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Final candidate for dean of engineering post scheduled

The final candidate for the dean of engineering position is scheduled to meet with campus officials next week.

Dr. William J. Grenney, professor and head of the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Utah State University, will be on campus March 15 and 16.

An informal reception will be held on Tuesday, March 15, in the Faculty/Staff Dining Room from 3:30-4:30 pm.

Faculty, staff, and students of the School of Engineering are encouraged to attend the informal reception to meet and ask questions of the candidate.

State historian will discuss Hearst Castle

State historian Robert C. Pavlik will discuss Hearst Castle at a special Cal Poly Library Associates program on Sunday, March 20.

The program at noon is in the Special Collections Department on the fourth floor of the library. It is a joint effort with the Library Associates of Cal State Fresno.

"Something a Little Different: Rethinking History and Historic Preservation at Hearst Castle" is the topic of Pavlik's talk. A member of the Hearst San Simeon State Historical Monument staff, he previously worked as a historian for the National Park Service at Yosemite National Park.

Hearst San Simeon State Historical Monument, better known as Hearst Castle, has been a part of the California State Park System for the past 30 years. The State of

California is responsible for its maintenance, upkeep, protection, and interpretation.

In 1976 the main building, guest houses, pools, and grounds were listed on the National Register of Historic Places and designated a National Historic Landmark.

Pavlik noted that "it is important to recognize that the entire complex, including utilitarian out-buildings and structures, is within our interpretive purview and historical scope. While they may not be as spectacular as the main complex, they too are an integral part of the history of the Hearst ranch."

He will present a brief overview of the history of the hilltop, with a special emphasis on the state's stewardship, the duties and responsibilities of maintaining a historical monument, and why there is a rethinking of the approach to the castle's history.

A special Julia Morgan exhibit will be on display. The program is free, and the public is invited.

"Developmental Readiness: The Effect on Curriculum and Children" is a day-long symposium planned for Saturday, April 9.

The program, in Chumash Auditorium, will be sponsored by the San Luis Obispo chapter of the Tri-Counties Association for the Education of Young Children and the Cal Poly Human Development Club.

Dr. Doris O. Smith, coordinator of Early Childhood Education at Cal State Fresno, will be the keynote speaker. She is a member of the State Department of Education Task Force on School Readiness.

Another featured speaker will be Dr. Douglas L. Major, who will discuss "Visual Skills for Academic Success." He is in charge of the San Luis Obispo County school visual screening program.

Library dean testifies before subcommittee

Should the United States ratify an international copyright law?

That was the question addressed by the dean of library services when he testified before a U.S. House of Representatives subcommittee.

Dr. David B. Walch represented the American Library Association before the Subcommittee on Courts, Civil Liberties, and the Administration of Justice.

A member of the Copyright Subcommittee of the ALA Legislation Committee, Walch told the lawmakers that the nation's librarians have had a long-term concern over copyright laws and were heavily involved in the deliberations that led up to the general revision of the law in 1976.

Walch cited a number of issues that adherence to the Berne Convention would precipitate. Questions concerning notice of copyright, registration, deposit, and new technology were raised by the Cal Poly administrator.

Highest rating for Kennedy Library unit

The Government Documents and Map Depository at the Kennedy Library has received the highest rating possible from the U.S. Government Printing Office.

The "excellent" rating in all categories was matched by only four other libraries in the United States.

Cal Poly has maintained a comprehensive collection of federal documents and United States Geological Survey maps for nearly two decades.

At present Cal Poly has 3730 or 53 percent of the items offered by the U.S. Government Printing Office. The library has acquired numerous indexes to facilitate access to the documents collection including several data bases.
