Placement Center plans peer counselor program

Faculty and staff — your help is needed! The Student Employment Office of the Placement Center is looking for students in all majors who are interested in serving as peer counselors. Selected individuals will enroll in the peer helper training class Spring Quarter and start their field experience as part of the student employment staff Fall Quarter. Proposed credit (2-3 units/quarter) will be awarded on a credit/no-credit basis.

Peer counselors will help students find summer and part-time jobs. They also can provide career information (e.g., resume preparation, cover letter construction, job search strategies, etc.). In exchange, it is hoped that the peer counselors will be better prepared to make their own career decisions as they explore particular areas of interest.

Schedules of six to eight hours/week will be set up according to each peer counselor's class and activity schedule and will be adhered to throughout the quarter. A one-year minimum commitment is required.

Book by Poly dean sees threat to American business

Dean of Business Kenneth D. Walters has co-authored a book which warns that American business might not be able to compete with the growing state-owned companies of other countries.

The book, titled ''Nationalized Companies: A Threat to American Business,'' is published by McGraw-Hill. It is garnering critical acclaim throughout the United States and Europe.

Walters and co-author R. Joseph Monsen, professor of business at the University of Washington, note that capitalism is changing rapidly in Western Europe and in many other parts of the world because of the expansion and growing number of state-owned companies. The book argues that nationalized companies, though less efficient than private companies, pose a competitive challenge to private firms because governments subsidize them so heavily.

"Nationalized Companies" was praised by the Wall Street Journal, which reported that the book provided a wealth of data and was "must reading" for anyone interested in the debate over whether the U.S. should adopt an "industrial policy," as some presidential candidates are advocating.

Poly Royal queen, court chosen


