CAL POLY WILL HOST C S E A INSTITUTE ON GOVERNMENT

Final plans for a California State Employees Association-sponsored Institute on Government, to be held on campus November 4, have been announced by Emmett Bloom, institute chairman and a member of the Animal Husbandry Department faculty. (The one-day meeting has been endorsed by Governor Edmund G. Brown, who has authorized state agency heads in the Central Coast Area to permit their employees who desire to attend it during their regular working day, insofar as it is consistent with the operation of the agency.)

The institute, which will be welcomed by Cal Poly President Julian A. McPhee, will include a panel of state legislators and eight other discussion panels, among them a panel on education featuring Louis Heilbron, member and former chairman of the Board of Trustees of the California State Colleges; Dr. Ellis McCune, dean of academic planning for state colleges; and Assemblyman Winfield Shoemaker of Lompoc. Moderator for the education panel will be Cal Poly vice-president Robert E. Kennedy.

Tickets for the event, which will admit the purchaser to all general and discussion sessions are on sale at \$2.00 each. Tickets that include a luncheon in the Staff Dining Room, as well as admittance to the general and discussion sessions, are priced at \$3.00. Arrangements for ticket sales are under direction of Dr. James Langford, Cal Poly CSEA Chapter president and a member of the Education Department faculty, who reports that departmental representatives will be contacting all members of the college faculty and staff regarding purchase of tickets this week.

Patterned after similar meetings that have been held by CSEA for several years throughout the state with approval of state government officials, next month's institute here will include discussions of taxes, civil service employee motivation, natural resources, fringe benefits and CSEA services to employees. It is being sponsored by CSEA chapters in Region XVIII, which includes all chapters in San Luis Obispo County and Santa Maria.

Members of the Cal Poly staff and faculty on the program, in addition to President McPhee and Vice-President Kennedy, are Owen Servatius, head of the Business Administration Department, and Dr. J. B. Stone, associate dean, counseling and testing. More than 20 members of the Cal Poly chapter of CSEA are working on final planning for the institute, according to Bloom.

DR. KRAMER NAMED VICE PRESIDENT OF KELLOGG CAMPUS

Cal Poly President Julian A. McPhee last week announced appointment of Dr. Robert L. Kramer as vice-president of the college's Kellogg Campus effective November 1, or earlier. Dr. Kramer, until his appointment as vice-president at Cal Poly, was director of the Agricultural Marketing and Utilization Center at Michigan State University, East Lansing.

President McPhee said that the actual effective date of Dr. Kramer's appointment will depend upon how soon he can clear his responsibilities at Michigan State and move his family to California, but that it would be no later than November 1.

"Dr. Kramer has an outstanding background in both teaching and administration and will be a valuable addition to the college's staff. I feel that Cal Poly is very fortunate to find and attract a person of his reputation and abilities," President McPhee said.

The appointment of Dr. Kramer to the key administrative position came after a year's search for qualified candidates. In October, 1964, President McPhee announced to faculty and staff of the college that his request for establishment of vice-president positions for the Kellogg and San Luis Obispo Campuses of the college had been approved and asked for nominations of qualified candidates for the positions. President McPhee said that the procedures he outlined in October, 1964, for appointment of a vice-president, which had been approved by the office of Dr. Glenn S. Dumke, chancellor of the California State Colleges, had been followed. Both the Faculty Senate and Staff Council at the Kellogg Campus endorsed Dr. Kramer's appointment.

Dr. Kramer received his BS degree in animal husbandry at Purdue University and both his master's and doctor's degrees in agricultural economics at Michigan State University. In addition to his most recent position, he has held key assignments with Michigan's Agricultural Extension Service and was a member of MSU's faculty for 10 years. Other important assignments held by the new vice-president include several with the US Department of Agriculture and duties as consultant to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development in Paris during 1963, 1964 and 1965.

Named the "Outstanding Marketing Man of the Year" last April by the national Farm Marketing Seminar, held in Chicago, Dr. Kramer is a member of the American Farm Economics Association, the American Marketing Association, Alpha Zeta, Epsilon Sigma Phi, and Sigma Xi. Discharged from the US Navy as a Lt. Cmdr., in 1946 after five years of duty, he is married and the father of six children.

REMAINING SALARY MERIT WARRANTS DUE NEXT WEEK

Warrants covering remaining overdue amounts due in connection with the August and September salary merit adjustments are now being prepared by state Controller's Office and should be available on campus next week, according to an announcement from the campus Personnel Office. The delay in receipt of the warrants has apparently been occasioned by a heavy backlog of documentation processing in the Controller's Office.

Commenting on a similar delay in the 10 percent salary increase adjustment for faculty members who taught during the six-week portion of the Summer Quarter, Personnel Officer Milton Piuma said last week that his department is presently having to document the time of all who taught during that period individually.

"We regret the delay, but documentation is proceeding as rapidly as possible. Those who have checks coming yet will be notified immediately upon their receipt," Piuma concluded.

THOMAS MC GRATH NAMED ACTING DEAN OF INSTITUTIONAL RELATIONS AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

Appointment of Thomas H. McGrath, dean of students at Cal Poly's Kellogg Campus from 1957 to 1964, as acting dean of institutional relations and student affairs for the California State Colleges was announced last week by CSC Chancellor Dr. Glenn S. Dumke.

