Cal Poly faculty, staff, and students who have the urge to beautify their homes, may do so less expensively if they buy their plants from the college's Ornamental Horticulture Unit this Saturday (May 16). Student grown ornamentals will be offered in the annual two-for-the-price-of-one sale.

A feature item is the offering of certified citrus trees at \$3 each or two for \$5. Included in the sale are Frost navel oranges, Skaggs Golden Bonanza navel, and Corizo Citrange. The sale also will include bedding plants, ground cover and potted annuals.

The items may be purchased at the Ornamental Horticulture Unit, near the Horse Unit, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.

CLASSES SCHEDULED TO MEET ON JUNE 1

Students and faculty are reminded that Spring Quarter classes will be held on Monday, June 1. The Spring Quarter final examination period is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, June 2, and continue through Friday, June 5. Dale W. Andrews (Academic Vice President) made this announcement following several inquiries regarding classes meeting on the day before final examinations, Monday, June 1. Dr. Andrews stated that in order to end the academic year at the end of the first week in June and schedule the required number of instructional days, it was necessary to schedule only one day for Spring Quarter registration as well as schedule classes on the Monday before final examinations.

NEW PROGRAM ANNOUNCED BY N S F DIRECTOR

William D. McElroy, director of the National Science Foundation, has announced plans to initiate a new program in fiscal year 1971 to support student-initiated, student-planned, and student-directed research aimed at solving some of the pressing problems of our present-day society. Called Student-Originated Studies, the new program will provide support to interdisciplinary groups of students proposing to attack either a single problem or a group of related problems focused on the general area of environment. Guidelines will be available in late May from the Division of Undergraduate Education. The proposal deadline is Dec. 1, 1970. Funds for this program are included in the foundation's budget request for FY 1971, now under Congressional consideration. The actual establishment of the program is subject to availability of funds.

REMINDER ON CLASS WITHDRAWALS ISSUED BY REGISTRAR

A reminder concerning the final day for students to withdraw from Spring Quarter classes has been issued by F. Jerald Holley (Director of Admissions and Records). Holley said the 1969-70 Catalog provides that "except for college recognized emergencies, no withdrawals from a course will be permitted after the end of the seventh week of instruction." The seventh week of instruction for the Spring Quarter ends at 5 p.m., today (Tuesday, May 12).

BUTZBACH WILL RETIRE IN JUNE; REPLACEMENT NAMED

Academic Vice President Dale W. Andrews has announced that Arthur Butzbach (Associate Dean, Graduate Studies and Education Department) will retire at the end of the academic year in June. Howard Boroughs, presently dean of the faculties at Portland State University, has accepted appointment as associate dean graduate studies and research effective Sept. 1.

Dr. Andrews explained that in addition to Dr. Butzbach's retirement, George Clucas, (Director of Research and Development) has requested assignment to half-time teaching responsibilities in the Social Sciences Department beginning in September. "In addition to Dr. Boroughs' responsibilities in connection with the graduate programs at Cal Poly, he will also work with Dr. Clucas in the Office of Research and Development," Vice President Andrews said.

A member of the Cal Poly faculty in the Education Department since 1950, Dr. Butzbach was named associate dean graduate studies in the fall of 1968 on a half-time basis while continuing half-time as a professor of education. During his tenure at Cal Poly, he has served on numerous college committees dealing with academic planning and curriculum development and was active in the college's teacher preparation program.

Dr. Boroughs became dean of the faculties in Portland State in 1967; previously he served the InterAmerican Institute of Agricultural Sciences of the Organization of American States, Turrialba, Costa Rica, as professor and head of the Nuclear Energy Program (1958-1962) and was associate program director, program director, and staff associate with the National Science Foundation (1962-1967). Dr. Boroughs received his BA in biochemistry from University of Southern California in 1949 and his PhD in plant physiology and immunology from California Institute of Technology in 1953. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. In addition he served on the National Academy of Sciences ad hoc Committee on Biological Effects of Atomic Radiations (Oceanography and Fisheries) from 1955 to 1958.

IRANIAN STUDENTS WILL NOT BE TRIED IN MUNICIPAL COURT

The two Iranian students arrested during Poly Royal for failure to comply with regulations governing distribution of published materials will not be tried in municipal court, according to a statement released yesterday (Monday, May 11).

The announcement states: "At the college's request, the district attorney has agreed not to proceed with criminal action against the two Iranian students, Behzad Alavi and Mohammed Fayyaz Sanavi. The college will proceed with the student disciplinary action."

The hearing had been scheduled for last Thursday (May 7) afternoon, but was continued until a date to be announced, as a result of Governor Ronald Reagan's closure of state college and university campuses.

#### REVISED PROCEDURES FOR DISCIPLINARY ACTION APPROVED BY PRESIDENT

Revised procedures for use in administration of student disciplinary actions have been approved by President Robert E. Kennedy and became effective yesterday (Monday, May 11). The new procedures were developed by an ad hoc Student Disciplinary Action Committee appointed by the president Dec. 2, 1969, and have since been reviewed and approved by the Student Affairs Council and Academic Senate, and reviewed by the general counsel of the California State Colleges.

Being promulgated as Administrative Bulletin 70-3, Student Disciplinary Action Procedures, the new policy revises Section 670 of the College Administrative Manual. Copies of the new AB are being duplicated and will be distributed as soon as available to all those holding copies of CAM. Additional copies will be available for review in the Office of the Dean of Students, the Student Activities Office, and in the Reserve Room of Dexter Library.

Disciplinary actions initiated on or after May 11 will be conducted in accordance with the new procedures. Those in process prior to that date will be governed by the procedures outlined in CAM Section 670.

Performances have been rescheduled in the Cal Poly Theater at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Monday (May 15, 16, 17, and 18) and at 2 p.m. on Sunday.

The Thomas Dekker play revolves around the lives of tradesmen of Elizabethan London. It tells the happy and enchanting story of the Earl of Lincoln and his efforts to discourage the love between his nephew, Lacy, and Rose, daughter of the Lord Mayor of London. J. Murray Smith (Speech Department) is directing a cast of 32 members in its preparation for the performances.
