefully chosen people. They will be sealed inside the steel-and-glass structure for two years, coming out only for personal and medical emergencies.

Hawes has been with the project since 1985. He is responsible for its architectural and integrated environmental system design.

His appearance is sponsored by the School of Architecture and Environmental Design as part of its 1989-90 Distinguished Visiting Lecturer Series, "Preparing for the 21st Century."

'Arms and the Man' will open Nov. 16

"Arms and the Man," George Bernard Shaw's romantic comedy will open the 1989-90 theater season at Cal Poly on Thursday, Nov. 16.

Performances are scheduled at 8 pm on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, Nov. 16-18, in the Theatre.

Presented by the Theatre and Dance Department, "Arms and the Man" spoofs romantic attitudes toward love and war.

Dr. Michael Malkin, chairman of the Theatre & Dance Department, will direct "Arms and the Man;" Russell Whaley has designed the set and costumes; Al Schnupp is doing the make-up for the show; and Howard Gee is the lighting designer and technical director.

Reserved-seat tickets are \$6 for the public and \$5 for students and senior citizens.

State newspaper Hall of Fame unveiled

Forty-two plaques honoring colorful, early-day newspaper publishers and editors were unveiled recently in a ceremony on the Cal Poly campus installing the California Newspaper Hall of Fame.

The plaques recognizing the inductees date from 1957 and are based on research about the nominees conducted in the journalism departments at 10 California universities including Cal Poly.

Originally the plaques were hung in the State Capitol. After the statehouse was renovated, however, they were consigned to storage away from public view.

The permanent display in the Graphic Arts Building will be enlarged in December by the addition of a score of plaques from the California Press Association's Justus F. Craemer Publisher of the Year award.

Bandfest program planned for Nov. 18

The Bay Area quake rattled the University Union windows, but "Bandfest '89" could blow the roof off the building's Chumash Auditorium on Saturday, Nov. 18.

The 8 pm program will feature the Cal Poly Marching Band, the University Jazz Band, the Cal Poly Symphonic Band, and the Dixieland Band.

William Johnson will wield the baton for the Marching and Symphonic Bands, and Graydon Williams will lead the Jazz Band. Both are members of the university's Music Department faculty.

"Bandfest '89" will be the only time during the year when the various ensembles of the Cal Poly Band will appear together.

General admission tickets for the program will be \$6.50 for adults and \$3.75 for students and golden agers. They are available at the UU Ticket Office, the Cal Poly Theatre Box Office, and from members of the band.

Season tickets for band performances are available at a 20 percent discount over the single concert price. The bands' 1989-90 concert season will include the Nov. 18 program; the annual Pops Concert (Feb. 3 and 4); and the Spring Concert (May 19).

Re: 1989 Fall Quarter Enrollment

Institutional Studies has just completed an analysis of preliminary data on the fall term enrollment and I would like to share this information with you. Current figures indicate that enrollment will be approximately 15,650 FTE (full time equivalent) students and the head count of majors will be approximately 17,550 for the fall quarter. Our experience indicates that this is likely to decline in winter and spring quarters. We do not yet have the fall quarter internal statistical report which will provide more information on the distribution of this enrollment.

This enrollment level is, of course, above the planned target enrollment for this year and preliminary information leads us to believe that both the historical show rate for new students and the retention rate for continuing students increased significantly. Furthermore, the initial data show that the seven-year decline in average student credit units did not continue this year. Two factors different from past years may have contributed to the unexpected increase in enrollment. First, this fall was the first fall quarter that CAPTURE (the telephone/computer registration system) was fully operational with a priority system for all students. Second, last year we initiated a redirection program for some unaccommodated students from the fall quarter applicant pool to other quarters. This improved the quality of the enrollees in the other quarters and may be a factor in increased retention rates.

As soon as a final analysis of the enrollment distribution is completed, the Office of Institutional Studies will make that information available to you. In

the meantime, we are also in the process of taking actions that we hope will reduce the enrollment to the Master Plan ceiling level of 15,000 annual academic year FTE enrollment. We will also seek additional resources from the Chancellor's Office for the over-enrollment this year. However, preliminary indications are that the system is over-enrolled by only 1.6 percent and, therefore, does not qualify for additional appropriations from the State. Hence any additional resources for Cal Poly will have to come from internal transfers in CSU and/or the allocation of excess (over budget) student fees to the campus.

Because of the significant impact of this campus, the limited availability of a number of our programs in the State, and the over-enrollment at some other campuses in the system, the Chancellor requested that we increase our enrollment in the fall of 1990 to the Master Plan ceiling level of 15,000 FTE.

This is 300 FTE more than originally scheduled for 1990 and would bring us to the ceiling one year sooner than originally planned. I agreed to this plan provided we received full funding for the enrollment increase in 1990 and could amend the 1990 capital outlay program to add classroom space over and above our current five-year capital outlay plan. This space will be added to the Performing Arts Center project. Both the capital outlay request and operating budget increases were granted and the Trustees raised the priority of the new Performing Arts Center and Classroom project to a level that should include it in the Governor's Budget in January. Funding for the project will, of course, depend on the passage of

the planned General Obligation Bond Issue for higher education facilities to be placed before the electorate next year.

These decisions had to be made late in the summer to modify the Capital Outlay budget at the September meeting of the Board of Trustees and I was informed last week that the 1990-91 Trustees operating budget was being modified to provide full funding to Cal Poly for 15,000 FTE students for the 1990-91 academic year.

I have requested that Vice President Wilson step up the academic planning process so that new resources can be allocated in accordance with academic plans and the necessary steps taken to reallocate and adjust student enrollment to comply with the academic plan.