Formerly associate dean of the institutional relations and student affairs division, McGrath succeeds Dr. Alvin Marks, who resigned recently to accept the post of associate director of the California Coordinating Council for Higher Education.

McGrath, an alumnus of Cal Poly's San Luis Obispo Campus and brother of James M. McGrath, head of the Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Engineering Department here, was dean of students at the Kellogg Campus from 1957 until late last year. He received his bachelor's degree from Santa Barbara State College and his master's from Claremont Graduate School. A licensed psychologist, he is a member of the executive committee of the Student Personnel Association of the California State Colleges.

INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATIONS AVAILABLE AT CAMPUS HEALTH CENTER

With the US Public Health Service anticipating an epidemic of influenza during the coming winter-spring months, influenza immunizations are being offered at the campus Health Center for members of the student body, faculty and staff, according to Dr. Billie Mounts, college physician. The shot, which is available to students free of charge, will cost members of the staff and faculty \$.50 each. Most opportune time for receiving the immunization, according to Dr. Mounts' announcement, is 1:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

18 S L O CAMPUS STUDENTS ENROLLED AT OVERSEAS UNIVERSITIES

A group of 18 students enrolled at Cal Poly's San Luis Obispo Campus are currently studying in six foreign nations under the International Studies Program of the California State Colleges. The program includes 201 students representing 16 CSC campuses. The San Luis Obispo Campus group is one of the largest campus representations.

Now in its third year, the CSC program is unique in that students study and live under the same conditions as native students with the same courses and instructors at host universities. They are enrolled simultaneously at their home state college and a foreign university and courses taken abroad are incorporated into their regular state college study program.

Universities hosting students from the San Luis Obispo Campus include Uppsala University, Sweden; Waseda University, Japan; Stockholm University, Sweden; and University of Aix-Marseille, France. Other universities cooperating in the CSC International Studies Program are University of Granada and University of Madrid, Spain; University of Heidelberg and Free University of Berlin, Germany; and National University of Taiwan, Formosa.

Numbers of students from individual state college campuses are: San Jose State College, 30; San Diego State College, 24; California State College at Los Angeles, 21; San Francisco State College, 21; Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo Campus, 18; Humboldt State College, 18; California State College at Long Beach, 17; San Fernando Valley State College, 12; Fresno State College, 11; Sacramento State College, 8; California State College at Fullerton, 6; Chico State College, 4; Stanislaus State College, 4; Cal Poly, Kellogg Campus, 3; Sonoma State College, 3; and California State College at Hayward, 1.

WYOMING NEWSMAN WILL JOIN A S I STAFF

Douglas A. Gibson, until last week acting-managing editor of the Laramie, Wyoming, Daily Boomerang, has been appointed assistant graduate manager of the Associate Students, Incorporated, at the San Luis Obispo Campus. He is expected to begin his new duties here Friday (Oct. 15), according to an announcement made last week by ASI Graduate Manager Robert Spink.

A 22-year-old native of Pine Bluffs, Wyo., Gibson will take over primary responsibility for the Associated Students' public information and publications programs, as well as some responsibility for management of the organization's offices on campus. In that role he will direct information and promotion programs connected with the San Luis Obispo Campus' intercollegiate athletics, drama and music activities, concert and lecture events, and other income-producing events.

Gibson, a graduate of the University of Wyoming, where he earned his BS degree, has been a member of the Laramie newspaper's editorial staff since May, 1963. Prior to his most recent assignment, he was sports editor for the paper, which serves Southeast Wyoming and the city which is home of that state's university. The new ASI staff member and his wife, Margaret Louise, expect to establish their home in San Luis Obispo immediately.

POSTPONED STAFF CLUB LUNCHEON MEETING WILL BE THURSDAY MAYBE

LIBRARY LISTS PROFESSIONAL IMPROVEMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Announcement of opportunities for graduate and post-doctoral study and research in Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, and the Soviet Union are included in material from the Inter-University Committee on Travel Grants, currently available in the professional improvement files located in the Faculty Reading Room of the campus library. The programs are part of the exchange of advanced graduate students and faculty members and most are for the 1966-67 academic year. Deadline for application for the programs are Nov. 1 and 15.

Fellowships for pre- and post-doctoral study in social sciences, humanities, education, and law, for the 1966-67 academic year, are offered by the Foreign Area Fellowship Program of the American Council of Learned Societies and the Social Science Research Council. These multi-disciplinary studies will take place primarily in Asia, the Near East, the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, Africa, South America, and Western Europe. Deadline for applications for these programs is Nov. 1, 1965.

He develops his answer with the breath-taking suspense of any good murder mystery and knows he has "the" answer.

NEW C S C DEAN OF ACADEMIC PLANNING APPOINTED

Dr. Robert A. Kennelly of Long Beach has been named associate dean of academic planning for the California State Colleges, it was announced last week by Dr. Glenn S. Dumke, chancellor of the college system. Formerly a consultant on the academic planning staff of the Chancellor's Office, the new associate dean joined the faculty of California State College at Long Beach in 1952. He served as chairman of that college's Division of Social Science for six years before transferring to the Chancellor's Office staff last year.

In his new post, Dr. Kennelly will be responsible for development and application of standards for the equipment used in instructional programs throughout the state college system, largest of its kind in the nation, and for review of specifications of all new academic buildings.
