Chancellor's Office Seeks Campus Input for President's Review

The CSU Chancellor's Office is seeking input from the campus community for President Armstrong's performance review. The CSU Board of Trustees requires campus presidents to be reviewed every three years. The process is intended to provide feedback to the chancellor and Board of Trustees about President Armstrong's leadership and the state of affairs at Cal Poly. The process is also intended to provide information to further the university's progress and assist the president in his continued leadership of Cal Poly.

Per trustees' policy, university officers and chairs from its major constituencies are being contacted for their comments, as is a sampling of faculty, administrators and managers, staff, and members of the community. Anyone not selected on an ex officio or random basis is invited to submit comments that respond to specific criteria listed on the [CSU website](#). Every effort should be made to address the criteria. Neither petitions nor unsigned letters will be accepted.

Letters will be kept confidential to the extent permitted by law for executive personnel matters. Submit letters or emails no later than Tuesday, Oct. 14, to Dr. Timothy P. Written responses will be summarized in a confidential report to be discussed with President Armstrong and presented to the trustees. No commentators will be identified in the report.

Cal Poly Bachelor's Degree Grads Rank 13th in Nation for Median Salaries Among Public Universities

Cal Poly bachelor's degree graduates rank 13th in the nation and among the top three in the state for median salaries among public university bachelor's degree recipients, according to PayScale.com's 2014-15 College Salary Report. Early career graduates with a bachelor's degree from Cal Poly earn an average of \$56,200, behind their peers from UC Berkeley at \$59,500 but above UC San Diego at \$50,600. Capacity Building Workshop to be Held Mondays

Faculty, staff and students are invited to participate in the continuing Capacity Building Workshop series. The workshops for fall quarter will focus on change in complex human systems and will be held from noon to 2 p.m. Mondays in Kennedy Library, Room 511. All are welcome, even if attendance is intermittent. For those who might be new to the series, the workshop is intended to create a safe space to learn about change within ourselves and with respect to the university as an organization. Attendees can learn how to identify their own change models and how they might think differently about internal and external paradigms. Participants will be asked to relate experiences in terms of added "capacity" for the university as a whole, which can be expressed differently from person to person. As part of the exploration, the group will consider the Cynefin Framework of complexity. Cynefin means "place of multiple belongings" and relates complex, complicated, simple and chaotic systems. The group will explore how this sense-making model differs from standard categorization models and make comparisons to existing change models that could be applied in organizational transformation. Grant Writing Workshop Offered Thursdays During Fall Quarter

The Center for Teaching, Learning & Technology will offer a workshop on grant writing from 11 a.m. to noon Thursdays this fall. The classes from Sept. 25 through Oct. 9 will be held in the Erhart Agriculture Building (No. 10), Room 204. The classes from Oct. 15 through Nov. 20 will be held in Kennedy Library, Room 216B. The workshop is for faculty and staff interested in research or research administration. It will be team-taught by Sue Tonik, grants analyst in the College of Food, Agriculture & Environmental Sciences, and staff from Grants Development and Sponsored Programs. The seminar will be a hands-on overview covering grant writing and research administration. Topics will include sources of funding, types of awards (grants, contracts and gifts), marketing ideas, how to approach sponsors, reading RFPs (request for proposals), what to include and not to include, abstracts, budgets and justifications, indirect costs, payroll and purchasing, and intellectual property and review processes. Writing and analysis will be done every week and participants may bring their own examples for assistance and critique. During fall quarter, Information Technology Services will roll out Microsoft's OneDrive to faculty, staff and students. Part of the Cal Poly Office 365 suite, OneDrive provides 1 TB (terabyte) of cloud storage. Cloud storage is a model in which digital data is stored in an environment that is owned and managed by a hosting company. OneDrive allows users to upload and share files, in addition to creating and editing Office documents through a Web browser. OneDrive also features the ability to co-author Office documents in real-time and provides automatic versioning and document history.
