Farm workshop in Little Theater

An estimated 200 persons are here today attending the Pacific Southwest Food Production Workshop.

Guest speakers for the event are William Hicks, safety director for Douglas Oil Company of California; Owen Servatius, head of the Business Administration Department; and Richard Leach, head of the Poultry Department.

Registration for the two-day workshop, which is being sponsored jointly by the college and the California Food and Grain Association, started yesterday.

James Parker of the California Pallet Company, Modesto, is chairman of the workshop committee and presided over the opening session.

Following a welcoming address by J. H. Jansen of Lincoln, president of the food and grain organization, Hicks talked on "Safety in the Mill," and a film on handling of molasses was shown.

Seven workshops were held. Topics were: "Insect and Rodent Control," "Food Ingredient Flow

Control," "Simplified Low Pressure Air Conveying," "Molasses Handling Hardware," "Mobile Hydraulics - Application and Maintenance," "Flighttype Chain Drag Conveyors in Screw Conveyor Troughs," and "Moisture Testing of Feed Ingredients."

The Elk Club was the center of activity on Thursday evening. Following a social hour, a banquet meeting with entertainment was held.

A general session was held at 8:30 a.m. Friday in the Little Theater during which Servatius and Leach were the principal speakers. Servatius discussed "Handling People to Achieve Maximum Efficiency," and Leach described the World Poultry Congress which he attended in Moscow last fall.

Course changes studied by Anglos

"Learn by doing" will continue to be the dominant philosophy in the Agriculture Division, but the division has accepted a challenge to upgrade its curriculum, according to assistant dean Gordon Gibson.

The challenge came as a result of a visit to the campus by a four man commission on education in agriculture and natural resources. Gibson says, "On the whole, the commission was very pleased with what we are doing. They told us not to change our philosophy and become like everyone else. However, some improvements were suggested."

Gibson believes that the Animal Husbandry Department benefited most from the visit.

The report suggested that basic skills be strengthened, and more practical research be done in the field. Possible improvements are now being studied such as an advanced nutrition course and more management courses.

Gibson explained that many of the suggested improvements would require state funds. These include modernizing the livestock units, increasing the staff and office help, and raising salaries.

"The committee was very impressed with the Food Processing Building, agricultural enterprise program, and the center project requirements."

Evaluation goes ahead

Faculty evaluations meant to be a valid concept at this college. Responding to the ABE referendum, in which 78.5 per cent of those who voted felt that this is a valid concept, the Student Affairs Council agreed the evaluation committee to conduct a faculty survey on a voluntary basis for publication, and urged those faculty members not wishing to participate to conduct their own evaluations.

It was generally agreed by SAC that this plan should be implemented. The point of controversy was whether or not these evaluations should include every instructor, and whether or not these results should be published.

SAC finally resolved to conduct faculty evaluations on a voluntary basis with mandatory publication.

Evaluation chairman Gary Whitney contended that the survey should be taken for only those instructors who wanted to have their evaluations published.

The basic issues revolve around the students right of choice. Mike Elliott, ABE President, said, "No one can deny the right of the students to question the caliber of their education, and no one can deny the students the right to choose which faculty members they wish to study under."

"From this action the right of

the students to question instruction, and to ask for evaluation by the majority of the faculty, would destroy the idea of an evaluation by faculty and students. Evaluation both ways are very good," Elliott said.

"The following voluntary survey will be conducted by the Student Affairs Council. The survey will be taken for only those instructors who want to have their evaluations published. The results will be published in the Mustang."

Faculty members win fellowship

For the second year, a Cal Poly faculty member won the National Science Foundation's Faculty Fellowship. Dr. Robert L. Smith, a chemistry professor, was awarded a \$10,000 fellowship to study at the University of California, San Francisco.

In competition with other faculty members from other colleges, Smith was selected as the recipient of the fellowship. He will spend the next year at UCSF studying the chemical structure of proteins.

Smith, who is currently on leave from the chemistry department, has been a faculty member at Cal Poly since 1963. He has been a member of the American Chemical Society and the American Association of University Professors.

Last year the Association of University Professors awarded a \$1,000 fellowship to Smith to study at the University of California, San Francisco. He was the only faculty member to receive this fellowship.

Johnson tells wish for peace

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson told Pope Paul VI Wednesday he devoutly shares the Pope's wish for a new year's truce extension which "may open the way to negotiations" for peace in Vietnam.

"The governments of the United States and the Republic of Vietnam together with others are devoting intensive efforts to his end," Johnson said in a message replying to the Pope's call for a truce extension.

The President said, however, that he knew the Pope "would not expect us to reduce military action unless the other side is willing to do likewise."

