## Arts consultant to meet with Cal Poly, community leaders

A nationally-known arts consultant will be in San Luis Obispo from Sunday, Nov. 18 through Tuesday, Nov. 20, to meet with Cal Poly and community leaders.

James Wockenfuss, artistic director of the Hancher Auditorium at the University of Iowa and past-president of the Association of College, University and Community Arts Administrators, will be featured in an open forum on Monday, Nov. 19. The program, from 3-5 pm in Room 218 of the Music Building, will be titled "The University, the Community and the Arts."

Raymond Zeuchner, professor of speech communications and Cal Poly forensics coach, will be the program moderator. All members of the university community as well as those interested in the arts from the San Luis Obispo area are welcome.

After viewing campus and community cultural facilities, Wockenfuss will meet with a Cal Poly committee considering a proposal to establish an organizational entity—a Center for the Arts. It would facilitate arts programming and funding at the university.

On Monday, the visiting consultant will meet with another campus committee considering a proposal to establish a campus office of lectures and concerts. In addition, Wockenfuss will meet with another campus group reviewing arts facilities, past and present.

On Tuesday, Nov. 20, Wockenfuss will take part in a series of meetings with community leaders interested in the arts.

The consultant's visit is sponsored by the School of Communicative Arts and Humanities, and coordinated by Bessie Swanson, head of the Music Department.

## \$360,000 advance approved for intercollegiate athletics

A \$360,000 advance to shore up the university's intercollegiate athletics program was approved by the board of directors of the Cal Poly Foundation.

University President Warren J. Baker said the advance would be used to (1) repay a 1983 advance from the foundation, (2) eliminate the existing athletics scholarship trust deficit, and (3) cover unfunded athletics scholarships for 1984-85.

In agreeing to the advance, the foundation board authorized an amortization schedule that will depend upon income raised from athletic development sources, but is limited to six years.

Additionally, President Baker announced a \$150,000-per-year cap on scholarship funding. The figure, approximately \$95,000 less than the amount awarded for 1984-85, was determined after a full-scale review by Development Office staff of the intercollegiate program.

## Mainframe to micro connection offered by MTS

Microcomputer and Telecommunication Systems (MTS) now has ready for release Remote Micro Facility (RMF) for the IBM PC and compatibles. This program allows an IBM PC to work as a terminal to the computer systems at Cal Poly and to transfer files to and from the Cal Poly Cyber and the PC. The package consists of a floppy disk with the program, a short user guide, and a reference manual. The software and user guide do not require a license and may be distributed to students, faculty and staff.

MTS will distribute on a one-time basis one copy of the software and the user guide to each administrative or instructional department that so requests. Please submit to MTS (Building 14-114, ext. 1295) a floppy that has been formatted for an IBM PC and allow three days for return. A copy of the user guide and the reference manual will be in the library reserve room under MTS-RMF for IBM PC.

MTS will soon be releasing RMF for Apples and other micros.

## Procedural changes in the tax sheltered annuity program

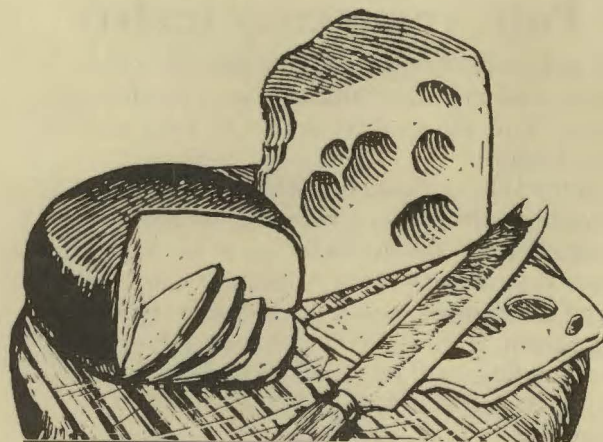
Tax sheltered annuity/deferred compensation plans are available through payroll deduction to California State University employees. The tax sheltered annuity/deferred compensation plans enable employees to set aside savings from their salary with no federal or state income taxes being paid on the amount saved or on any interest earned.

As these funds accumulate in investments and savings on the employee's behalf, the possibility of financial independence at retirement increases. Federal and state taxes will only be payable when the accumulated funds are actually paid to an employee or beneficiary. These funds are usually withdrawn after retirement, when the taxpayer is often in a lower income bracket and therefore qualifies for lower tax rates.

In order to participate in the tax sheltered annuity (TSA) program, employees must be in a full time position. Recent changes in systemwide practices for the tax sheltered annuity program have required changes in the Personnel Office procedure for accepting and processing forms from employees. Effective immediately, the following procedures will be required when submitting an application for reduction of salary under a TSA:

1. When establishing an account with a TSA company, the employee must obtain written confirmation from the home office of the TSA company indicating that the employee's application has been processed and that a policy or account number has been established which will be used to identify the employee's funds when received from the CSU. Either a copy of the contract or a letter on company letterhead is acceptable. Confirmation from the agent with whom the employee has been meeting is not sufficient.
2. The employee must sign a Salary Reduction Agreement, which is a contract between the Trustees and the employee (not between the company and the employee) authorizing that monies be deducted from the paycheck and sent to a specified TSA company. Only one action per taxable year is permitted and the agreement cannot be terminated until it has been in effect for at least six pay periods. Salary Reduction Agreements are available in the Personnel Office or from TSA agents.
3. The Salary Reduction Agreement and written confirmation from the TSA company must be received by the Personnel Office no later than the first of a month in order for the deduction to be taken on the next paycheck (i.e., Dec. 1 deadline for deduction from Jan. 1 check).
4. The minimum TSA monthly salary deduction has been changed from \$10 to \$25 per company.

These additional steps have been added to protect the employee's investment and forestall some of the processing problems that have been encountered. The Personnel Office has compiled an update highlighting eligibility criteria, enrollment procedures, and conditions of participation for the tax sheltered annuity/deferred compensation programs. ## Rihal takes part in 2 international programs

Dr. Satwant Rihal of Cal Poly's Architectural Engineering Department was an invited participant and presented a paper at an international conference on earthquake engineering Oct. 8-11 in New Delhi, India.

The International Conference on Natural Hazards Mitigation Research and Practice — Small Buildings and Community Development was sponsored by the National Science Foundation; the International Council for Building Research, Studies and Documentation (CIB); the University of Illinois' Building Research Council; and the government of India. Cal Poly's newly appointed dean of architecture and environmental design, Gar Day Ding, served as co-chairman of the conference.

Rihal's paper was titled "Structural Form and Configuration-Based Techniques of Improvement of the Earthquake Performance of Low-Quality Masonry Buildings." It dealt with his work on a current NSF-funded U.S.-India collaborative research project on strengthening masonry buildings in seismic areas.

Rihal also was among a group of American scientists and engineers who visited the University of Roorkee, India, Oct. 11-12 for discussions of the project.

Fellow Cal Poly Architectural Engineering Professor John Edmisten is Rihal's associate on the project.
