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COLLEGE STUDY OF POSSIBLE PROJECT IN THAILAND OPENS

Three members of the staff and faculty of Cal Poly's San Luis Obispo Campus left last Thursday (October 20) on a trip to Bangkok, Thailand, that could signal start of a new overseas program for the college. They are Harold O. Wilson, executive dean and director of staff services; Warren T. Smith, dean of agriculture; and LaVerne C. Bucy, a faculty member in this campus' Animal Husbandry Department.

Before they return to Cal Poly on November 10, they are scheduled to visit officials of the Thai government to study the possibilities and work out preliminary details for assisting that nation in developing a program of training for agriculture teachers. If their report is favorable and plans for the project in Thailand progress, the program in that nation would begin sometime in early-1967 and would be the fifth in a foreign nation for Cal Poly, according to Dale W. Andrews, chief executive officer for the San Luis Obispo Campus.

The college has other programs active at this time in Zambia and Tanzania, both in Africa, and in Guatemala, and initial survey work has been completed on other programs for Sudan and Argentina.

Under Contract with AID

All of the college's programs in foreign lands are being operated under contract with the United States Department of State's Agency for International Development and are connected with developing the host nations' agricultural, technical, and middle management-level manpower forces.

Tentative plans for the Cal Poly/Thailand project call for assignment of a five-man instructor team from the college to the Southeast Asian nation. The team, which would include specialists in agricultural education, farm management, crop production, livestock production, and agricultural engineering and mechanics, would be assigned to Bangpra Agricultural School, where it would assist in preparation of teachers for Thailand's vocational schools.

Long-range objective of the program, which is being projected for five years, is development of a long-range program of agricultural education and agriculture teacher training. Individual members of the Cal Poly instructor team would also contribute to the development of guidance, counseling, and placement services of the Thai government's Vocational Education Department and serve as consultants on Thailand's overall agricultural education program. Total amount of the project contract, which is yet to be finalized, will not be determined until completion of the present study visit.

REPORT ON COLLEGE PROGRAMS OVERSEAS (Continued from Page 1)

First of the Cal Poly international programs to be implemented was the one in Zambia which opened with assignment of a four-member instructor team to the College of Furthur Education in Lusaka, that nation's capital, in 1963. Two members of the college staff are presently on duty there and a third is assigned to Zambia's Natural Resources Development College. The present contract covering the Cal Poly/Zambia project also provides for assignment of another person to the office of that nation's Ministry of Agriculture later this year. The contract, which will expire in February, 1969, is expected to be extended and expanded before that time.

Also scheduled for extension and expansion before its expiration date in December, 1968, is the contract covering the Cal Poly/Tanzania project. First implemented in 1965 with assignment of a four-man team of instructors to Dar es Salaam Technical College, it was expanded by assignment of two additional members during the past summer and addition of another member is expected in December. Three other members of the Cal Poly faculty served as short-term consultants during the summer.

Most recently implemented of the projects is the Cal Poly/Guatemala program. Projected for a one-year duration, it began in September with assignment of a chief of party to Guatemala's Ministry of Agriculture. Three additional specialists in the processing, transportation, and marketing of fruits and vegetables are expected to fulfill short-term assignments in that nation during the next several months.

Robert P. Hansen, a member of the English and Speech Department's faculty whose second novel, Glimpse of Canaan, came off the press last month, will be interviewed by two of his colleagues in the English and Speech Department, Robert J. Huot and James J. Peterson, during the Books at High Noon luncheon meeting being planned for noon, next Tuesday (November 1), in the Staff Dining Room.

Hansen, who specializes in courses in advanced composition, has previously discussed his first novel, Rites of Summer, for the Books at High Noon series. Having had good press reviews on this book, he says, "talking about it now would seem like bragging, but I'm always willing to answer questions." The interviewers plan to draw out information about writing that the usual review cannot reach.

ART EXHIBIT SLATED THROUGH NOVEMBER 4

An exhibit of Iraqi art by Faik Hassan, which opened in the Lobby of the campus Library yesterday (Monday, October 24), will continue through November 4, according to a spokesman for the sponsoring College Union Fine Arts Committee. Members of the college faculty and staff are invited to attend the exhibit, which will be open during regular Library hours.

