Rodger is new department head

James A. Rodger, a member of the construction management faculty since 1976, is the department's new head. He succeeds David R. Pierce Jr., who returned to full-time teaching.

Rodger earlier served two 14-month stints as interim department head, the first in 1978-79, the second in 1980-81. His teaching responsibilities have included a variety of courses in architecture and architectural engineering as well as construction management. As department head he will continue to teach almost two-thirds time. He earned two degrees at the University of Florida, and is a certified general contractor in that state.

He took a leave of absence from the university in 1982-84 to work for Bechtel Power Corp. of Houston, assigned to the South Texas Nuclear Generating Plant. There he worked first as a senior scheduling engineer, then as a senior cost engineer, with a wide range of responsibilities in both positions.

joined Cal Poly as personnel officer in 1957.

Montgomery, a clerical assistant, is a Cal Poly alumnus. She joined the university as a part-time employee of the Biological Sciences Department in 1974 and has worked there throughout her campus tenure. Much of her time is spent in the advisement of biological sciences students.

A Cal Poly employee since 1969 when she joined the Financial Operations Department as a clerical assistant, Stover is also an alumnus of Cal Poly. Since that time she has been promoted five times leading up to her present assignment as associate budget officer for the university. During 1985-86, she served as interim business manager for the intercollegiate athletics program.

Each of the outstanding employees received a certificate and a \$300 check made possible by the Cal Poly Alumni Association.

Outstanding employees are named by President Baker based upon the recommendation of a committee made up of staff members who previously have received the award.

Botwin named

Dr. Michael Botwin, professor in the Architectural Engineering Department, is acting department head for the Fall Quarter.

He is serving in the position while Dr. David S. Hatcher is on sabbatical leave.

Botwin joined the Cal Poly faculty in 1981. He earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Miami, his master's and doctorate at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

Funds for 1986-87 Affirmative Action

The Affirmative Action Faculty Development Grants Program provides funding for faculty, with emphasis upon groups underrepresented in their discipline. The purpose of this program is to help faculty improve their chances for tenure and promotion.

Grants for released time of up to six units per quarter are available. Forty-five units have been allocated for distribution under the program. In addition, a total of \$2200 has been set aside for Affirmative Action Mini-Grant funding and \$900 for in-state travel.

Probationary or tenured faculty members at the instructor and assistant or associate professor rank as of September 1986 (and in certain instances, lecturers) are eligible to apply. Librarians are also eligible, except for those at the equivalent rank of full professor.

The deadline for proposals is Tuesday, Oct. 21. Grants must be used during the current academic year.

UCSB professor to speak Oct. 2

Dr. Walter H. Capps, professor of religious studies at UC Santa Barbara, will be the keynote speaker for the 1986-87 Arts and Humanities Series.

He will explore "The Humanities and the Conservative Revival" on Thursday, Oct. 2, at 11 am in UU 220. He is expected to focus on "New Directions," the theme for the series, which is sponsored by the School of Liberal Arts.

The Santa Barbara resident said, "The talk will deal with the challenges to the humanities that come from within current conservative and neo-conservative thought, including charges concerning 'secular humanism,' reappraisals of Enlightenment philosophy, et. al."

Computer lab designed for K-8 students

A computer laboratory designed specifically for elementary and junior high school children will be in operation on campus this fall.

Conducted by Dr. Robert Blodget and child and family development majors in the Psychology and Human Development Department, the program will be offered after the normal school day is completed.

Children in three age groups will be accepted: those in grades K-3, 4-6, and 7-8. The program will begin the week of Oct. 6 and conclude the first week of December. Sessions will run Mondays and Wednesdays, and Tuesdays and Thursdays. Children may be enrolled for more than two sessions a week.

In addition to developing skill and comfort working with computers, the laboratory is designed to develop creative thinking and enhance learning competence and self-esteem, says Blodget, a

member of the psychology and human development faculty.

The program will be designed specifically for each child's interest, ability, and experience. Therefore, the program will suit children with little or no computer experience as well as children with extensive computer backgrounds.

Each participant will work with his or her own computer and individual Cal Poly tutor. The basic purpose of the program is to help children learn to use the computer as an aid in all aspects of their lives. For example, children may use a typing tutor, a word processor, spelling checker, data base, music keyboard, or educational laser discs.

