#### Oracle Corp. Hiring More Than 40 Grads from Class of 2013

Computer technology giant Oracle Corp. is scouting at 13 of America’s top universities – including Cal Poly – to fill 450 sales and technical sales positions in Boston; Austin, Texas; and Redwood Shores, Calif. Through a series of on-campus events this spring, Oracle is hiring about four dozen Cal Poly students, said Martin Shibata, director of Cal Poly’s Career Services. #### Senior VP for Administration and Finance Larry Kelley to Retire in June



Larry Kelley, who has led Cal Poly’s Administration and Finance Division for more than 11 years, is retiring as senior vice president and chief financial officer. His last day in the office will be June 28. “Larry has been an indispensable ingredient in Cal Poly’s continued success over the last decade,” said President Jeffrey D. Armstrong. “I am particularly thankful for Larry’s astute financial management through the state’s economic downturn of the last few years. At a time when many institutions faced broad faculty and staff layoffs, Larry and his team’s planning abilities saved Cal Poly from the same fate and helped us to maintain the high quality of a Cal Poly education.” During Kelley’s tenure, Cal Poly has invested nearly \$1 billion into new construction and renovation of facilities, including the \$300 million Poly Canyon Village project. In addition, his division undertook an aggressive effort to bolster Cal Poly’s sustainability efforts. As a result, today nearly one-third of our facilities are LEED certified. While a national search is conducted for a permanent successor, Stan Nosek, who recently retired from a similar leadership position at UC Davis, has agreed to serve as interim vice president for Administration and Finance. Amy Offner, assistant professor at the University of Pennsylvania, will present "Remaking Housing Policy in the Americas, 1950-1980," from 4 to 5 p.m. Wednesday, May 15, in Science (Building 52), Room E-27. During the Cold War, poverty in capitalist countries became a discrediting embarrassment for government officials, a prestigious topic of expertise for social scientists, and a cause for protest by social movements, resulting in the rise of "aided self-help housing," a privatized form of public housing policy. 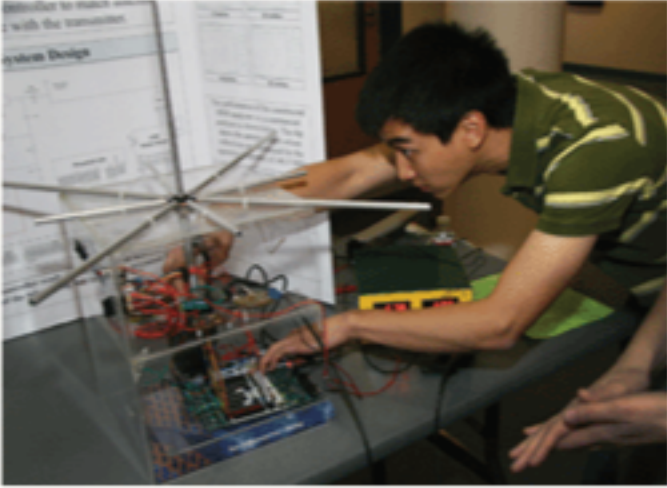
