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ENROLLMENT PLATEAU APPROVED

Cal Poly's enrollment for the academic year 1971-72 will be held to the same annual average FTE as the current academic year, 11,700, President Robert E. Kennedy has revealed in a memorandum to school deans and instructional department heads.

The memorandum implements previous announcements that the president has made concerning his petition to the Chancellor of the California State Colleges Glenn S. Dumke to restrict the college's expansion because neither the college nor the community could provide services and facilities for instruction, students, and faculty.

Dr. Kennedy said, "Budgetary restrictions for the last two years, on current operating expenses and also on capital outlay appropriations, have resulted in some critical equipment and facility shortages on this campus. In addition, you are well aware of the increasing student and faculty concern regarding the housing situation in the community."

The two-year enrollment plateau does not rule out future growth of the college. President Kennedy pointed out, for example, the effects of new utilization standards on Cal Poly growth plans.

"Some will say they thought Cal Poly's ceiling enrollment figure was 12,000 FTE and yet the chart shows an annual FTE enrollment figure of 15,700 in 1980-81. It is true that Cal Poly's ceiling enrollment was 12,000. However, this was based upon a plant capacity which reflected utilization standards on an 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. basis. These utilization standards have been changed to reflect both an increased time base (8 a.m. to 10 p.m.) and an increased utilization of facilities. Thus, the 15,700 figure reflects the capacity using the changed increased standards of the facilities Cal Poly would have built for 12,000 FTE on an 8 to 5 basis under the old standards."

Remarks in the memorandum were made in connection with the proposed revision of the college's academic master plan, which will be presented to the Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges at its Nov. 23-24 meeting. Changes in the academic master plan will be the subject of an article to appear in Cal Poly Report following the Trustees' meeting.

BS DEGREE PROGRAM IN ECONOMICS WILL BE ADDED TO CAL POLY OFFERINGS

Establishment of a Bachelor of Science Degree curriculum in economics at Cal Poly has been announced. To be available to students of the college for the first time during the 1971-72 college year starting next July, the new program will be offered by the Economics Department of the School of Business and Social Sciences.

STUDENTS, FACULTY INVITED TO VIEW MARRIED STUDENTS HOUSING PLAN

Plans for some 600 apartment units to accommodate Cal Poly married students and new faculty will be presented at a special meeting to be held Thursday, Nov. 19, at 7:30 p.m., in MSD-218. E. Douglas Gerard (Executive Dean), who is in charge of college facilities planning, will present a report on the private development proposed by William Lyon Corp. for construction on Cal Poly State-owned land along Highway 1.

Married students currently attending Cal Poly, faculty members on short-term assignments as lecturers, and other students and faculty interested in the housing development are particularly invited to attend the presentation.

Dean Gerard will show slides of the building site, and the developer's proposal, and explain how results of two campus surveys have been incorporated in the developer's plan. The presentation will be similar to one made last week to the San Luis Obispo City Council and also to the apartment owner's association.

Married students housing proposal has received tentative approval from the Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges who have scheduled a further report by the college at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, to be held Nov. 23-24. Two trustees, Charles Luckman, who visited the campus as a speaker two weeks ago, and Dudley Swim, who is scheduled to visit briefly this week, are expected to report to the trustees on the college's proposal.

Trustee approval of the project on Nov. 24 could clear the way for construction of an initial increment of some 300 spaces in time for occupancy by Aug., 1971.

Objectives of the new degree, according to George G. Clucas (Interim Dean of Business and Social Sciences), who made the announcement, will be threefold:

- to prepare students for employment as analysts, economists, researchers, and general managers in agriculture, business, government, and industry;
- to prepare students for careers as economics teachers; and
- to prepare students for graduate study in economics.

The new degree curriculum is being structured to support and take advantage of the academic areas in which Cal Poly is traditionally strong by utilizing complementary courses from such departments as Agricultural Management, Business Administration, Computer Science and Statistics, and Industrial Engineering.

Students enrolling in the economics degree program will be able to choose from three concentrations of courses designed to further meet their specific career goals, according to Fuad H. Tellev (Head of the Economics Department). They are: economic theory and application, international trade and development, and industrial economics.

Dr. Tellev said four courses will be added to those presently offered by the Economics Department to accommodate the BS degree program. Included will be Cost and Benefit Analysis, Advanced Analysis of Economic Development, and an undergraduate seminar.

LEAD PLAYERS FOR DRAMA PRODUCTION LISTED

Three actors familiar to the local theater goers will star in the Speech Department's production of Tom Stoppard's play Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday (Nov. 19, 20, and 21). The play, based upon two characters extracted from William Shakespeare's Hamlet, will be staged in the Cal Poly Theater beginning at 8:30 p.m. each night.

Ed Pinson, a speech major at the college, will assume the title role of Rosencrantz, an easy-going gentleman plagued by a supreme lack of confidence. Pinson has starred in other college productions, including Marat-Sade, Incident at Vichy, The Lady's Not for Burning, and Dracula.

Guildenstern, the other title character of the play, will be played by Jeffery Schultz, a senior majoring in history at Cal Poly. Guildenstern is depicted as an intellectually-disturbed gentleman expecting total coherence in a fragmentary world. Schultz has appeared in campus productions of School for Scandal, Noah, The Devil's Disciple, and Incident at Vichy.

