### 'Mane Event' theme of Homecoming

Cal Poly is asking alumni and friends to "saddle up" for Homecoming 1985. With "The Mane Event" as its theme, this roundup of fun is scheduled to take place Oct. 17-20.

A special invitation is extended to all classes ending in a "5" or "0," with special recognition being given to the 1985 Homecoming's golden and silver anniversary alumni — the classes of 1935 and 1960.



On Thursday, Oct. 17, the Cal Poly cheerleaders and Musty, the university's Mustang mascot, will trot down to the Farmers' Market on Higuera St. in downtown San Luis Obispo to spread the word about The Mane Event.

Homecoming registration will begin Friday (Oct. 18) afternoon at a special Registration and Reception Center in the San Luis Lounge of the University Union. This will be the place to obtain tickets, buttons, corsages, class messages, and general information.

The action picks up that evening at 9 pm with a bonfire to be built in the parking lot across from Yosemite Hall on campus. Earlier that evening, the Lady Mustangs volleyball team will play UC Irvine, at 7:30 pm in the Gym.

On Saturday (Oct. 19) alumni and friends may continue to register for Homecoming in San Luis Lounge. Two campus events are scheduled for 10 am. Chumash Auditorium in the UU will come alive when Cal Poly's six sororities present their pledge classes. At

the same time, Cal Poly's men's and women's cross-country teams will host the San Luis Obispo Cross-Country Invitational. The run will begin and end on Mt. Bishop Rd. near Highland Drive.

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### Fulbright Scholar to be honored

President Baker and Provost Fort will co-host a reception to introduce Dr. Tchaboure Ayme Gogue, Cal Poly's 1985-86 Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence, to the campus community.

The reception will be held Thursday, Oct. 17, from 2:30-3:30 pm in Room B of the Faculty/Staff Dining Room.

Dr. Gogue is currently dean of the School of Economics and Management at the University of Benin, Lome, Togo. He was educated in Canada, earning three degrees in Economics from the University of Montreal. He is at Cal Poly to assist the School of Agriculture and the International Affairs and Development Administration programs in the Political Science Department.

He will also contribute to the School of Communicative Arts and Humanities by offering an international perspective to the general education curriculum.

Dr. Gogue has considerable experience in designing and evaluating development projects. He has done research and published internationally in the area of agricultural economics in West Africa and co-authored a recent book on development planning.

He has also written books on microeconomic theory and international economics. He was a Ford Foundation Fellow at the University of Montreal and in 1981 received a short-term Fulbright fellowship for advanced research at

Boston University. He has also held short-term lectureships in France, Holland, Burkina-Faso, Congo, and Central Republic of Africa.

### Accreditation renewed in engineering

All 10 engineering programs recently reviewed by the national body that oversees engineering education have won renewal of their accreditation.

The successful programs include eight in the School of Engineering plus one each in the School of Agriculture and the School of Architecture and Environmental Design.

The programs accredited by the Engineering Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET) are all undergraduate programs leading to a Bachelor of Science degree.

They are in aeronautical, agricultural, architectural, civil, electrical, electronic, environmental, industrial, mechanical, and metallurgical engineering.

## **Craig Russell in Spain for conference**

Music Professor Craig Russell was in Spain recently to take part in an international conference on "Spain and Western Music."

The conference, in Salamanca, marks the European Year of Music. Russell was asked by the Spanish government to deliver a lecture on Baroque music in Spain. In addition, he was invited to take part in one of the panel discussions.

Dr. Russell's talk involved computer research he did over the past year at Cal Poly. By inserting specific information (melody, title, meter, key, etc.) about thousands of Baroque guitar melodies into a data base that he developed, Russell was able to sort through thousands of previously "anonymous" works and find the true authors.

For example, French composers Andre Campra and Jean-Baptiste Lully were previously thought to be unknown in Baroque Spain. Russell found approximately 50 examples of Lully compositions and 20 examples of Campra compositions which appear in Spanish sources.

In addition, he found dances by the noted Italian guitarist Domenico Pellegrini which appear in Spanish sources.

## **French jazz group to play**

One of the foremost contemporary jazz groups in France, the Po Music Quartet, will perform at 8 pm on Saturday, Oct. 12, in the Cal Poly Theatre. The group is making its first American tour, under the auspices of the Cultural Exchange Program of the French Embassy.

Advance tickets for the Oct. 12 concert are \$4 for Cal Poly students, senior citizens, and children, and \$5 for all others. The cost will be \$1 more at the door.

Advance tickets may be purchased at all outlets of Boo Boo Records and Cheap Thrills, the San Luis Obispo Chamber of Commerce, and the UU Ticket Office.

## **Art curator to speak Oct. 17**

The chief curator of art at The Oakland Museum will be the featured speaker on Thursday, Oct. 17, in the next program in the 1985-86 Arts and Humanities Series.

Dr. Christina Orr-Cahall, a former member of the Cal Poly Art Department faculty, will examine "The Art of California: Exploration to Exploitation" at 11 am in UU 220. It is part of the "California Vision" series sponsored by the School of Communicative Arts and Humanities.

Orr-Cahall will provide an overview of the art of California from the illustrators who accompanied the early explorers to the present art scene. Stops will be made for "the artists of the Gold Rush, the 19th century landscape painters, and the emergence of important California styles such as California Decorative, Bay Area Figurative, and Funk Art."

The talk will focus on painting with some reference to crafts and sculpture. The illustrated presentation will utilize works from the collection of The Oakland Museum.

## **Library hosts books exhibit**

The finest books published in the Western United States in 1984 form the 44th Western Books Exhibit through Monday (Oct. 21) at

the Kennedy Library.

The traveling exhibition recognizes those who design, print and publish books. Sponsored by the Rounce and Coffin Club of Los Angeles, the display in the library's Gallery is a regional selection intended to acquaint the general public and local print enthusiasts with the best "bookmaking" produced in the West. The winning entries demonstrate fine papers, hand printing, marbling, woodcuts, and overall exceptional design.
