Chevron grants \$5,000 fellowship to engineering instructor

With a first-of-its-kind grant, Chevron Corp. has donated \$5,000 to enable an engineering instructor to complete his doctoral degree.

Terry Stanhope, an associate professor in the Electronic and Electrical Engineering Department, will use the grant to help him finish work on his doctorate in the area of signal processing at University of California, Santa Barbara. His specialty is speech processing research — studying ways to make machines understand speech, and the high-speed processing of speech information.

President Warren Baker said the innovative donation is a step toward solving the pressing need for professional development of engineering faculty members. He said faculty fellowships such as the Chevron grant also could help alleviate the national shortage of engineering teachers.

Carroll D. Price II, Cal Poly director of development for the past four years, has announced his resignation effective March 31. He has accepted the position of director of development at the Baptist Hospital in Miami, Florida.

Dr. James L. Strom, Cal Poly's vice president for university relations, said, "The university has benefited greatly from Carroll's fund raising expertise, and I have valued his advice on a number of major projects.

"He is a talented individual who has made significant contributions to Cal Poly's development program."

The 42-year-old Pennsylvania native earned two degrees from Pennsylvania State University. At Penn State he served as director of gifts and development for University Arts Services and as administrator for the land and water institute.

Before coming to Cal Poly, Price was director of development for the School of Music at the University of Miami. Recently he was awarded the designation of Certified Fund Raising Executive by the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

National Poison Prevention Week being marked

Each year, 300,000 people are disabled from accidental poisoning and another 3,000 people die, according to the National Safety Council. In an effort to increase awareness of such accidents, the Department of Public Safety is inviting the community to participate in National Poison Prevention Week (March 17-23).

The following techniques are recommended to prevent three-fifths of all poisonings — poisonings which happen to children under the age of five.

- Store all household cleaning products high and away from a child's reach. Lock up all toxic products.
- Keep products in their original containers, and be sure the content label is legible.
- Store all medicines separately from household products, and never take medicine in front of children. Teach children the dangers of taking someone's medicine.
- Never tell children that medicine is candy — they may seek it out later. Make sure all medicine containers are child-resistant and closed properly.
- Keep syrup of ipecac at home for emergencies, however, use it only with the advice of a poison control center, hospital emergency department, or a physician.
- Keep the telephone number of your local poison control center (800-662-9886) near the phone. Have the poison container in your hand when you call for help so you can describe what your child has swallowed.

Practitioners of the glass arts to be on campus

Students looking for community service projects

The Associated Students Inc., is looking for individuals and community organizations that could use able-bodied workers for an afternoon.

The second annual "Good Neighbor Day" is scheduled from noon to 4 pm, Saturday, April 13. During that time students representing many of the university's 350 student clubs will do odd jobs that have been requested through the ASI office.

"We're primarily focusing on the elderly and handicapped and other individuals or groups who, for whatever reason, feel they need help," said ASI President Kevin Creighton.

Ideal projects are those that would take two or more people from one to three hours to complete. Examples include simple home repair and maintenance chores, clean-up, small yard projects, washing pets, planting flowers, moving, or washing a car.

Creighton said he expects at least 500 students to help out during "Good Neighbor Day." They will provide the labor. Materials, supplies and tools must be furnished by the party receiving assistance.

Educational trip to China scheduled for June

Two Cal Poly faculty members will lead a 19-day educational trip to China and Inner Mongolia in June to introduce participants to both traditional Chinese culture and modern China.

Led by Robert Burton, head of the History Department, and Sarah Shien-Hwei Niu, associate librarian, the travelers will fly to Hong Kong and then take a train to Canton. The tour will cover approximately 2500 miles, traversing China from Guilin in the south to Hohhot, Mongolia, north of the Great Wall.

In addition to visiting famous sites and historic locales, the excursion will focus on seeing the Chinese at work in communes and factories, as well as participating in evening cultural performances.

Burton, who teaches Chinese history, previously traveled in China in 1982 and 1984. Ms. Niu was born in Nanjing, China, and has taught Mandarin Chinese at several universities.

The tour, for which course credit may be earned, costs \$3250 per person, and is scheduled to depart June 20.
