New computer system planned

The Chancellor's Office has notified Cal Poly's Division of Information Systems that the local timesharing system replacement bid has been awarded to PRIME Computers. Cal Poly will be receiving a PRIME 9750 mini-computer to replace the current local timesharing system (RSTS). The new system will run under the PRIMOS operating system, and will have 4 megabytes of main memory and 1,305 megabytes of disk storage.

Directors sought for overseas assignments

Applications are invited for assignment as resident directors of the overseas study centers of the International Programs of The California State University for 1987-88. Appointments are made a year in advance so that those selected will have adequate time to plan for a year overseas. The positions of resident director for Germany and Sweden are 12-month appointments. For France, Italy, and Spain the appointment is for an academic year. Part-time (1/5) appointments are made for Israel and Japan.

Qualifications include: Appointment to the faculty or academic administrative staff of a California State University or College; possession of a terminal degree, and some actual overseas experience. Ability to speak and write the relevant language (for France, Germany, or Spain appointments); language ability is desirable for all other countries. Ability to administer and coordinate all aspects of the International Programs at the study center abroad. It is desirable that the applicant have had experience in expending and accounting for state funds.

The deadline for submission of all application materials is Dec. 15. Applicants selected for an interview will be contacted shortly after Feb. 1, 1986, and all applicants will be notified of the final selections not later than May 1986.

East Asian expert to speak on Nov. 7

Dr. Diana Yoshikawa Paul, an expert on the culture of East Asia, will be the featured speaker on Thursday, Nov. 7, in the next program in the 1985-86 Arts and Humanities Series at Cal Poly.

Paul will discuss "From the Land of the Rising Sun: The Japanese-American Experience in California" at 11 am in UU 220.

The program is part of the "California Vision" being presented by the School of Communicative Arts and Humanities.

The talk will be a general overview of the history of Japanese Americans in California, studying the underlying patterns of interaction between Japanese Americans and those outside their social group.

For nine years Paul was a member of the Department of Religious Studies at Stanford University. She earlier taught at the University of Toronto, and was a research associate at Kyoto University's Institute for the Humanities.

A prolific author, her most recent works include: "Women in Buddhism: Images of the Feminine in Mahayana Tradition" (with contributions by Frances Wilson); "Philosophy of Mind in Sixth Century China: Paramartha's Evolution of Consciousness;" and "The Buddhist Feminine Ideal: Queen Srimala and the Tathagatagarbha."

Walk-a-thon will benefit Hospice, Full Circle groups

About 500 Cal Poly sorority members are expected to take part in a walk-a-thon from noon to 3 pm on Sunday, Nov. 3, to benefit the San Luis Obispo County Hospice. A secondary purpose is to increase the awareness of a new campus support group known as Full Circle.

Full Circle is a mutual support group composed of college-age students who have encountered, or are currently dealing with the issues of death, dying or bereavement — either on the part of a family member or a friend.

It is available to all Cal Poly and Cuesta students, or other college-age individuals.

Full Circle meets each Thursday from 5 to 7 pm in the Conference Room of the Health Center. Because the main doors of the center are locked at that time, participants should enter at the basement door at the rear of the facility.

Full Circle is not a religious organization, nor is it meant to substitute for one's system of faith. The facilitators are familiar with local clergymen and can make referrals when requested.

Full Circle is co-sponsored by Hospice of San Luis Obispo County and the Student Affairs Division. It is modeled after a similar program at UC Santa Barbara.

Library Associates to sponsor Nov. 10 architecture talk

"Uncovering the Regional Architecture of the Central San Joaquin Valley" will be the topic of The Library Associates program on Sunday, Nov. 10.

Architectural historian John Edward Powell will present an illustrated lecture on the undiscovered architectural gems built in the early part of the 20th century by such architects as Greene and Greene, Charles E. Butner, and Julia Morgan. They all studied at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris.

The program will be held at 2 pm in the Special Collections Department, fourth floor, of the Robert E. Kennedy Library.

A traveling exhibition of the work of Butner, one of the most significant of the San Joaquin Valley architects to practice in Central California, will be on display at a reception following the program.

Assembled by Powell, a staff researcher for Lew and Patnaude, Architects, Fresno, and part-time instructor in architectural history at California State University, Fresno, the exhibit of 17 works chronicles Butner's career from 1911-57.

The exhibit, in the Reading Room area of the Special Collections Department, will be on display from Nov. 1 through Dec. 30.
