Cal Poly is Best in the West for 22nd Consecutive Year

Cal Poly has again been rated the best public-master's university in the West in U.S. News and World Report's America's Best Colleges guidebook — the 22nd consecutive year the university has earned the badge of honor. Cal Poly ranked 10th in the magazine's overall list of the West's best universities, which includes 120 public and private institutions in 15 states, that provide a full range of undergraduate and master's-level programs but few, if any, doctoral programs. The College of Engineering was named the seventh best master's and bachelor's engineering program in the country, public or private, and a number of engineering programs rated top in their respective categories:

Live Mustang Mascot to Debut at Football Home Opener Saturday

Cal Poly's live Mustang Herd will make its official debut at the football home opener against Portland State University on Saturday, Sept. 20. One of three mustangs will lead the team from Mott Athletics Center down Mustang Way to Spanos Stadium and onto the field just

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before the 6:05 p.m. kickoff. The mascot will be available for viewing behind the scoreboard at halftime. The live mascot program was born out of a gift from alumnus Robin Baggett (B.S., Business Administration, 1973) and his wife, Michelle. The couple donated the first mustang for the purpose of boosting school spirit on campus. The university has since adopted two more young mustangs from the Federal Bureau of Land Management, which removes mustangs from Western rangelands to prevent overpopulation. Part of the Learn by Doing legacy, students and faculty in the Animal

Bakari Project Recognized by Women's Legacy Fund

Grants totaling \$25,000 were awarded to local community groups by The Women's Legacy, an endowment used to provide funding to organizations that empower women and girls. Cal Poly's Bakari Project received the largest grant — \$7,500 — to help implement a yearlong college preparation program for 18 at-risk high school girls. Bakari, which is derived from the Swahili language, means "One who will succeed." The program offers intervention and prevention for youths 15 to 17 years old, including introducing them to colleges. Grant Writing Workshop Offered Fall Quarter

The Center for Teaching, Learning & Technology will offer a workshop on grant writing from 11 a.m. to noon Thursdays this fall. The classes from Sept. 25 through Oct. 9 will be held in the Erhart Agriculture Building (No. 10), Room

204. The classes from Oct. 15 through Nov. 20 will be held in Kennedy Library, Room 216B. The workshop is for faculty or staff interested in research or research administration. It will be team-taught by Sue Tonik, grants analyst in the College of Food, Agriculture & Environmental Sciences, and staff from Grants Development and Sponsored Programs. The seminar will be a hands-on overview covering grant writing and research administration. Topics will include sources of funding, types of awards (grants, contracts and gifts), marketing ideas, how to approach sponsors, reading RFPs (request for proposals), what to include and not to include, abstracts, budgets and justifications, indirect costs, payroll and purchasing, and intellectual property and review processes. Writing and analysis will be done every week and participants may bring their own examples for assistance and critique. By the end of the quarter, participants will be able to complete the majority of a proposal and will have knowledge of related contacts and resources at Cal Poly. Finance Students Excel on the Chartered Financial Analyst Exam

Recent graduates from the Orfalea College of Business achieved outstanding success on the latest Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) Level 1 Exam with a pass rate of 61 percent — well above this year's average pass rate of 42 percent. The CFA Charter designation is the "gold standard" for finance professionals worldwide and requires passing three rigorous exams. Cal Poly students prepare to take their Level 1 exam as part of the CFA Challenge, a senior project created by Cyrus Ramezani, Finance Area chair in the Orfalea College of Business. Ramezani constructs the yearlong CFA Challenge to be an intense, self-directed study of financial ethics, economics, accounting, finance and quantitative methods. Since the establishment of the CFA Challenge at Cal Poly in 2007, the course has grown in size each year, including undergraduate and MBA candidates.

The first day Federal Work-Study (FWS) students may begin working is Monday, Sept. 22, provided their financial aid award has been finalized, they have registered for at least half-time units, and have completed the necessary employee forms with Payroll Services. FWS jobs can now be posted through Career Services free online job listing service, Mustang Jobs. FWS student assistant jobs will be advertised to students starting Sept. 1. Regular part-time student assistant positions may be listed now also. Each year, there must be a job description on record with Career Services (via Mustang Jobs) for every position filled by an FWS student. During fall quarter, Information Technology Services will roll out Microsoft's OneDrive to faculty, staff and students. Part of the Cal Poly Office 365 suite, OneDrive provides 1 TB (terabyte) of cloud storage. Cloud storage is a model in which digital data is stored in an environment that is owned and managed by a hosting company. OneDrive allows users to upload and share files, in addition to creating and editing Office documents through a Web browser. OneDrive also features the ability to co-author Office documents in real-time and provides automatic versioning and document history.
