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Cal Poly to Host Sustainable Grassland Ranching Presentation Feb. 3

SAN LUIS OBISPO — Ecosystem scientist James J. Garret will present “Future Vision: A Sustainable and Healthy Food Production System” from 6:10 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 3, in Room 215 in the Science North Building on campus.

Garret will provide a vision for the future of the grassland community food system and examine positive impacts such a food production system can have on economically depressed reservation communities. He will also explore how sustainable grassland ranching can affect reservation communities’ economic and food security, enhance food quality and quantity, and improve marketing and employment opportunities.

Garret grew up on the Cheyenne River Lakota Reservation in South Dakota. He earned a master’s degree in environmental systems from Humboldt State University and a doctorate in rangeland ecosystem science from Colorado State University.

The event is free and open to the public.