There are laser discs for astronomy, earth science, biology, art, music, and numerous other subjects. In addition, participants may use a new program, "Cartographer," to draw maps of any part of the world.

Each child can receive special help in any school subject area or explore any subject of special interest. The new computers have large memory capacity, high-resolution color monitors, and multi-voice, high-fidelity sound capabilities.

The cost of the program will be \$80 for the quarter with two sessions a week or \$40 for one session a week. Children may be enrolled for more than two sessions a week at a special discounted rate if space is available.

Free rides on SLO Transit

Cal Poly students, faculty, and staff will be able to ride free on all SLO Transit buses in San Luis Obispo for another year.

Continuing the program begun last year, student and staff members have unlimited free use of the city buses for all destinations seven days a week by presenting a valid Cal Poly identification card.

SLO Transit provides city bus service on four routes continuously from 7 am to 7 pm weekdays, and on a more limited basis on weekends.

Because of Madonna Road construction, a change will be necessary in Route 4 service beginning Sept. 29. Service to Madonna Plaza will be hourly. The bus will include a stop at Laguna Village Shopping Center on the way from Madonna Road across Los Osos Valley Road on to Foothill Blvd., then to Ramona and back to the university. This will also mean that Route 4 will be at City Hall only once per hour. There will also be a separate bus servicing each segment of Route 2, requiring a change in buses at City Hall.

Dean Trembly, 77, testing officer in the Counseling Center from 1961-77, died in San Luis Obispo.

Herman J. (Van) Vandenhoff, 67, supervisor of the Duplication Center from 1961-75, died at the Long Beach Veterans Hospital. He was a resident of Laguna Hills.

Wheeler resigns; Beason named head coach

Ernie Wheeler has announced his resignation as Head Basketball Coach effective immediately in order to begin working on special projects, programs, and activities for the university under the direction of the vice president for academic affairs and the vice president for university relations.

In his 14 years as head coach at Cal Poly Wheeler compiled a 249-139 record, a .641 winning percentage. He coached the Cal Poly freshman squad to a 41-8 record over a two-year period. His teams have participated in NCAA post-season competition five times, and in 1980-81 the Mustangs placed third in the NCAA national championships. In five of the last seven years Cal Poly teams have been ranked no. 1 by the NCAA Division II in scoring defense.

A successful high school and assistant college coach has been named interim men's basketball coach at Cal Poly. Steve Beason, who served as the Mustangs assistant coach in 1985-86, will take over the program immediately.

Beason, 30, began his coaching career at Emporia State University (Kansas), where he earned degrees in physical education and social sciences. He was an undergraduate assistant at the Kansas school, and then became coach of the local high school for the 1979-80 season. From 1981-83 he was head coach at Quivira High School in Bushton, Kansas, where he led the Cagers to a 22-2 record in 1983. He was named head coach of the year in Class A for his efforts. More recently he was the head coach at Whittier (CA) High School where his team recorded a 16-6 mark, and a first playoff appearance in 7 years. He was named coach of the year in 1985 for the Whitmont League.

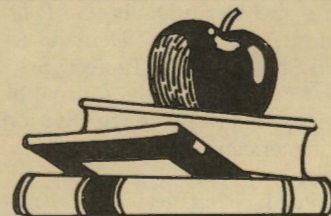
Other California schools accredited were CSU Sacramento, UC San Diego, and UC Santa Barbara.

VICE PRESIDENT FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AND SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT

The Position: The vice president for academic affairs is the chief academic officer of the university and is responsible to the president for all operations of the university relative to educational policy, academic planning, instructional programs and faculty personnel actions. The senior vice president serves as acting president in the absence of the president and is a key participant in all major university-wide policy recommending bodies.

The seven school deans and academic affairs staff report directly to the vice president for academic affairs. Other areas of responsibility include, but are not limited to: Educational Equity; Educational Services; Instructional Resources (Library and Audio-visual Services); Institutional Studies; Enrollment Support Services; Cooperative Education; Extended Education; and Graduate Studies, Research and Faculty Development.

The record should show clear evidence of: ability to make timely decisions; skill in disseminating information; commitment to collegiality; and strong support of scholarship and teaching. Additionally, the applicant should be skilled in developing and executing budgets, allocating budget resources, and evaluating programs. The candidate's educational values should be consistent with the institutional mission of Cal Poly.
