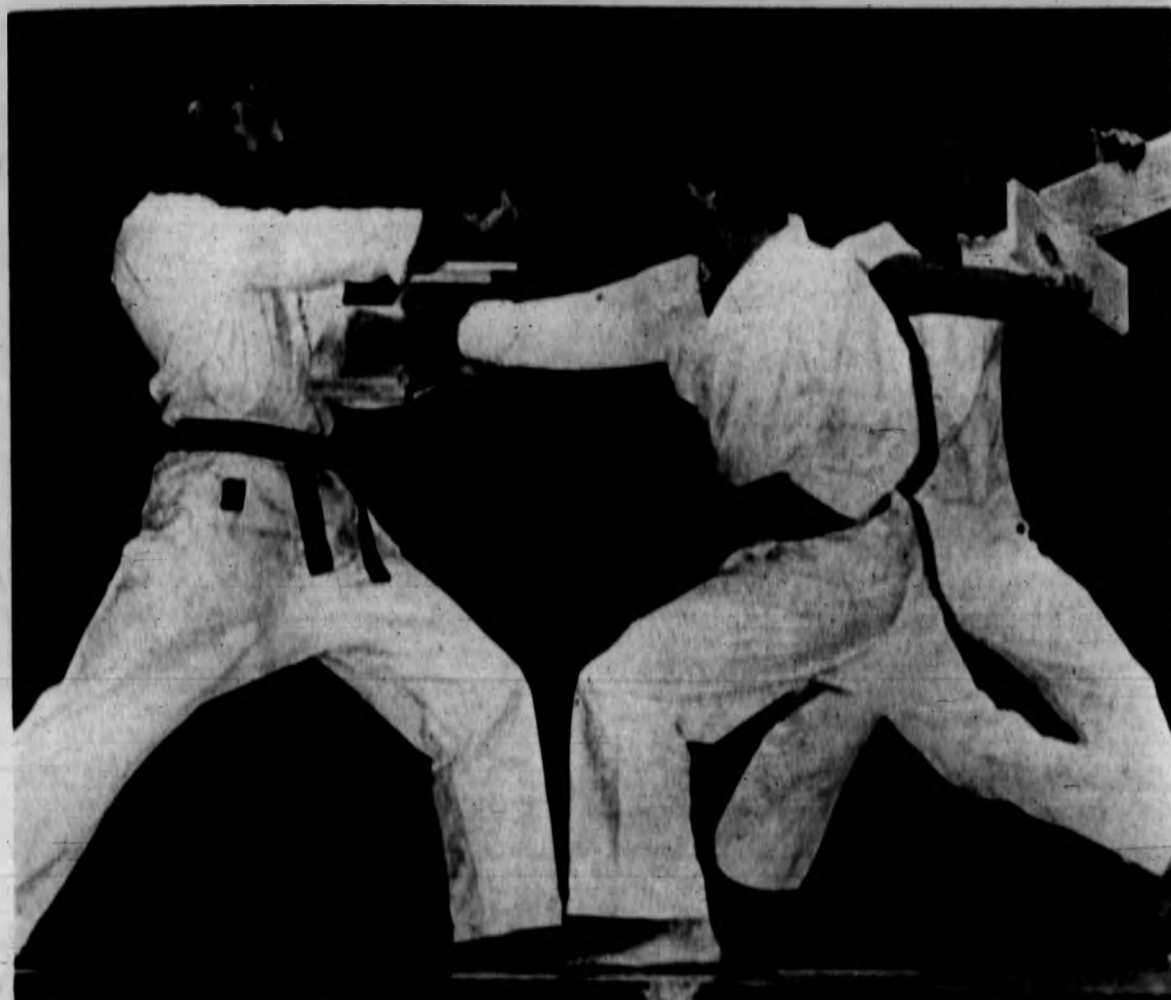

## Nixon sticks to his 'Waterguns'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon acknowledged for the first time today that "there were apparently wide-ranging efforts to limit the Watergate investigation or to conceal the possible involvement of members of the administration" and his re-election organization. But he insisted he knew nothing of such efforts at the time.

Even as a former White House employee was telling the Senate Watergate hearing of alleged high-level White House authorization for offers to buy the

silence of Watergate conspirators, Nixon issued a fresh statement on his Watergate position.

Basically, he re-emphasized his frequently repeated past statements that he had no advance knowledge of the break-in at Democratic headquarters at the Watergate office building last June. But he did concede that efforts—unknown to him—that were "unethical, as well as illegal," took place.

