Poly students in international cycle competition

Mechanical engineering students from Cal Poly fell just short in their efforts to win the 1981 International Human Powered Vehicle Speed Championships last weekend in England. In the 200-meter sprint competition on Saturday (Sep. 5) in Brighton, "Phoenix," their streamlined, two-man bicycle, was third. In the 32-mile road race, which took place on Sunday (Sep. 6) at the Goodwood Race Course, the students finished a very close second.



"Phoenix" is a specially-engineered, super-light vehicle that places the two riders in back-to-back semi-reclining positions. It measures 14.5 feet in length, just over two feet in width, and exactly three feet in height, and weighs just 90 pounds without the riders.

Planning for CSUC's future

Formation of a "Directions 2000 Committee" to explore future possibilities for The California State University and Colleges has been announced by CSUC Trustees Chairman John F. O'Connell and Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke. Appointment of the 11-member committee, to be headed by Trustee August Coppola of Los Angeles, results from action taken by the Trustees in June aimed at planning for the CSUC's next two decades.

"Sound planning has been a hallmark of the CSUC from the start," O'Connell commented. "Academic and facilities planning have helped hundreds of thousands of students acquire a high quality education at minimum costs to the California taxpayer. The CSUC, thus having met unparalleled challenges in its first 20 years, will be greatly aided by this new planning effort, creatively conceived and headed by Trustee Coppola; an effort that will help the Board chart the way to a new century."

Chancellor Dumke commented: "I am pleased that this committee will be focusing on a broad range of educational and academic problems of the future. As Chancellor, and as a member of the Board of Trustees, I look forward to the committee's findings."

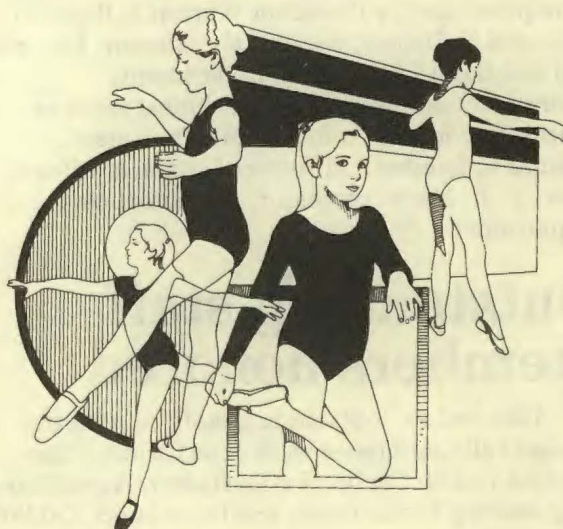
Defensive driver training reminder

CSUC Archives dedicated

The CSUC Archives were dedicated Sep. 15 in ceremonies at California State University, Dominguez Hills. The occasion, a CSUC 20th Anniversary event, will highlight accomplishments of men and women who helped develop the nation's largest system of senior higher educational institutions.

Former Governor Edmund G. "Pat" Brown spoke, as well as John F. O'Connell, Chairman of the Board of Trustees; Louis H. Heilbron, who was the Board's first Chairman in 1960; Chancellor Glenn S. Dumke; and Dominguez Hills' President Dr. Donald R. Gerth.

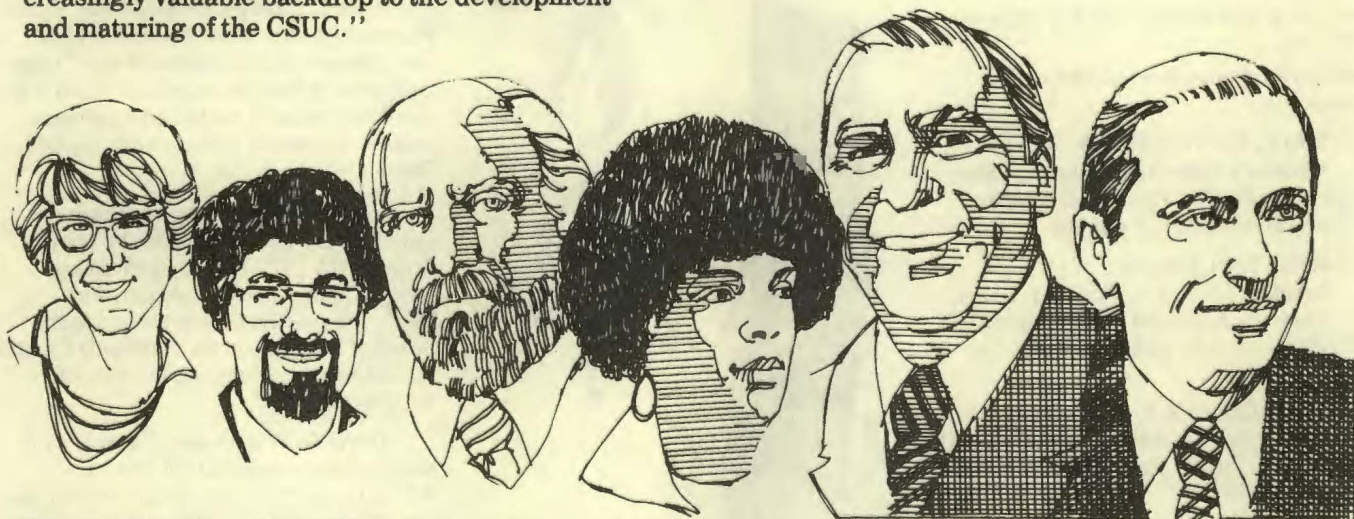
"The establishment of an official Archives is more than an act of homage to the past," Chancellor Dumke said. "Our system contains records which should not be lost or forgotten. Not only are such records instructive to researchers in the area of higher education governance, but they form an increasingly valuable backdrop to the development and maturing of the CSUC."
