The Cal Poly Choirs will present the annual holiday spectacular, "A Christmas Celebration," Friday and Saturday, Dec. 1 and 2, at 8 pm in the sanctuary of the San Luis Obispo United Methodist Church, located at 1515 Fredericks St.

Conducted by Dr. Thomas Davies, the Cal Poly Women's Chorus, Men's Chorus, University Singers, and Madrigal/Jazz Ensemble will combine in a program of familiar carols and new works for the holiday season.

Holiday concert set for Tuesday, Dec. 5

On Tuesday, Dec. 5, the internationally celebrated Boston Camerata musical ensemble will present its holiday concert, "Sing We Noel," at the Theatre.

This acclaimed group of 12 singers and musicians performs the music of the Medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque periods.

"Sing We Noel" incorporates early music found in prints and manuscripts of old Europe, as well as many English and North American folk songs.

The Camerata, founded in 1954, was associated for many years with the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and has been under the direction of Noel Cohen since 1968. The ensemble became an independent, non-profit corporation in 1975.

All premium seats are sold out, but preferred seating is still available at \$12 for adults and \$10 for students and seniors.

Densitometers aid Cal Poly department

A Dana Point, Calif., firm has provided an extended loan of 10 densitometers to the Graphic Communication Department for use in undergraduate laboratories and in the department's industry workshops, research, and consulting activities. (A densitometer is an instrument for measuring the density of negatives.)

The Graphic Arts Division of Gretag, an international manufacturer of densitometers, has made available 10 U.S. Status-TD-186 instruments as part of a program to keep Cal Poly students and workshop participants aware of the latest technology in densitometry.
