

Building named after former P.E. head

The Physical Education Building has been renamed after former Physical Education Department Head Robert A. Mott. The proposal has been approved by the CSU board of trustees.

Now known as the Robert A. Mott Physical Education Building, the structure houses offices and classrooms of the Physical Education and Recreation Administration Department, offices of the Intercollegiate Athletics Department, and a 4000-seat gymnasium.

It also includes a human performance laboratory, a training room for treatment of sports injuries, locker rooms, and other support facilities for physical education, recreation, and sports activities.

During his 31 years as head of the Cal Poly PE Department, Mott served on overseas assignments with projects of the university in Zambia, Uganda, Somalia, and Ethiopia; was head baseball coach; and was instrumental in establishing a series of summer workshops for PE and coaching professionals that has become a model for similar programs throughout the nation. Last year he was named to the Cal Poly Athletic Hall of Fame.

The request that the CSU trustees rename the building in Mott's honor came from President Baker. It was based on recommendations from faculty of the Physical Education Department and by the Academic Senate and Campus Planning Committee.

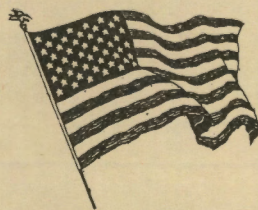
tion, and a credit course in physics will be among the course topics when students in grades 7 - 12 begin the 1988 Young Scholars Program on Monday, June 20.

Performing Arts Center receives trustees approval

A \$20 million Performing Arts Center on the Cal Poly campus moved a step closer to reality when the CSU board of trustees approved the concept.

The facility is a cooperative effort of the City of San Luis Obispo, the non-profit Foundation for the Performing Arts Center, and the university.

About three years ago the City of San Luis Obispo commissioned a consultant to study the feasibility of providing a performing arts facility within the community. The study explored a number of possibilities. The final recommendation called for a large performing arts facility on the campus.

Following the consultant's recommendation, a group of private citizens in the city and county formed a non-profit corporation, the Foundation for the Performing Arts Center, with the expressed goal of raising a portion of the funding for the facility from private donors.

During the past two years, representatives of the city, the foundation, and Cal Poly have been meeting and working with representatives of the Chancellor's Office to develop an agreement.

The facility will include a 1500-seat auditorium, warm-up rooms for music and dance, dressing rooms, offices, and audio-recording and editing rooms.

The state will contribute approximately \$13 million, while the city, and the foundation will raise \$8 million. Current plans call for construction to begin in July 1991 with completion in 1993.

Kierkegaard subject of May 27 lecture

The paradoxical religious ideas of Soren Kierkegaard will be the subject of a lecture on Friday, May 27.

Dr. Van A. Harvey, the George Burnell Professor of Religious Studies at Stanford University, will examine "The Mystery of Kierkegaard" at noon in UU 220.

The talk is sponsored by the Philosophy Department and the School of Liberal Arts.

Harvey is known as one of the country's foremost scholars of religious philosophy. He has written many books and articles on a variety of subjects, ranging from the hermeneutics of religious symbolism, through the "ethics of belief" controversy, to the crisis of spiritual alienation produced by modern secularism.

His best known book is "The Historian and the Believer," in which he explores the intellectual conflicts resulting from the apparently incompatible criteria of truth employed by professional historians as opposed to the religiously devout.

Harvey will discuss the mind-bending, and at times, even defiantly irrational religious doctrines espoused by Kierkegaard, the important Christian existentialist thinker of the 19th century.

'Thank you' concert by Symphonic Band

A "Thank You" concert for the supporters of the Symphonic Band will be held on Friday, June 10. Opening with the national anthems of the United States and Japan, the program will mark the culmination of all of the band's preparation for a two-week tour of Japan.

The 60-member Symphonic Band, under the baton of William Johnson of the Music Dept. faculty, will play at 8 pm in Chumash Auditorium.

Clarinetist Virginia Wright, and Tony Clements on tuba, will be

the guest soloists. Wright and Clements will be accompanying the Cal Poly contingent to Japan.

Baritone LeRoy Villanueva, winner of the 1988 Metropolitan Opera Auditions in New York City, will be the guest artist at the Cal Poly Choirs spring concert on Friday, June 3.

The program, at 8 pm in the sanctuary of Mount Carmel Lutheran Church in San Luis Obispo, will also feature the Cal Poly Women's Chorus, Men's Chorus, and University Singers.

Susan Azaret Davies and members of the San Luis Obispo County Symphony will accompany the singers. Dr. Thomas Davies, a member of the Music Department faculty, will direct the proceedings.

Villanueva has emerged as one of the brightest new talents on the operatic scene. In addition to his success in New York, he won the National Opera Association Auditions, Palm Springs Opera Guild competition, and the Los Angeles chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing competition. The combined Cal Poly choirs will join with Villanueva and the members of the San Luis Obispo County Symphony in a performance of Ralph Vaughan Williams' "Five Mystical Songs." The Women's Chorus will be heard in Gabriel Faure's "Messe Bass."

'Technology Teaching' seminars to be shown

The seminar "Teaching with Technology," presented by Dr. William H. Graves, will be available for viewing by interested faculty and staff. The videoconference, which was transmitted via satellite on May 13, will be shown: May 31 — 12-2 pm in Fisher Sci. 292, and 3-5 pm in Admin. 301; June 1 — 1-3 pm in Fisher Sci. 292; and June 2 — 11 am-1 pm in Admin. 301.

Graves is a professor of mathematics at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Initiating a highly successful "across the curriculum" effort to develop PC-based teaching and learning software at his home institution, he was designated by IBM as a "Consulting Scholar." In his role as consultant, Graves was the subject of a March 2, 1988, article in the *Chronicle of Higher Education*.

Graves will demonstrate software in different areas of the curriculum — from history to mathematics — on the way in which instructional technologies can strengthen teaching and learning, and he will discuss what institutional policies, faculty development programs, and support services are most likely to integrate technology into the curriculum.

Fee reductions for graduates taxable

The fee reductions for graduate level courses taken under the Fee Waiver Program must now be reported by Cal Poly to the IRS as taxable income.

Prior to Jan. 1, 1988, all benefits under the CSU Fee Waiver Program were sheltered from many tax consequences.

Section 117(d) of the Tax Code allowed educational institutes to waive undergraduate course fees for employees without creating

any taxable income. Section 128 of the Tax Code provided a general exclusion from income for the value of any educational assistance provided by an employer.

Section 128 expired on Jan. 1, and Congress has failed to enact an extension.

Therefore, in accordance with procedures to be established by the Controller's Office, fee reduction amounts for graduate level courses will be reported to the IRS.

Natatorium hiatus

Construction to replace and upgrade the mechanical and electrical equipment in the Natatorium will necessitate the closure of the pool for the summer. Work will begin June 13 which will require draining the pool on June 11. The scheduled reopening date is Sept. 16. This modification will bring the pool up to the latest safety and health standards. A state-of-the-art filtration/chemical water control system will be installed, which will increase the water recirculation rate.
