STUDENTS RECEIVE VARIED HONORS

Students of four different departments have received varied honors in the past several days, according to information released by the college News Bureau. The departments they represented included the Mathematics Department, the Dairy Department, the Physical Education Department, and the Ornamental Horticulture Department.

Kathleen Ann O'Neill, a junior mathematics major, has been chosen "Miss Mathematics" for 1967 by her fellow students in the Math Department. She will serve as hostess for mathematics activities during the remainder of the year and particularly for the 1967 Mathematics Contest for high school students, which is scheduled for April 28 as a feature of Cal Poly's 35th annual Poly Royal.

More than 400 students from some 80 high schools located throughout California are expected to enter the contest. Competition in the annual event will be in three categories including a written examination, a "chalk talk" event, and an audience participation activity.

Dairy Club Awards Dinner

Two leaders in California's dairy industry and three students who expect to graduate this spring were among those honored during the annual awards dinner of the Los Lecheros Dairy Club, earlier this month. They are C. R. Knight of Bakersfield and T. A. Knight of Camarillo, the two industry leaders; Ron Lind; Joseph L. Miranda; and Jon DeWitte. The Knight brothers were named honorary members of the student club for their outstanding contributions to the dairy industry, while the three students were named the Dairy Department's outstanding seniors.

Nine other students in the Dairy Department were honored during the banquet for their activity as members of dairy cattle and dairy products judging teams. They were Daniel Baginski, Gerry Wagner, Doug Bienert, Raymond Griggs, George Magnochi, Edward Miske, Hugh Santos, Richard Tate, and Richard Kratt.

Lewis Cryer, a graduate student nearing completion of requirements for his teaching credential and a 1966 graduate of the Physical Education Department, was a guest speaker at the 34th annual state convention of the California Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, which took place in Los Angeles last weekend (March 17-21). Cryer, who is president of the Cal Poly student chapter of the professional organization, was the only student speaker on a panel of four persons who discussed "What Makes CAHPER Go?"

START OF NEW REGULATIONS FOR USE OF COLLEGE DUMP ANNOUNCED

Initiation of a new set of procedures for use of the campus dump will become effective April 1, according to an announcement received recently from the Business Management Division. The new procedures, which will be reconsidered after being in effect during the entire Spring Quarter, were recommended by the college Executive Council at a meeting held earlier this month and approved by Vice President and Chief Executive Officer Dale W. Andrews.

Under the new procedure, the dump will be open only on Saturday afternoons between 1:00 and 5:00 p.m. An attendant will be on duty at the gate located near the Auto Shop during those hours and will deny permission to proceed to anyone who cannot properly identify himself as a member of the college faculty, staff, or student body. A second attendant will be stationed in the dump area to direct where refuse may be dumped and to check for the presence of wet garbage, which may not be dumped.

Violations of the new procedure will be reported to the appropriate instructional school dean or division head, in the case of faculty or staff violations, or to Dean of Students Everett M. Chandler, in the case of violations by members of the student body.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES WILL BE CLOSED FROM NOON TO 3:00 FRIDAY AFTERNOON

All offices of the college will be closed Good Friday (March 24) from noon to 3:00 p.m., to allow employees to attend religious services. Employees who are on vacation sick leave, compensating time off, or absent without pay for the entire day, or the entire afternoon, will be charged the full period of absence, according to the personnel Office.

Scheduled for 11:10 a.m., on the mornings of April 6, 13, and 20, and 1:00 p.m., the afternoon of April 23, all four of the programs will take place in Room E-27 of the Science Building.

Attendance at the film seminar, April 23, will be open only to those persons who have attended all three of the lecture-forum programs and paid a fee of \$1.00 to help defray the cost of the films. Tickets for the entire series may be purchased at the Temporary College Union Building through March 26, or at the door on April 6. Tickets will not be available after April 6.

INTERRUPTION OF SCIENCE BUILDING TELEPHONE SERVICE SCHEDULED NEXT WEEK

Telephone service to the Science Building will be interrupted next Monday and Tuesday (March 28-29) to allow repairs to the main telephone feeder lines by employees of Pacific Telephone Company. Information released by the office of Building Coordinator E. Douglas Gerard last week indicates that normal service to the building should be restored sometime late on March 28. In any event, full telephone service to the Science Building will be available for start of the Spring Quarter the following morning.

VARSITY BASEBALL, TRACK AND FIELD TEAMS WILL TRAVEL FOR WEEKEND ACTION

Scheduled sports action this weekend will find both the varsity baseball and track and field teams on the road to meet California State College at Hayward and Fresno State College, respectively.

Coach Bill Hicks' Mustang diamond club, which will open its slate for the week when it hosts a touring University of Oregon nine at 2:30 p.m., today (Tuesday, March 21) on the campus baseball field, will meet the Cal State Hayward team in a single contest billed for 2:30, Friday (March 24), in Hayward.

The Mustang cindermen, who have yet to see action in a regular meet because of inclement weather the past three weekends, are set to journey to Fresno for their dual meet, which is being planned for Saturday (March 25) starting at 1:00 p.m. The Cal Poly frosh track and field team will meet the Fresno State frosh in a concurrent dual encounter.
