Fall Conference will open academic year

Faculty and support staff members will gather on Sept. 14, (today) for the opening of Fall Conference, the event that annually kicks off the university's Fall Quarter.

Planned during the week-long program are a keynote address by Assemblyman John Vasconcellos (D-San Jose), and a variety of activities designed to familiarize both new and returning employees with the goals and objectives of the university.

Vasconcellos, now in his 11th term in the Assembly, is chairman of that body's Ways and Means Committee, which oversees the state budget, and since 1985 has been chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee for the Review of the Master Plan for Higher Education. He is expected to discuss issues related to the master plan. A general session is planned for 10 a.m. on Monday, Sept. 14, in Chumash Auditorium of the University Union.

The university's distinguished teachers and outstanding staff employees for 1986-87 will be recognized.

Peach named head of Management Dept.

Dr. David A. Peach, associate dean for human resources at the University of Western Ontario's School of Business Administration, has been named to head the Management Dept.

He succeeds Dr. Robert H. McIntire who served as department head from 1981-1986.

Peach earned his undergraduate degree in Commerce from Ohio University, and his MBA from the same school. He earned his Doctor of Business of Administration from the Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration.

A former management development officer at Allegheny Ludlum Industries in Pittsburgh, he joined the faculty at The University of Western Ontario in 1970. During the next 17 years he held a number of positions in the School of Business Administration including chairman of the MBA Program, and chairman of the Undergraduate Program. He was appointed associate dean in 1984.

He is the co-author of books on "Grievance Initiation and Resolution: A Study in Basic Steel;" "The Practice of Industrial Relations;" and "Managing the Political/Regulatory Environment: A Study of the Business Response to the A.I.B."

Interim chairman of History Dept.

Dr. Edward L. Mayo has been named interim chairman of the History Dept. He will fill in for Dr. Max E. Riedlsperger who will be on leave during the 1987-88 academic year.

A member of the faculty since 1968, Mayo earned his undergraduate degree at Claremont's Mens College, and his Ph.D. at the Claremont Graduate School.

He served as acting department head in the spring and fall of 1984. He is currently advisor to the Golden Key Honor Society.

Mayo joined the Mozart Festival board of directors in 1982 and served as president in 1984-85, and in 1985-86.

Lt. Col. Garrett New Military Science Department head

Lt. Col. Sol M. Garrett is the new professor of military science and head of the Military Science Department at Cal Poly.

Lt. Col. Carl L. Collins, professor of military science and head of the department for the past 3 1/2 years, turned over command and control of the university's 80-member corps of cadets earlier last month.

Garrett's most recent assignment was as supply management officer for U.S. Army Europe headquarters in Heidelberg, West Germany.

The new Cal Poly department head earned an undergraduate degree in mathematics from the University of Arkansas, and a master's degree in business administration from Boston University.

A company commander in South Vietnam, Garrett, 43, held leadership positions at Ft. Riley, Kans.; Salina, Kans.; Bremerhaven, West Germany; and at the Watervliet Arsenal in Albany, N.Y.

His military awards include the Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal (three awards), and Army Commendation Medal (two awards).

Exhibition at Galerie

"When Is a Book More Than a Book?" an exhibition of finely printed books from Kennedy Library, is being held in the UU Galerie of the University Union.

The show will run through Saturday, Oct. 10. A Galerie reception is planned for Sunday, Sept. 27 from 3 to 5 pm.

The exhibition is a joint effort of the UU Galerie and the Special Collections Department of the library. Included are books designed and printed by such masters as Baskerville, Bodoni, William Morris, Victor Hammer, Daniel Berkeley Updike, the Grabhorn Brothers, and others.

In addition, the works of such contemporary book printers as Walter Hamady, Tack Stauffacher, Harry and Sandra Liddell Reese, Harry Morris, and Richard Bigus will be shown.

Most of the books on display have been set in lead type by hand and printed on hand-made or mold-made paper. Many of the books have been bound by hand and include original prints by artists Jasper Johns, Barry Moser, Clarie Van Vliet, Alan James Robinson, and Michael McCurdy.

The exhibition is the brainchild of former Cal Poly student Daniel Flanagan. It features experimental and classic typography, fine bindings, wood engravings, etchings, and lithographs.

Flanagan and Mary Weaver of the Special Collection Dept. will be at the Sept. 27 reception to discuss the collection. Hours are Monday through Wednesday, 10 am to 5 pm; Thursday, 10 am to 8 pm; Friday, 10 am to 4 pm, and weekends, noon to 4 pm.

IMDC schedules open house for Wednesday

The Instructional Materials Display Center (IMDC) of the Kennedy Library will host an Open House on Wednesday (Sept. 16).

The program, from 3-5 pm, is designed for teachers, school administrative personnel and school board members from Paso Robles to Santa Maria.

IMDCs have been established throughout California to serve as centers of community participation in the instructional materials adoption process of the State Board of Education.

Most of the centers are located in offices of the county superintendent of schools as well as area colleges and universities.

Currently under consideration for state adoption in 1987 are K-8 mathematics textbooks. Already approved is a state framework for English-Language Arts.

Available for review are model curriculum guides for English-Language Arts (K-8), Mathematics (K-8), and a draft of model curriculum standards and frameworks for Industrial Technology (grades 7-12), and History-Social Sciences (K-12).

As part of the orientation to the Cal Poly center, participants will receive a list of new State Department of Education publications, a selective guide to education periodicals received by the Kennedy Library, and a guide to educational software available from the center.

Electronic deposit of checks possible

Beginning this month, Cal Poly employees will have the option of having their net pay wired directly to their banking institution through the State of California's electronic Direct Deposit Payment Program. Most banks, savings and loan associations, and credit unions are ready to accept the electronic transfer. An informational brochure was sent to each employee in late August outlining the eligibility criteria for enrollment in the program. All eligible employees are encouraged to enroll in the program. In addition to the advantage of speeding up the

deposit of each employee's pay, the program will also reduce staff time in handling and distributing pay warrants and earnings statements. Under the electronic system, employees will receive a Direct Deposit Advice form on payday which will also serve as an earnings statement. It is anticipated that the manual direct deposit system will be phased out by January.

'The Debater's Guide'

In 1961 the Southern Illinois University Press published "The Debater's Guide," by Jon M. Ericson and James J. Murphy. Ericson was assistant professor and debate coach at Stanford University, and Murphy held a similar position at Princeton University. The book went through 14 printings from 1961 through 1985. A revised edition has just been published and Raymond (Bud) Zeuschner, Speech Communication, has become a co-author of a book the publisher calls "an established classic." Ericson is now the dean of the School of Liberal Arts, and Murphy is a professor at UC Davis.