"We are prepared to discuss the balanced reduction in military activities, the cessation of hostilities, no-compulsory arrangements which could lead to these results," the President said.

He added that "we shall continue our efforts for a peaceful and honorable settlement until they are crowned with success."

The White House made public late in the afternoon the Johnson reply, which it said was mailed shortly before 5 p.m. EST.

Johnson said he deeply appreciated the message the Pope had sent him. He said it was "a great source of spiritual strength."

"I devoutly share your wish that the suspension of hostilities over the lunar new year may be extended and may open the way for negotiations for a just and stable peace," Johnson said.

The President noted that the South Vietnamese government "has twice signaled its readiness to discuss an extension of the truce with representatives of the other side."

"We are prepared to talk at any time and place, in any forum, with the object of bringing peace to Vietnam," Johnson told the Pope.

The White House would not amplify Johnson's message, but it announced that Secretary of State Dean Rusk will hold a news conference at 4 p.m. EST, Thursday, which will be "open for full coverage" by live radio and television.

It is unusual for the White House to make announcements of Rusk's news conference. This indicates that the White House might be playing more than usual importance on it.

'Devil's Disguise' set for March

Nationalists are well under way for the three act play "The Devil's Disguise" to be produced March 2, 3 and 4 in the Little Theater. The play, a production by George Bernard Shaw, is being directed by William Smith, English and Speech instructor. He is being assisted by Mike Sullivan, a freshman English major, who is stage manager. The play was cast on January 18 with 60 people being selected for parts.

The plot centers around the Revolutionary War period in United States, and a controversial character, Edmund Burke. Burke, called the "Devil's Disguise" by his disapproving family, declares he being an individual. He is a man of letters.

His independence and courage, despite the dangers from a wartime crisis, will be depicted by Bill Sullivan, junior drama major.

Other principal characters include a young woman played by Tim Korman, senior English major; his wife, Judith, played by Ann Smith, sophomore English major; and Burke's mother, played by Judy Cox, the wife of a faculty member. College prepares to limit enrollment if instructed

In a special statement to El Mustang, Dr. Dale W. Andrews, vice president and chief executive officer, states the college's position on possible enrollment priorities.

"Along with the sound and the fury of the past several weeks as far as budgets and admission of new students to the state colleges, Cal Poly has been faced with the necessity of anticipating various situations that might present themselves as far as the 1967-68 academic year is concerned. Among these is the possible prospect of having to establish a system of limiting the over-all enrollment of new students."

"The college is prepared to limit enrollment during 1967-68 if it is instructed to do so. I have approved a system of priorities for admission of new students that was proposed by the Planning and Enrollment Growth Committee, a standing committee of the college, and endorsed by the Executive Council."

"This priority system calls for our accepting new applications for admission within the various instructional curricula of the college in chronological order. Assuming that we will be able to accommodate 7,500 students in the fall, the numbers of such applications received are planned in an over-all college pattern as to produce target actual enrollments of 1,100 new transfer students and 1,350 new first-time freshmen students for the Fall Quarter."

"The numbers of applications to be accepted in each major to produce these target enrollments will be based on recommendations of the PEO Committee, which has made concentrated studies and developed such data for use in admission and enrollment matters over the past two years."

"In addition, provision is made in the system of priorities for incorporation of any modifications that might become appropriate. If they become necessary, such modifications would be determined in light of the action of the California Administrative Code which applies to college admissions."

No paper

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Basketball prepares for second round action

As the Mustang round ballers prepare for their second swing through the California Collegiate Athletic Association, all the ingredients are there for a basketball soap opera.

Will the Mustangs find more happiness the second time around? The answer to the query will be coming up tonight, Saturday, and next week on coach Stu Chestnut's clash with the road to face San Fernando Valley at Northridge tonight, then visit Cal State Los Angeles on Saturday.

Next week the Mustangs will be the visiting club when Westmont College comes into town for a non-league tilt. Then on Friday, they will be entertaining San Diego State with Cal State Long Beach coming in Saturday.

It was against the Mustangs that the Mustangs pocketed their lone CCAA victory in the first half of the league action. That 58-51 triumph ended San Fernando's unbeaten string at nine games. Wins over the Diablos and Cal State Long Beach put the Mustangs in a third place tie, a notch ahead of the Mustangs and Long Beach.

Can Lou Rogers continue to give the Chestnutmen the solid hard play necessary to turn things around? The answer will be an emphatic "yes" if he can come up with efforts that mirror Fullerton. In his first starting assignment the gangling sophomore bailed down 18 rebounds and potted in 14 points. The Mustangs won 97-77 to send its season's mark to 9-4 and Rogers provided much of the spark that got the job done.

