Campus Climate Report Presented to Campus

The results of the Campus Climate Survey were presented in two open forums on Oct. 16. The survey found that the majority (80 percent) of the students, faculty and staff report being “comfortable” or “very comfortable” with the university’s campus climate, and 86 percent of students are satisfied with their academic experience. But 22 percent of the Cal Poly community have experienced some form of exclusionary treatment on campus. The Campus Climate Working Group is offering an opportunity to all campus community members to participate in focus groups and workshops to discuss the report and possible courses of action.
