**Changes to Zimbra Trash Folder Starting This Weekend**

Beginning Saturday, Oct. 19, messages in the Zimbra Trash folder more than 120 days will be deleted from the system. The email support team consulted with various campus constituents, and the new policy is based on common misunderstandings about how long items were stored after they had been moved to the Zimbra Trash folder. Users who have personal Gmail or Yahoo Mail accounts should already be familiar with the automatic deletion of older messages from the Trash folder; this will be the same process for Zimbra and will help make email more secure and reduce space and back-up requirements. The automatic deletion will only affect the Trash folder. If users wish to keep email for a longer period, emails should be moved to a different email folder or left in the inbox.

**Kennedy Library Sponsors 'Open Week 2013' Oct. 17-24**

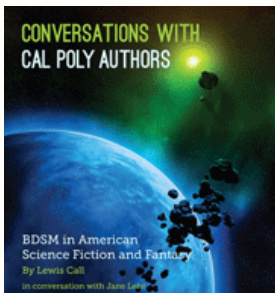