George Dellaganna, a speech major from Paso Robles, will be featured as The Player, a principal character of the story who has resigned himself to being nothing more than a creature of no settled destiny. Dellaganna's acting experience includes roles in Shoe-maker's Holiday, R. U. R., and Marat-Sade at the college.

This weekend's performances of Stoppard's masterpiece of tragedy and emotion will be presented as the first in a series of three Speech Department productions scheduled this year. Play dates Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf and Aristophane's The Birds, as translated by William Arrowsmith, are scheduled for early next year.

J. Murray Smith (Speech Department) is directing preparation for Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead. A former director at both the Pasadena Playhouse and Denver Civic Theater, he is also well known in this area for his stage and technical direction of campus plays.

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ALEXANDER, TELLEW NAMED TO SOCIAL SCIENCES, ECONOMICS POSTS

Two faculty members with more than 10 years of teaching service at Cal Poly have been named to department head positions. William M. Alexander will head the Social Sciences Department, and Fuad H. Tellev will head the Economics Department. Both have been serving as acting heads of the respective departments in recent months.

The appointments were announced by President Robert E. Kennedy, who said recommendations were made by both George G. Clucas (Interim Dean of Business and Social Sciences) and Edward H. Barker, who is expected to assume his duties as dean of the school about Feb. 1. Both appointments were unanimously endorsed by the department faculties, according to Dr. Kennedy.

Dr. Alexander is a graduate of Oregon State University, Pennsylvania State University, and University of Oregon, where he completed study for his doctor's degree in political science in 1962. Prior to joining the Cal Poly faculty in 1958, he was a management specialist for the U. S. Geological Survey and taught at both Oregon universities.

The new head of the Social Sciences Department presently is chairman of the Cal Poly Academic Senate. He lectured on international relations and public administration at Alagarh Muslim University in India while on leave during 1964-65.

Listed in American Men of Science, Dr. Alexander is a member of the American Political Science Association, the American Parliamentary Association, and the California Association for Public Administration Education. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Natoma Council of Camp Fire Girls, which operates Camp Fire Girls programs in Coastal, Central, and Southern San Luis Obispo County.

Dr. Tellev, who joined the Cal Poly faculty in 1960, is a native of Iraq. He earned his bachelor's degree in economics at the College of Commerce and Economics in Baghdad and his doctor's and master's degrees in economics at University of Southern California. Before assuming his duties at Cal Poly, Dr. Tellev served as a teaching assistant and lecturer at USC.

For the past several years, Dr. Tellev served as Cal Poly representative for California State Colleges International Programs, through which state college students attend foreign universities. A member of the American Economics Association, the Western Economics Association, and the Middle East Institute, the new Economics Department head is also a past president of the Cal Poly Staff Club.

The Social Sciences Department at the college presently has 643 students enrolled in courses leading to the Bachelor of Science Degree in social sciences and a faculty of 26 members. The Economics Department, which offers general education courses for the entire Cal Poly student body, has 9 members on its faculty.

TEST SCORING MACHINES NOW AVAILABLE ON CAMPUS

Test scoring machines have been installed in three campus locations by California Datronics Co. and are now ready for use free of charge by members of the college faculty. Metering for use of the machines is through sale of answer forms, which are available for purchase in El Corral Campus Store. A variety of answer forms are stocked in the store, including those with space for 100 or 200 multiple choice or true-false answers, 100 multiple choice and 30 matching responses, and a "blue book" with a 100-response foldout.

Use of the scoring machines, which are available in CompSci-113, Erhart Ag-203, and BAandE-101, is very simple, according to Ray Boche (Director of the Computer Center), who announced their installation. Forms are fed into the machines one by one with the answer key first. Incorrect answers are marked and a score of total correct answers printed. About 30 tests a minute can be scored, making it feasible, in some instances, to provide student evaluations during the same class meeting a test is given.

Boche said answer forms for use primarily as answer keys may be obtained by faculty members through department orders from the campus supply storeroom. The November 10, 1970 issue of Encouraging Notes announced five winners of a National Science Foundation program, and said that the grants were for continuation of research during the next two summers. Since the title of the program is Academic Year Extension, it was nothing but stupidity on my part to ignore the purpose of the grants, which is to encourage research during the academic year. My apologies.

The Congress has passed an Environmental Education Act and sent it to President Nixon for signature. The Act authorizes \$5M for FY 1971 (that's this year!), \$15M for FY 1972, and \$25M for FY 1973 for educational programs in the field of environmental quality. An office of environmental education would be established in the Office of Education. The Bill (H.R. 18260) provides support for: curricula development, pre-and in-service training, planning of outdoor ecological study centers, community education programs, small grants (up to \$10,000 for research, demonstration, and pilot projects). Obviously, no guidelines are yet available.

National Science Foundation

has a deadline of December 1, 1970, for a program called Engineering Research Initiation Grants. These grants are for faculty who have recently received the doctorate, have begun teaching, but have had no substantial research support. This office has no guidelines, so you should write directly to Dr. John Ide, Director of The Division of Engineering, National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C. 20550.

National Institute of Mental Health

announces that it is now accepting proposals in its program of small grants for summer research in the behavioral and biological sciences. The deadline is February 1, 1971 for grants to begin next summer, but National Institute of Mental Health will accept proposals at any time with other starting dates. Grants are limited to \$5,000 for direct costs, and the project may not take longer than one year. Money may be used to develop and test new techniques, to analyze data previously collected, or to carry out small-scale exploratory and pilot studies.
