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MUSTANG MATMEN BAG FOURTH NATIONAL CROWN; HALL NAMED OUTSTANDING WRESTLER

Cal Poly's wrestling varsity parlayed a superlative team effort headed by senior Terry Hall's championship in the 118-pound class to win its third national college division championship in succession and fourth in the last five years at Ashland, Ohio, last weekend. Hall, the only 1969 national title winner to repeat this year, received the tournament's "outstanding wrestler" trophy in recognition of his effort.

The Mustangs' championship performance was unprecedented in the history of the eight-year-old National Collegiate Athletic Association tourney. In fact, when they waltzed away from the field in the 1969 meet, which took place on campus last March, they became the first team to ever win more than two national crowns and the first team to ever win two in succession.

Their effort last weekend resulted in 82 points and easily outdistanced Northern Iowa University, their nearest competition for the team title, which finished with 58. New York Maritime Academy with 48 points, South Dakota State University with 43, and Mankato State College of Minnesota with 41, finished third, fourth, and fifth, respectively, among the 86 teams that entered 381 wrestlers in the meet, which took place at Ashland College.

Nine Men Contribute Points to Mustang Effort

In addition to Hall's championship effort, which contributed 18 points to the team total, Mustang Head Coach Vaughan Hitchcock saw three other members of his team grab second place finishes and yet another finish third. In fact, 9 of the 10 men who wore the Cal Poly green and gold during the meet scored team points.

John Finch, a junior competing at 158 pounds, had to settle for runner-up honors when he was injured during the title match at that weight. A national champion at 150 pounds as a freshman and runner-up last year, he was ahead of his opponent 1-0 at the time the match was stopped. Lee Torres and Rich Simmons, both juniors competing for Cal Poly for the first time this year after transferring from junior colleges last fall, also won second place points for the Mustangs at 150 and 177 pounds, respectively, and freshman Glenn Anderson was third at 126 pounds. Other members of Cal Poly's team at the 1970 NCAA college division meet were Larry Morgan, at 134 pounds; Steve Gardner, 142; Rick Arnold, 167; Gary Maiolfi, 190; and Greg Barnet, heavyweight.

Although Coach Hitchcock had not announced definite plans at this writing, it is expected that several members of the team will enter the NCAA university division championship meet, which will take place at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., next Friday and Saturday (March 27-28). Hall, Anderson, Torres, Finch, and Simmons, as place winners at the meet in Ashland, are all qualified to enter the university competition, but Finch's injury makes his entry nearly impossible.

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NEW SYSTEM FOR CHECK DISTRIBUTION ANNOUNCED BY BUSINESS AFFAIRS DIRECTOR

A new system of distribution for payroll warrants for members of the Cal Poly faculty and staff has been announced by Donald S. Nelson (Director of Business Affairs). The new arrangement, which will be used for distribution of March warrants on March 31, was proposed by Nelson and members of the Business Affairs Division staff and has been approved by campus consultative bodies.

Under the revised system, payroll checks of persons working in regular monthly rate positions will be made available to departments at 3:45 p.m. on the last day of the pay period, unless the last day falls on a day when college offices are not open. In that case, they will be made available at the opening of the next regular business day. The checks will be packaged by department for pick-up by an authorized person from each department, who will then have the responsibility for further distribution.

Nelson said that the new distribution method may delay deposits of checks for members of the faculty and staff who have their checks deposited by the college directly in local banks, by one day, but in no case, except when there is a delay in arrival of the checks on campus, should the delay be any longer.

The Business Affairs Division proposal of the new system followed request of the college Academic Senate for an arrangement under which members of the college faculty and staff could receive their pay checks on the last day of the pay period.

NEW PROCEDURE OUTLINED FOR STUDENTS SEEKING SPECIAL PARKING

A new procedure for use by students seeking special parking privileges in staff parking areas has been outlined by Donald S. Nelson (Director of Business Affairs). To become effective immediately, the procedure calls for students desiring such privileges to first secure a statement approving issuance of a permit from the Health Center for a specified length of time. The statement must then be taken to the Security Office, which will issue the special permit. If the need for special parking privileges continues past the expiration date, a new permit will have to be requested in the same manner as the original permit.

RECORDS OFFICE WILL BE OPEN THIS SATURDAY MORNING

The college Records Office, Adm-222, will be open from 8 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday (March 21) to receive Winter Quarter grades from the faculty.

Prospects for the future continue bright for the Mustang grapplers. Hall, Arnold, and Barnet are the only seniors on the 1969-70 team, which completed its rugged dual-match slate with an impressive 20-6 won-lost mark and the first victory ever recorded by a West Coast team over University of Oklahoma to its credit. Waiting in the wings for an opportunity to represent Cal Poly on the mat are a number of men who are champions in their own rights, but were unsuccessful in the series of challenge matches that determined which men would compete in the national meet.

MUSIC GROUPS BEGIN ANNUAL CONCERT TOURS

The 130 young men and women who are members of Cal Poly's Symphonic Band, Men's Glee Club, and Collegians stage and dance band have completed their Winter Quarter final examinations and are in the midst of their annual concert tours. They left early this week on two different tours that will take them to 19 high schools in the San Joaquin Valley and Southern California areas before the week is over.

The Men's Glee Club and Collegians will combine their talents for 18 concerts in the San Joaquin Valley area beginning yesterday (Monday, March 16). Under the direction of Harold P. Davidson (head of the Music Department), they opened their tour with performances at high schools in the Bakersfield area. Before it concludes Friday (March 20) night in Fresno, they are also scheduled for concerts at high schools in Shafter, Wasco, Dinuba, Tulare, Visalia, Selma and Kerman.

Highlights of the Men's Glee Club-Collegians tour for 1970 will be evening concerts, to which the public is invited, at Dinuba High School on Thursday (March 19) and at the Edison Social Club in Fresno on Friday.

Cal Poly's Symphonic Band, under the leadership of William V. Johnson (director of bands), has 11 performances scheduled before its week-long, 800-mile tour of Southern California is complete. Its tour will open this (Tuesday) evening with a public concert at Dos Pueblos High School in Goleta, and conclude Friday with a special performance for resident children at the Hillview Acres Children's Home in Chino.

Also scheduled by the Cal Poly band are evening concerts at Fillmore High School, San Marino High School, and Ramona High School in Riverside, and assembly performances at Thousand Oaks High School, Sierra Vista High School in Baldwin Park, and San Bernardino High School.

This week's tour will be the 29th in a series that began in 1941 for the Men's Glee Club and Collegians. The Symphonic Band's annual concert treks began in 1962 and have taken place each spring since.
