## 59TH HOMECOMING FESTIVITIES SLATED THIS WEEKEND

Several hundred alumni and former students of the San Luis Obispo Campus are expected to return for 59th annual Homecoming festivities, which will take place this Friday, Saturday, and Sunday (October 21-23). Highlights of the observance are expected to be the traditional parade, the football game, the alumni dinner, and the Coronation Ball, all scheduled for Saturday. Theme for this year's Homecoming activities will be "Would You Believe?"

Specially honored during this year's festivities will be "alumnus of the year" Donald R. Fiester, who presently is agricultural development officer for the United States Agency for International Development mission to Guatemala. Now 42 years old, he received his technical degree in fruit production from the San Luis Obispo Campus in 1947. Since then he has earned added academic degrees from the Inter-American Institute of Agricultural Sciences, Turrialba, Costa Rica, and Cornell University, and has served in a variety of teaching and advisory capacities overseas.

Others who will be honored include the Homecoming Queen, who will be elected by the campus student body this week, and C. O. McCorkle, who will soon retire after more than 30 years of service to Cal Poly as a teacher and administrator. Candidates for the title of Homecoming Queen are Diane Jody Breen of Oakland, Melinda May of Santa Ana, Heather McPherson of Fair Oaks, Carla Buell of San Francisco, Kathy Schenk of Burbank, and Kim Walker of Van Nuys.

## CHANCELLOR DUMKE STRESSES IMPORTANCE OF "PROPOSITION 2"

Citing the phenomenal growth rate of California's college-age population and the necessity of providing facilities for an expected 225,000 state college students by 1970, Chancellor of the California State Colleges Glenn S. Dumke earlier this month stressed the importance of Proposition 2. Also known as the Higher Education Construction Bond Act of 1966, the proposition will appear on the November 8 General Election ballot and will provide \$230 million for construction and land acquisition needs of the California State Colleges and the University of California.

Dr. Dumke said the funds are urgently needed to expand existing campuses and to develop new institutions which are essential if California is to assure every qualified youth, regardless of financial resources, the equal opportunity to participate in the advantages of public higher education.

The California State College system, largest in the Western Hemisphere and one of the largest in the world, has grown from 7 colleges with a total enrollment of 13,000 shortly before World War II to a current enrollment of more than 170,000 students on 18 campuses. State college enrollment will reach 225,000 by 1970, planners say, and is expected to hit 300,000 by 1981. During the past 5 years, enrollment in the college system has increased by 46 per cent.

California is the nation's fastest-growing state, adding three per cent to its population each year. However, the state's college-age population is increasing at more than double that rate. Between 1966 and 1970, just four years, the state colleges will be called upon to accommodate an additional 55,000 students, Dr. Dumke said.

More than 150 separate projects are scheduled for all of the present campuses of the California State Colleges system campuses if voters approve of Proposition 2. Half of the \$230 million total is earmarked for those projects. At Cal Poly's San Luis Obispo campus some \$5.2 million in new facilities and planning would be provided over the next 2 years. Among the major items that would be realized as a result of passage of the proposition are construction and equipment for the new Computer Science Building, equipment for the Science North Building, on which construction is expected to begin yet this year, and more than \$1.6 million for site development for future buildings.

#### SLEVIN NAMED TO HEAD ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The head of a successful San Francisco public relations firm is the new president of the Cal Poly Alumni Association following a joint meeting of the association's Board of Directors and officers for the past year, which took place on campus recently. Edward J. Slevin, president of Ed Slevin and Associates, San Francisco, was named president of the association during the meeting. Named to serve with him were Lew Litzie of Fresno, vice president, and Owen Servatius, head of the Business Administration Department on campus, secretary-treasurer.

A resident of San Rafael, the new CPAA president graduated from the San Luis Obispo Campus with a BS degree in English in 1958. He received a graduate internship in public affairs from the Coro Foundation in 1959 and, since that time, has become known as a specialist in governmental relations and campaign management. An active member of the Republican Party, he served as a state director on the Republican State Central Committee for California from 1962 to 1964.

New vice president for the association's Northern Region Litzie earned his BS degree as a graduate of the Architectural Engineering Department of the San Luis Obispo Campus in 1950. He is a well-known practicing architect in the San Joaquin Valley area and a principal partner of Lew Litzie and Associates, Architects, of Fresno.

Servatius' election as secretary-treasurer of the alumni governing body returned him to a position he has held for the past several years. He is a graduate of the San Luis Obispo Campus' Social Sciences Department, which granted him the BS degree in 1959, and received his MA degree, also from the San Luis Obispo Campus, in 1962.

### ROGERS REPLACES WHITING AS CHAIRMAN OF MANUFACTURING PROCESSES DEPARTMENT

Leo Rogers has been named acting head of the Manufacturing Processes Department to replace Francis F. Whiting, who had been that department's administrative officer for the past 15 years. Rogers, who began his new duties October 10, was appointed to the position by Vice President Dale W. Andrews on the recommendation of John B. Hirt, acting dean of engineering, after consultation with members of the department's faculty and endorsement of the Engineering Division Committee.

Whiting, who has been a member of campus faculty since 1946, requested relief from his administrative responsibilities for health reasons. He will continue his teaching duties on a half-time basis during the Fall Quarter and will assume a heavier teaching load at a later date as his health permits. Members of the department's faculty have expressed a strong desire to have his continued presence among their number.

Rogers, an alumnus of Cal. Poly, has been a member of the faculty since 1954. Prior to that time he had taught at San Luis Obispo High School and been employed by the California Division of Highways.

#### NOTED PSYCHOLOGIST WILL SPEAK ON CAMPUS

Dr. Raymond B. Cattell, research professor of psychology at University of Illinois, will speak on campus Thursday (October 20) evening. Sponsored by the Education Department, the program on which he will appear is scheduled for 7:30 p.m., in the Air Conditioning Auditorium. Dr. Cattell is expected to discuss the psychological and sociological implications of the population explosion. A native of England, Dr. Cattell is an active psychologist and is author of many articles and books in the areas of general, social, and experimental psychology; statistical methods; mental testing; and personality theories.
