Bridges to Baccalaureate Partnership Receives \$966,000 Grant



The National Institutes of General Medical Science has awarded a five-year, \$966,000 grant to extend Allan Hancock College's Bridges to Baccalaureate program in partnership with Cal Poly. The unique program seeks to increase the number of minority students pursuing degrees in biomedical fields by providing paid summer research internships in biology

labs with Cal Poly professors. Bridges students also receive assistance to transfer to Cal Poly after finishing their requirements at Hancock. Solar LightSail Takes Flight

In collaboration with The Planetary Society, the Cal Poly CubeSat team had a successful test of the LightSail, a solar-powered spacecraft. LightSail is a kite-like vehicle built with three CubeSats and a solar sail that unfurls after launch into space. During the first test, Bill Nye, former host of the PBS show The Science Guy, visited campus in his role as CEO of The Planetary Society. The Cal Poly CubeSat team is also responsible for conducting LightSail's environmental testing (vibration and vacuum), launch coordination and integration, and post-launch command and downlink through Cal Poly's ground station. Capacity Building Workshop to be Held Mondays

Faculty, staff and students are invited to participate in the continuing Capacity Building Workshop series. The workshops for fall quarter will focus on change in complex human systems and will be held from noon to 2 p.m. Mondays in Kennedy Library, Room 511. All are welcome, even if attendance is intermittent. For those who might be new to the series, the workshop is intended to create a safe space to learn about change within ourselves and with respect to the university as an organization. Attendees can learn how to identify their own change models and how they might think differently about internal and external paradigms. Participants will be asked to relate experiences in terms of added "capacity" for the university as a whole, which can be expressed differently from person to person. As part of the exploration, the group will consider the Cynefin Framework of complexity. Cynefin means "place of multiple belongings" and relates complex, complicated, simple and chaotic systems. The group will explore how this sense-making model differs from standard categorization models and make comparisons to existing change models that could be applied in organizational transformation. Grant Writing Workshop Offered Thursdays During Fall Quarter

The Center for Teaching, Learning & Technology will offer a workshop on grant writing from 11 a.m. to noon Thursdays this fall. The classes from Sept. 25 through Oct. 9 will be held in the Erhart Agriculture Building (No. 10), Room 204. The classes from Oct. 15 through Nov. 20 will be held in Kennedy Library, Room 216B. The workshop is for faculty and staff interested in research or research administration. It will be team-taught by Sue Tonik, grants analyst in the College of Food, Agriculture & Environmental Sciences, and staff from Grants Development and Sponsored Programs. The seminar will be a hands-on overview covering grant writing and research administration. Topics will include sources of funding, types of awards (grants, contracts and gifts), marketing ideas, how to approach sponsors, reading RFPs (request for proposals), what to include and not to include, abstracts, budgets and justifications, indirect costs, payroll and purchasing, and intellectual property and review processes. Writing and analysis will be done every week and participants may bring their own examples for assistance and critique. By the end of the quarter, participants will be able to complete the majority of a proposal and will have knowledge of related contacts and resources at Cal Poly. Campus Climate Report to be Available Oct. 16

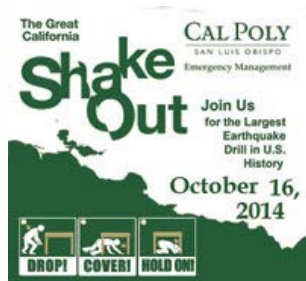
