Cal Poly Float Wins Crown City Innovation Trophy at 2014 Rose Parade

The float co-constructed by students from Cal Poly and California State Polytechnic University in Pomona received the Crown City Innovation Trophy at the 125th Tournament of Roses Parade held New Year's Day. The Cal Poly float, "Bedtime Buccaneers," depicts children, pets and stuffed animals playing on a bed-turned-pirate-ship, illustrating the 2014 parade's theme of "Dreams Come True."



The float featured something never before seen at the Rose Parade: a system for making the flowers themselves move, creating a ripple effect on panels of blue flowers that represented water around the "ship." This system was conceived, designed and built from the ground up by students in the Mustang 60 lab at Cal Poly. Before the parade, both Cal Poly universities were recognized as "California-Grown Certified" for committing to source a minimum 85 percent of the fresh-cut flowers and greens that adorn their float from the Golden State. Cal Poly's Newest CubeSat Part of Atlas V Launch

Cal Poly's eighth small satellite or "CubeSat" designed and built by students launched into space Dec. 5 aboard a United Launch Alliance Atlas V rocket from Vandenberg Air Force Base. Now in orbit, the CubeSat is carrying five low-resolution cameras that might help NASA achieve its larger vision for satellite imagery. Called IPEX (Intelligent Payload Experiment), the satellite was sponsored by NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL). For more information, go to [Cal Poly News](#).

Mustang Marching Band Selected to Perform in Chinese New Year Parade

The Cal Poly Mustang Band has been invited to participate in the Southwest Airlines Chinese New Year Parade, which will take place on Feb. 15 in San Francisco. Started in the 1860s by the Chinese in San Francisco as a means to educate the community about their culture, the parade and festival have grown to be the largest celebration of Asian culture outside of Asia. The parade was named one of the Top Ten Parades in the world by the International Festivals and Events Association. The Mustang Marching Band, more than 200 members strong, was noticed at a recent building dedication on campus and received the invitation shortly thereafter. Cal Poly is one of only two university bands to be invited. The parade will celebrate bringing in the "Year of the Horse," with floats, dragon dancers and other festive entries.

Capacity Building Workshop to Meet Wednesdays Starting Jan. 8

Faculty, staff and students are invited to participate in the continuing Capacity Building workshop series. The workshops for winter quarter will focus on change in complex adaptive systems and be held from 3 to 5 p.m. Wednesdays in Kennedy Library, Room 511. All are welcome, even if attendance is intermittent. For those who might be new to the series, the workshop is intended to create a safe space to learn about change within ourselves and with respect to the university as an organization. Attendees can learn how to identify their own change models and how they might think differently about internal and external paradigms. As part of the exploration of systems, the group will discuss organizational transformation from a social and ecological perspective and compare those concepts to existing change models. A 2012 paper entitled "A Theory of Transformative Agency in Linked Social-Ecological Systems", from the "Journal of Ecology and Society" will be used as a guide. The article proposes a coherent theory of strategic agency which is described using the adaptive cycle originally proposed by Crawford Holling. University Art Gallery to Exhibit Photography of Vivian Maier

The University Art Gallery will exhibit photography of the late Vivian Dorothea

Maier (1926-2009) from Jan. 9 through Feb. 14. The exhibit will open with a reception at 5 p.m. Jan. 9 in Dexter (Building 34), Room 150. The film, "The Vivian Maier Mystery," will be shown at the start of the reception and at 11 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 11. Both showings are free and open to the public. Maier was an American amateur street photographer who was born in New York City but grew up in France. After returning to the U.S., she worked for approximately 40 years as a nanny in Chicago. During those years, she took more than 100,000 photographs, primarily of people and cityscapes in Chicago, although she traveled the world. Her photographs remained unknown and mostly undeveloped until they were discovered in 2007 by a Chicago historian and collector, John Maloof. Following Maier's death, her work began to receive critical acclaim. Her photographs have been exhibited in the U.S., Britain, Germany, Denmark, Norway and Belgium, and have appeared in newspapers and magazines internationally. 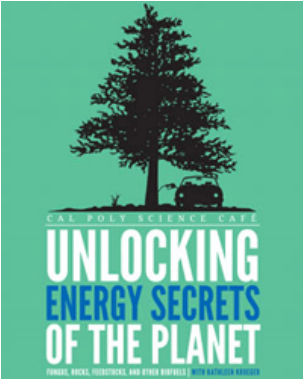


Orchesis Dance Company to Present 'Vitality' Jan. 31-Feb. 8
