ENROLLMENT REACHES 8,318 DURING REGULAR REGISTRATION PERIOD

Enrollment of students at Cal Poly again reached an all-time high when 8,318 students registered for classes during the regular Fall Quarter registration period last Thursday and Friday. Late registrations are expected to offset any drop that may occur in total enrollment during the early weeks of the quarter and hold the final figure above 8,300, the number of students planned for. The late registration period began today (Tuesday, September 26) and will continue through next Tuesday (October 3).

NOMINATION DATE FOR DEAN OF AGRICULTURE CANDIDATES REVISED

Final date for receipt of nominations or applications of candidates for the post of dean of the School of Agriculture has been revised to November 1, 1967, according to a statement issued last week by Russell K. Anderson, chairman of the Consultative Committee for Selection of a Dean of the School of Agriculture. At the same time, Anderson said the anticipated date for completion of the committee's work is March 1, 1968.

The revised dates for the receipt of nominations and applications and for completion of its work were established by the committee after it became apparent that it would be able to conduct its deliberations and conclude its responsibilities earlier than previously thought. It has established 11:00 a.m., October 5, as a time when it will make its members available to individuals who wish to become informed regarding the selection process. The Staff Dining Room has been tentatively set as site for that occasion.

SEPTEMBER PAYROLL WARRANTS TO BE AVAILABLE MONDAY

Payroll warrants for the September pay period will be available Monday (October 2) in the office of the Business Management Division, Room 114, Administration Building. After that date they will be available at the Cashiers' Windows located across the hall from Room 114.

DATE FOR CHANGEOVER OF TRAFFIC SIGNAL CONTROL CORRECTED

November 1 is the projected date for changeover of the control system for the traffic signals at the California Boulevard-Foothill Boulevard intersection to a fully automatic control with traffic sensors. The date was incorrectly listed as October 1 in an article which appeared on the front page of last week's issue of Staff Bulletin.

AVAILABILITY OF SPECIAL LEAVES FOR 1967-68 ANNOUNCED

Availability of special leaves in research or creative activity for the 1967-68 academic year was announced last week by Academic Vice President Dale W. Andrews. Application procedure for the special leaves calls for receipt of applications by Russell K. Anderson, chairman of the Campus Research Committee, on or before October 20.

That committee will be asked to have its recommendations on those to receive the leaves ready for final college approval by October 27. This year's program for the special leaves is a continuation of a program that began in 1965. Expansion of the program for 1967-68 makes it possible for seven quarters of leaves to be granted during the Winter or Spring Quarters or both.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE OF CAL POLY STAFF CLUB UNDER WAY

The annual membership drive of the Cal Poly Staff Club, which sponsors weekly luncheon meetings with outstanding speakers, golf tournaments, bowling and softball teams, cards and flowers for ill and deceased members of the faculty and staff, and social activities throughout the year, is in full swing, according to William A. Boyce, its membership coordinator. Boyce said the club helps establish a college-wide social environment in which all members of the campus community can enjoy fellowship and fun.

Priced at \$4.00 for the year, the membership this year also entitles holders to take part in a drawing for a considerable number of prizes including gift certificates at several San Luis Obispo stores, restaurants, and service stations. Boyce urged all members of the college faculty and staff who have not already done so to contact the Staff Club membership representative in their department to arrange for their membership for 1967-68.
