Trustees talk about colleges

New presidents for two state colleges were approved by the Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges at their meeting here June 1 and 2.

Officially appointed to fill the position of president of San Francisco State College was Dr. John Summerskill. Los Angeles State College's presidential position will be filled by Dr. John A. Greenlee.

Other business conducted at the two-day conference included:

1. Issuing a resolution commending President McPhee on his retirement.
2. The re-appointment of consulting architects for all the state college campuses. Cal Poly's previous firm Corwin Booth and Associates, was re-appointed, as were the architects for each of the colleges.
3. Selection of two state college professors to receive the two \$1,000 "Trustees' Outstanding Professor Awards." They are Dr. Abraham P. Nassar, San Diego State College, historian, and Hudson Rowher, Cal State, Los Angeles, artist.
4. Adoption of a policy to provide better education for aspiring teachers and to help meet the current California teacher shortage.

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
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Journal honors graduating student

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Editorial

A SALUTE... In a few short weeks Julian A. McPhee will retire as president of this college. Over the past thirty-three years he has built an impressive record of accomplishment and service to California's fine educational system. In these times when colleges and universities are placing such great faith in learning the theory of some subject, President McPhee, and others of his persuasion, has caused educators to start thinking about another way of meeting the needs of the growing numbers of students in today's mass society.

In as diverse a society as ours, every institution of higher learning, be they the multiversity at Berkeley or a limited college like ours, has its place and will make its own special contribution.

The continued success of this college will be a monument to the philosophy which President McPhee fostered, as well as a testimony to the president himself.

At this time we extend our congratulations to President Julian A. McPhee for a job well done. We hope that like those of us who will soon be alumni that he will return many times to the dynamic college he helped build.

CLOSING... With this issue we close the books on *El Mustang* 1965-66. Throughout the year we covered the campus and tried to present as complete a picture of this college community as possible. As a member of the free and responsible American press we have presented all sides of the Cal Poly scene.

The attempt has been made to give some insight into the meaning of various events to our readers and to bring to their attention those things which we believe need improvement or are unhealthy on a college campus. We called the shots as we saw them. What we said was not expected to receive universal approval.

Those of us who have served in the editorial positions feel especially proud to have worked on the newspaper of this college. Over the years many of us have heard of incidents at other colleges and universities where the administration has maintained a strict censor policy. We have said that some forms of freedom of speech are restricted at this college. But nowhere will one find more avid supporters of the freedom of the press than at this college.

A new president will soon be taking over the direction of this college. We hope that as far as freedom of press is concerned that he will follow the lead of President McPhee and the other men who now serve in administrative posts.

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

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
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
