DISTRIBUTION OF CLASS SCHEDULES FOR SUMMER QUARTER AND SUMMER SESSION ANNOUNCED

Bulletins for the 1966 Summer Session and Class Schedules for the 1966 Summer Quarter will be distributed to members of the campus faculty this week, according to an announcement received last week from the office of Special Services Coordinator George C. Beatie.

A limited number of the Summer Session Bulletins, which include the class schedule and an application for the session, is available for prospective summer session students and may be obtained in the Admission Office, Room 207, Administration Building. The Summer Quarter Class Schedule will be available free of charge to members of the student body and may be picked up either at the Admissions Office or at El Corral Book Store.

HANFORD TEAMS WIN SIX F F A CONTEST TITLES

Students from Hanford High School won first place trophies in 6 of 13 events of the California Association of Future Farmers of America state championship judging contests held on campus last Saturday (May 7). The contests, which included categories of judging skills in agriculture, wound up nearly a week of FFA activities on campus for more than 1,300 representatives of some 240 high school FFA chapters located throughout the state.

The Hanford chapter, represented by three youths on each of its teams, won championships in agronomy, tree, meat, milk, dairy cattle, and livestock judging. Six other high schools were represented by first-place teams in the other seven events. Sutter Union High School won a first-place trophy in entomology; Escondido High School, a first-place trophy in ornamental horticulture; and Madera High School copped the honors in both farm power and machinery and in crops. Yuba City in land and Bakersfield in poultry were the other high schools which won first place trophies.

Two members of the campus student body were named to statewide offices of the California Association earlier in the week of FFA activity. Robert Spiller, a poultry industry major from Reseda, is the organization's new reporter and Steve DeBrum, a dairy manufacturing major from Hanford, is its new sentinel.

REMINDER ON COURSE WITHDRAWALS ISSUED BY REGISTRAR

Campus Registrar F. Jerald Holley last week issued a reminder to members of the faculty that 12:00 noon, Saturday (May 14), is deadline for withdrawal from classes by students. Holley's announcement continued by adding: "Except for college recognized emergencies, no withdrawals from a course will be permitted after end of the seventh week of instruction."

"It is important that the instructional staff of the college be aware that 12:00 noon, this Saturday, May 14, 1966, is end of the seventh week of the Spring Quarter," Holley concluded.

NOTLEY WILL ADDRESS STAFF CLUB LUNCHEON GATHERING

Ronald E. Notley, superintendent of the San Luis Coastal Unified School District, will be the guest speaker when members of the Staff Club gather for their weekly luncheon meeting this week. Scheduled for noon, Thursday (May 12), the meeting will take place in Sections B-C of the Staff Dining Room.

Dr. Notley has wide experience, ranging from that of a teacher in a one-room school in Butte County and an elementary school principal to that of director of education and deputy superintendent in a county school system. Immediately prior to his assuming his present duties two years ago, he had served in a variety of positions during a 14-year term with the Hayward School District. The Hayward system grew from 5,000 to 30,000 students during his time there.

CLOSURE OF SOUTHBOUND HIGHWAY 101 OFF-RAMP DISRUPTS TRAFFIC

Members of the campus faculty, staff, and student body who commute from Northern San Luis Obispo County Highway 101 have been asked to utilize the Highway 1 off-ramp en route to the campus during closure of the Southbound Monterey Street off-ramp, according to a statement issued last week by Paul Bohrer, Division of Highways resident engineer on the reconstruction of off-ramps in the City of San Luis Obispo. Bohrer suggests the Highway 1, Morro Bay, off-ramp and Santa Rosa Street-Foothill Boulevard as an alternate route to campus during the construction period.

PEDERSEN WILL PRESENT BOOK REVIEW ON MAY 17 PROGRAM

Willard M. Pedersen, head of the English and Speech Department, will review One Surgeon's Experience with Hypnosis by Ernest W. Werbel, MD, during the regular Books at High Noon luncheon being planned for next Tuesday (May 17), beginning at noon, in the Staff Dining Room.

In his book, Dr. Werbel reports his experiences with hypnosis: his original scepticism, his study of medical hypnosis with experts in the field, and his use of it in practice. His use of hypnosis in surgical care of patients has achieved enough favorable results for him to have drawn the careful conclusion that "Many more surgical patients are able to benefit from hypnosis than is generally believed."

On today's (May 10) Books at High Noon luncheon program, Warren R. Anderson of the Electrical Engineering Department's instructional staff will review Self Renewal: The Individual and the Innovative Society by US Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare James W. Gardner. Both the place and starting time for today's meeting are same as those announced for next week.