Without spelling out what activities he meant, Nixon said in a lengthy, prepared statement released to reporters: "None of these took place with my specific approval or knowledge." But he added, "To the extent that I may in anyway have contributed to the climate in which they took place, I did not intend to; to the extent that I failed to prevent them, I should have been more vigilant."

Nixon said that at no time did he have prior knowledge of the Watergate burglary plans; at no time was he aware of subsequent efforts to cover it up until he undertook an investigation of his own; and at no time did he authorize clemency for defendants or authorize anyone to raise money for them.

Nixon did concede that soon after the Watergate break-in, he suspected that the CIA might be involved. But he insisted that "at no time did I attempt, or did I authorize, others to attempt to implicate the CIA" in the affair.

Nixon said he was told as early as last July by L. Patrick Gray, then acting FBI director, that the Watergate investigation might "lead higher" and asserted:

"It now seems that later, through whatever complex of individual motives and possible misunderstandings, there were apparently wide-ranging efforts to limit investigation or to conceal the possible involvement of members of the administration and of the campaign committee." More obviously referring to reports that he might even be considering resigning because of the scandal that has rocked his administration, Nixon said: "I will not abandon my responsibilities. I will continue to do the job I was elected to do."

## Salvage flight to save Skylab planned Friday

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—With the start of the countdown delayed nine hours to conserve rocket batteries, Skylab 1 astronauts finished training Tuesday for their unprecedented flight Friday in a bid to salvage their crippled space station.

The fliers, Charles "Pete" Conrad, Joseph P. Kerwin and Paul J. Weitz, underwent a cram course at Huntsville, Ala., learning to use the tools and material they will need to patch up the huge, \$204 million laboratory that was damaged during launch.

Engineers and technicians worked around the clock to get at least two makeshift sunshades, debris-clearing tools and other repair equipment to the cape by the delivery deadline Wednesday. Deputy project manager John Disher said the timetable leading to the astronauts' 9 a.m. EDT launch Friday was tight.

"We're hopeful we can make that date and at the moment there are no reasons to say we can't," he said in Houston.

The astronauts appeared ready. Conrad and Kerwin worked in a 40-foot deep water tank at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, rehearsing some of the spacewalk operations they might have to perform to shade Skylab.

## Poly Royal moratorium

A recommendation to place a moratorium on funds for next year's Poly Royal was passed by Finance Committee Monday night.

Bruce Holt, committee member from the School of Agriculture and Natural Resources, moved for the recommendation.

Holt said Student Affairs Council and university Pres. Robert E. Kennedy should know how the committee feels about using Associated Students, Incorporated, funds for events which did not directly benefit the ASI.

Prior to the motion Holt asked Chairman Mike Meiring if there

was any way to put pressure on Pres. Kennedy regarding his moratorium on the utilization of state-owned school facilities.

Meiring said SAC has the moratorium issue on its agenda for this Wednesday.

The recommendation was passed over the objections of several members who wanted more information before acting.

In other business, Meiring announced the committee will interview applicants next Tuesday at 7 p.m., in union 217A, for next year's committee.

Meiring said that there have been no applicants from the School of Human Development and Education.

In further business, \$1244 was taken from the ASI Contingency Fund and put into the Rodeo Team's budget. The funds will be used to help the team defray its expenses for competition in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Finals at Bozeman, Montana, in June.

## Alternative careers will be explored Thursday

Alternative careers in today's society is the theme of a workshop to be held Thursday. It is sponsored by the Counseling Center, United Campus Ministry, and the Newman Center.

Two people from Vocations for Social Change will speak on alternative careers at 11 a.m. in room 217E of the University Union. That evening they will

lead discussion groups from 7 to 10 p.m. in room 218.

VSC is a Bay Area group which acts as a center of information for people working or wishing to work toward building an alternate society. They focus on careers in alternative institutions such as free clinics and innovative schools, as well as redefining jobs within existing organizations.

The main thrust of the talk and evening discussions will be the theme of work. Areas of discussion will include what place work should occupy in our daily lives, why few people feel a real commitment to their work except as a way of gaining security, and how people can organize at their place of work to create new types of jobs and communities, using their work as a force to build a new society.

The workshops are free, but since the group is trying to raise money to continue free distribution of *Workforce*, their monthly magazine, donations will be appreciated.

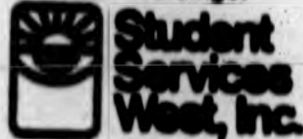
