NOTICES OF ACCEPTANCE BEING SENT TO APPLICANTS FOR SUMMER, FALL ADMISSION

Students from throughout California who had applied for admission to Cal Poly during next academic year have begun receiving notices of acceptance. That information was included in a statement released last week by college Vice President and Chief Executive Officer Dale W. Andrews.

Dr. Andrews' announcement said removal of the "freeze" on acceptances of new students for Cal Poly's Summer and Fall Quarters follows receipt of the executive order to that effect issued last week by Chancellor of the California State Colleges, Glenn S. Dumke. Full effect of the return to normal acceptance procedures will not be known immediately, but the vice president indicated he expected it would result in a total student body of some 8,300 students during the Fall Quarter.

Plans for keeping a close watch over the admissions program for the next several weeks were announced by Dr. Andrews, however. "Chancellor Dumke's order authorizing removal of the freeze cautioned us to go easy on admitting new students until we can be a little more sure that we will be able to provide adequate faculty staffing for the instructional program," he said. "We plan to proceed carefully with our acceptances for the next several weeks," he continued, "but I expect that we'll be able to accept new students without any hesitancy. By the time our staffing is clearer, we'll be able to determine whether or not any further limitations are needed."

8,300 Students Expected for Fall Quarter

Provided Cal Poly is able to secure the faculty needed to accommodate the 8,300 students, some 3,600 new students will be accepted for the Fall Quarter. Past experience indicates that about 2,800 of that number would actually enroll, Dr. Andrews said. On a similar basis, the college's student body during the Summer Quarter, which is scheduled to open in late-June, is expected to reach a total of about 2,000 and a full time equivalent figure of 1,575.

(Full time equivalent students frequently referred to as FTE students, is a term used in planning and budgeting by the state colleges. It is a figure which equates the number of units being carried by a student or students with a study load of 15 units. Total numbers of students enrolled are traditionally larger than the FTE number.)

Vice President Andrews' statement said the acceptance notices being issued by the college Admissions Office are being mailed in chronological order by date of completion of their papers. All applicants whose completed files were received prior to February 15 should receive word of their status within the next two weeks. It will probably be about May 1 before the backlog of applications received during the "freeze" is entirely taken care of, Dr. Andrews concluded.

START OF NEW REGULATIONS FOR USE OF COLLEGE DUMP ANNOUNCED

Initiation of a new set of procedures for use of the campus dump will become effective Saturday (April 1), according to an announcement received recently from the Business Management Division. The new procedures, which will be reconsidered after being in effect during the entire Spring Quarter, were recommended by the college Executive Council at a meeting held earlier this month and approved by Vice President and Chief Executive Officer Dale W. Andrews.

Under the new procedure, the dump will be open only on Saturday afternoons between 1:00 and 5:00 p.m. An attendant will be on duty at the gate located near the Auto Shop during those hours and will deny permission to proceed to anyone who cannot properly identify himself as a member of the college faculty, staff, or student body. A second attendant will be stationed in the dump area to direct where refuse may be dumped and to check for the presence of wet garbage, which may not be dumped.

Violations of the new procedure will be reported to the appropriate instructional school dean or division head, in the case of faculty or staff violations, or to Dean of Students Everett M. Chandler, in the case of violations by members of the student body.

REVIEW OF "THE EAGLE KING" SLATED FOR "BOOKS AT HIGH NOON" PROGRAM

Henry Treece's The Eagle King will be the review topic when Maj. Hugh G. Waite of the Military Science Department presents the first program of the Spring Quarter series of Books at High Noon luncheons, being planned for next Tuesday (April 4), starting at noon, in the Staff Dining Room.

The Eagle King presents an unorthodox Oedipus and recreates the Thebes of pre-historic Greece, according to reviewers. In addition, Greek mythology and the age-old story of Oedipus both develop new meanings.

Applicants for a soon-to-be-vacant intermediate stenographer position on the staff of the college Admission's Office are being sought, according to an announcement issued last week by the Personnel Office. SALE OF SPRING QUARTER PARKING PERMITS CONTINUES

Parking permits for the Spring Quarter are still available and may be purchased from the State Cashier, located on the lower level of the Administration Building, according to an announcement from the Business Management Division. The announcement suggests that permits for Spring Quarter parking be purchased early in order to avoid having to stand in line to make purchases after the quarter begins.

Enforcement of all campus parking regulations will resume with the start of classes for the quarter, Thursday (March 30).