Will the nationally-ranked players play up to par this week-end? The Mustangs offer forward Mike LaRoche who is well on his way to becoming the highest scoring player in Mustang ranks. He scored 44th in NCAA College Division scoring with a 38.6 average going into last week's game. His 27-point blast lifted his average to 34.6 and undoubtedly improved his position nationally.

With 614 points already in the bank the 6-4 Western junior owns the sixth best point total ever accumulated by a Mustang dribbler. And he has six games in which to take aim at Rally Rounsville's school record of 478 markers. La Roche is almost a cinch to set a record for the best scoring average. Rounsville's 21.6 net during the 1961-62 campaign is the target.

The Mustangs will go against a pair of nationally-ranked players this weekend. San Fernando's Ben Williams was 16th in the latest NCAA field goal percentage charts. The 6-5 Williams has connected on 61.3 per cent of his field goal efforts this season. Oddly enough in league play he does not rank in the top 10.

The Diablos' 6-6 forward Charlie Thomas not only leads

30.3 average at the midway point in league play but he rates 18th nationally with an average harvest of 17.7 in his team's last 10 games. He blasted down 25 in LA's 88-79 win in January.

"Valley will be tough to handle in their own hall," commented Chestnut. There'll be something from the debut we handed them last month and I expect a real

tough game. I expect us to play as well as we did in our first meeting. We'll have to. We took over on the boards in the second half and that was the difference."

Mulling over his team's third meeting with the Diablos, Chestnut said, "We cannot let them intimidate us on the boards again. Both games have been close and have been won in the end by their stronger board play." LA won 88-79 in the semi of the Eric Kringle Classic.

Commenting on the Mustangs' 20-point win over Fullerton, Chestnut allowed that "The boys reacted as I had expected. They came out hustling, worked the boards hard and turned the game into a rout early, and then relaxed. I was hoping we could show more consistency after we'd broken things open, however."

Chestnut noted that "LaRoche rebounded somewhat better (18) and we needed him to board if we are to be strong the rest of the way."

CCAA title on line tonight

The CCAA conference wrestling title will be on the line tonight when coach Vaughan Hitchcock's matmen travel to Fresno State to meet the Bulldogs at 8 p.m.

Hitchcock sees the Bulldogs as the only threat to stop the galloping Mustangs trek to their sixth straight conference crown. "There's no doubt in my mind that we will defeat everyone else in the league as so will they. The team that wins tonight will be the champ," asserted Hitchcock.

There's plenty of evidence Hitchcock figures Fresno to be a serious threat to his team's CCAA mat domination. Last week he purposely held out 123 pound John Garcia and 145 pound Kent Wyatt from competing against LA State and San Diego State because of minor injuries. Garcia boasts a 1-0 dual and 4-0 overall record while Wyatt supports a 4-1-1 dual record and an overall mark of 7-1-1.

National champ Donnie Downing is definitely lost for this match and is likely to miss two more weeks of action.

One encouraging note is that there is a possibility that undefeated heavyweight Tom Kline might make the trip and wrestle if the chance arises. Kline still has his hand in a partial cast and needs a medical okay from Dr. James concerning his broken hand before he can compete.

"I would feel a lot better if Kline could compete against Fresno but we won't know until the late minutes whether he can compete," spoke Hitchcock.

For the first time this season, Dean Hilger will drop to 160 pounds. He had been wrestling 167 pounds and sports a 4-0-1 dual slate and 8-2-1 overall record.

Much improved Terry Wigglesworth will vie with Fresno's top wrestler, Mike Gallego at 167.

Gallego last weekend took first at the Naval Training Center Tournament in San Diego. To date, Wigglesworth has a 4-1 dual and 6-3 overall record.

Rounding out the Mustang lineup will be Jesse Flores at 150, Tom Miles at 137, team captain John Miller at 152 and John Woods at 177. Flores owns an 11-3 overall record with a 6-2 mark in duals while Mike has a 3-2 dual mark and a 8-4 overall.

Miller is the only undefeated member on the squad which strings to 7-0. His season mark is 13-1. Woods will take a 5-1-3 dual slate and 10-8-2.

Hitchcock called Miller and Wigglesworth "the most improved" wrestlers on the team. "Miller has more moves than he did a year ago and he's giving our squad excellent leadership."

Tomorrow Hitchcock's wrestlers will have two tough matches coming against Berkeley and Western Washington State. Both matches will be held at Berkeley with the Mustangs facing Cal at 7 p.m. and Washington at 9.

Wrestling action will return to the Mustangs' mat next Friday night when top Oregon State comes to town. The Beavers recently lost a close 18-14 decision to No. 1 rated Portland State.
