Starting next year, users will be required to complete this training as part of their annual Cal Poly password change process, but users who take it early will be credited and won't be required to take it again for at least a year. Changes to Zimbra Trash Folder

As of Saturday, Oct. 19, messages in the Zimbra Trash folder for more than 120 days will be deleted from the system. The email support team consulted with various campus constituents, and the new policy is based on common misunderstandings about how long items were stored after they had been moved to the Zimbra Trash folder. Users who have personal Gmail or Yahoo Mail accounts should already be familiar with the automatic deletion of older messages from the Trash folder. This will be the same process for Zimbra and will help make email more secure and reduce space and back-up requirements. The automatic deletion will only affect the Trash folder. If users wish to keep email for a longer period, they should be move them to a different email folder or leave them in the Inbox.

Architecture and the Liberal Arts and Engineering program students have collaborated with Los Osos Middle School (LOMS), to create the “Area 55: Be Scared” fundraiser to be held from 6 to 10 p.m. Oct. 25 at LOMS. The students have created a scenario in which attendees are transported to a parallel universe where genetically



engineered organisms (GEOs) have invaded LOMS. As the story goes, the GEOs were being transported from Vandenberg Air Force Base when high winds redirected the transport vehicles to LOMS. In the scenario, attendees and “surviving” LOMS students will have a chance to see what the GEOs are doing at the school, how Federal Safety Administration officials react, and whether the broader community is in danger.