Hassan, along with the late Jawad Selim, was one of the prime movers of the modern art movement. He is recognized today as Iraq's leading painter, and is credited with heading a group of artists called the Societe Primitive. Born in Baghdad in 1914, he showed an interest in art while in elementary school and started to paint and sculpt then. A graduate of the I'Ecole Nationale Superieure des Beaux Arts in Paris, he became head of the Department of Painting of Iraq's Academy of Fine Arts.

The Hassan exhibit, which consists of 36 paintings, was brought to campus through the courtesy of the American Friends of the Middle East, Inc., Western Region, San Francisco.

VARSITY GRIDDERS SLATE JOURNEY TO LONG BEACH

Coach Sheldon Harden's Mustang football varsity faces one of its severest tests of the 1966 season Saturday (October 29) when it journeys to Long Beach where it will encounter California State College at Long Beach's 49'ers in a California Collegiate Athletic Association game billed for 8:00 p.m. The Mustangs, who showed their best offensive effort of the season while edging San Fernando Valley State College 28-22 last Saturday, will be attempting to boost their record for the year to four wins and three losses in Saturday night's game.

PERFORMANCE OF CLASSIC OPERA SCHEDULED ON CAMPUS TOMORROW EVENING

Faculty, staff, and students of the college and residents of the community will have an opportunity to see a full-dress, professionally-staged production of Gaetano Donizetti's comic musical masterpiece, "Don Pasquale," tomorrow (Wednesday, October 26) evening at 8:00 p.m., in the college Theater.

The production is a presentation of the Educational Opera Association, and will be offered on campus under the joint sponsorship of Southern Counties Gas Company and the student College Union. Although the performance is offered primarily for members of the student body, the faculty and staff and public is welcome to attend the performance, which will be given without admission charge.

An abridged version of the opera lasting about one hour, tomorrow evening's production is part of a program which Southern Counties Gas has been conducting since 1959. "Don Pasquale" will be presented in English.

REGISTRATION TOTAL CLIMBS TO 7,782

A total of 7,782 students have enrolled at the San Luis Obispo Campus following the late registration period which ended earlier this month. That number is substantially higher than any previous enrollment for the campus. The former record for student registration came during the Fall Quarter, last year, when 7,214 signed up for classes. That was the first time the figure had gone over the 7,000-mark.

Final totals for the four instructional divisions show that 1,677 students enrolled in study majors in the Agriculture Division; 2,389, in the Applied Arts Division; 1,342, in the Applied Sciences Division; and 2,374, in the Engineering Division.

Included in the total figure for this fall are 4,941 students who are continuing their studies at the campus; 1,308 who enrolled as first-time freshmen; 100 who enrolled as first-time graduate students; 1,114 who transferred from other colleges and universities; and 319 who returned to campus after not attending last quarter. Of the 7,782 students registered, 1,052, who are listed as regular students, are married.

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LOCAL GROUPS ENDORSE PROPOSITION 2

Proposition 2, the State Higher Education Construction Program Act of 1966 which is being presented for voter approval as part of the November 8 General Election ballot, earlier this month received the endorsement of three campus organizations and El Mustang, the student newspaper. The groups, latest to join others from the local community and throughout the state in their support of the \$230 million bond measure, are the Student Affairs Council of the Associated Students, Inc.; the Executive Board of Chapter 97 of the California State Employees Association; and the Cal Poly Staff Association, Inc.

Other organizations whose endorsement of the measure had previously been announced include the Board of Directors of the San Luis Obispo Chamber of Commerce, the 24th District of the California Congress of Parents and Teachers, and the Board of Directors of the Cal Poly Alumni Association. They are joined on a state-wide basis by a host of influential groups who are supporting the higher education construction bond issue, among them the California Taxpayers Association, the AFL - CIO, the California State Chamber of Commerce, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and the California State Employees Association.

Proposition 2 is designed to provide new facilities for campuses of the California State Colleges and University of California throughout the state during the next two years. The colleges and university will share in the measure's benefits on an equal basis if it is approved.

Among the college and university campuses which will receive new facilities if voters approve the proposition, Cal Poly's San Luis Obispo Campus is scheduled to receive \$5.2 million in new buildings, equipment, and planning for the future. Largest single item the campus will receive is construction and equipment of a new Computer Sciences Building. Other major items listed for the campus are equipment for the soon-to-be constructed biological sciences building and site development for future growth.

The short course was co-sponsored by the Agricultural Council of California, Berkeley Bank for Cooperatives, and the Agricultural Extension Service of University of California.
