English professor to teach writing to colleagues

With the help of a three-year federal grant, an English professor hopes to teach teachers how to assign and assess writing projects.

Dr. David Kann, professor of English, has been awarded \$91,000 by the Fund for Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE), an arm of the U.S. Department of Education.

Cal Poly's award was one of about 60 from approximately 2500 applications, and was the first institutional grant to the university under the FIPSE Comprehensive Program.

"Because of a combination of a highly practical approach to technical and scientific education, a 12-unit per quarter teaching load, and a loss of contact with current writing theory, faculty in the technical and scientific disciplines assign writing as a 'product,' neglecting its uses as a means of discovery and learning in their fields," he said.

The newly funded Writing Across the Curriculum Project (WACUP — pronounced wake-up) invites 20 teachers from campus

who teach in disciplines other than English to meet four days a week for five weeks in the summer. During their stay they will listen to presentations by local experts on writing.

The outside lecturers will discuss such issues as ways of using writing as a mode of discovery of ideas; solidifying ideas; writing anxiety; and the nature of rhetoric and its uses outside of English courses. More importantly, each project member will be required to make a presentation to the group detailing a way he or she uses writing effectively in class, and to write and critique papers of his or her own.

After the initial summer workshop, local community college faculty will be encouraged to participate in the program.

Hampton/Schwartz duo to perform

The San Francisco-based artists have chosen to play Adagio and Allegro, Op. 70, by Robert Schumann; Stucke, Op. 8, by Paul Hindemith; Sonata in C Major, Op. 102, No. 1, and Sonata in A Major, Op. 69, by Beethoven; and a new piece, Rhapsody, by American composer Wayne Peterson.

A student of Pablo Casals, Hampton has participated in the Casals and Marlboro Festivals and Music from Marlboro tours. Following her debut with the San Francisco Symphony, she performed with many of the country's leading orchestras.

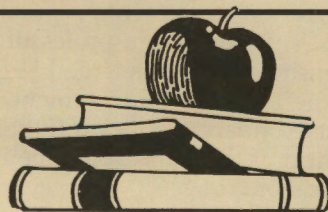
She has also performed as a guest artist with the Julliard, Guarneri, Budapest, and Griller String Quartets. She has recently joined the Sequoia String Quartet.

Formerly on the faculty of Grinnell College and Stanford University, he is presently a faculty member at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and Berkeley.
